Partisan Fight Looming Over Income Tax Boost

By PAUL W. HARVEY JR. SALEM (AP)—A partisan fight over the House Taxation Committee's plan to increase state income taxes an average of 9.6 per cent probably will occur Saturday when the House considers the committee's tax package.

The committee, abandoning Republican Gov. Mark Hatfield's proposal for a gross income tax of one per cent plus a rate schedule of 1 to 7 per cent, voted Thursday for a 2 to 7 per cent rate schedule.

The two Republican committee members present—Reps. Victor Atiyeh of Portland and Douglas Heider of Salem—opposed the plan. The six Democrats supported it.

Generally, the tax would slightly reduce taxes for single persons and increase them for married persons with children.

The bill would increase the 77 million dollar annual income tax revenue by 5.4 million dollars, and thus give the Legislature the money it needs to balance the budget.

But passage of the program is by no means certain. There are some rumblings of discontent in the Senate.

Besides the income tax bill, the package includes: a 3 cent a package tax on cigarettes and 15 per cent on other tobacco; a 1 1/2 per cent on business net income; coupled with repeal of the personal property tax on inventories; and a reduction in the tax on capital gains.

The income tax bill would restore about 40 per cent of the tax reduction made at the 1957 special session of the Legislature.

Personal exemptions would remain at \$600. Medical expenses over 5 per cent of income could be deducted, as would charitable, religious and educational contributions between 3 and 20 per cent of income.

But all other deductions, including the one for federal income taxes, would be disallowed. And here is where the bill would raise most of its money.

About 400,000 persons would be relieved of filing tax returns. The tax increases in the bill would be progressively greater as income mounts.

Atiyeh called the bill "only a stop-gap. We're not doing the proper job for the state for the future." Heider said it is "not broadening the tax base and will force acceptance of a sales tax."

The tobacco tax would go into effect 90 days after the Legislature adjourns—provided it isn't attacked by referendum. The people have six times voted against cigarette taxes.

Here is the rate schedule for the income tax according to amounts of taxable income: 0-\$1,000, 2 per cent, with tax ranging from 0 to \$20.

\$1,000-\$2,000, 3 per cent, tax from \$20 to \$50.

\$2,000-\$3,500, 4 per cent, tax from \$50 to \$110.

\$3,500-\$5,500, 5 per cent, tax from \$110 to \$210.

\$5,500-\$10,000, 6 per cent, tax ranging from \$210 to \$485.

\$10,000 and over, 7 per cent, tax over \$485.

While the House Tax Committee was working up its program, both houses waded through heavy calendars.

The Senate sent to the governor bills to make all counties call for bids on contracts of more than \$1,500, increase the parole board from three to five members, and create an advisory council for the Industrial Accident Commission.

The House sent to the Senate a bill to permit persons, whose driver's licenses are suspended or revoked, to keep them while appealing to the courts.

Luce Post Up To Senate

WASHINGTON (AP)—The nomination of Clare Boothe Luce as ambassador to Brazil is scheduled to go to the Senate next Monday. The Senate Foreign Relations committee recommended approval of the nomination Thursday.

Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore), who cast the opposition vote, said he will continue his fight against the nomination on the Senate floor.

Morse opposes Mrs. Luce because of remarks she made about Franklin D. Roosevelt in the 1944 presidential campaign. He also claims she intervened in Italian elections while she was ambassador to Rome.

Herter Aide Said Slated For New Post

WASHINGTON (AP)—Under Secretary of State C. Douglas Dillon reportedly will be named chief assistant to Secretary of State Christian A. Herter. He may have much broader duties than anyone who filled such a position in the past.

Dillon, 49, is now in charge of foreign economic affairs. In his new position he may be allowed to continue direct supervisions of the government's multibillion dollar foreign aid program as well as taking over political problems which Herter formerly handled as chief assistant to John Foster Dulles.

The added duties for Dillon are being considered by Herter as part of a reshuffle of top officials. Officials said one shift already decided upon will return career diplomat Raymond Hare from Cairo, where he is ambassador to Egypt, to become assistant secretary of state for the Middle East and South Asia.

Robert Murphy, now deputy under secretary in charge of political affairs, may be promoted to full under secretary to take over Dillon's old job.

The assistant secretary for Europe, Livingston Merchant, would be promoted to Murphy's old spot. Douglas MacArthur II, now ambassador to Japan, is being mentioned as a replacement for Merchant.

Officials said most of the shifts probably will be delayed until after the May 11 Western Big Four foreign ministers meeting.

Security Full-Time Woe In America's Prisons

NEW YORK (AP)—Security is a full-time problem in state penitentiaries across the nation. So recent prison outbreaks in Montana and Massachusetts haven't caused too much of a furor elsewhere.

Most wardens are loath to admit laxities exist. They insist they take full safety precautions. A few admit tightening up their routines because of the outbreaks.

At Deer Lodge, Mont., where a rebellion last week resulted in three deaths, a cell-by-cell shake-down is being carried out. The search is being made by National Guardsmen still on duty at the penitentiary. Said Warden Floyd E. Powell: "We haven't found too much contraband."

A new maximum security section is now being built at Walpole State Prison in Massachusetts, where rioting occurred March 7. Wednesday's Massachusetts riot took place at Concord State Reformatory and was quelled in about four hours.

"We're naturally more alert for possible riots at a time like this," said the Alabama deputy prisons commissioner, Frank Lee. But he added that all that has been done there is to alert guard chiefs individually at Kilby Prison in Montgomery.

Special guard alerts also were reported at the Ohio State Penitentiary. But Warden Ralph W. Alvis said the effort to tighten security within the walls is a continuing battle.

Utah State Prison has been undergoing a general security tightening since a riot there two years ago. The recent murder of an inmate increased the vigilance. A crack-down is under way against narcotics flowing into the prison, prostitutes sneaking into the honor camp, and trustees visiting nearby taverns.

Missouri Corrections Director James D. Carter and Warden E. V. Nash have kept closer touch with inmate informers since the recent prison outbreaks. Special security precautions were set up there after a 1954 riot.

Increased vigilance has been ordered in Florida prisons but the acting prisons director, Robert Gramling, said no specific new security steps have been undertaken.

A riot at the Arizona State Prison last Dec. 4 led to increased precautions such as more frequent searches of cells and inmates. But Warden Frank Eyma added: "My security has always been tight."
