WASHINGTON (AP)—Descendants of Union Army veterans will give a special performance of "Dixie" for Walter W. Williams, the last of the Confederate veterans.

Williams, now 116 years old, wants to hear again before he dies the rollicking, tingly tune that still can bring tears to a loyal Southerner's eyes.

Rep. Robert W. Levering (D., Ohio) said today that, in response to Williams' invitation, the Sons of Union Veterans will send a drum corps of Mount Vernon, Ohio, will play for him.

Arrangements are now being made, Levering said, to have the Army transport the corps to Williams' home at Franklin, Tex. The corps also plans to make a recording of "Dixie" for him.

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Klamath Falls Man's Dad Perfected Skin Grafting

The first successful technique of skin grafting was perfected by the physician-surgeon father of a Klamath Falls man, Herbert (Bert) Rohu.

An account in the August 15, 1906 issue of the Chicago Journal, printed in the days when illustrations were artist's sketches, tells the graphic story of the first successful attempt that actually took skin from the body of one person and used it as a surface on the injury of another.

The illustration for the news story, an etching, depicts the famous Dr. W. C. Rohu, assistant head of the Pasteur Memorial Hospital, Chicago, removing a thin slice of skin from the arm of a donor.

The successful operations removed 72 square inches of skin from the flesh of 12 persons for a man whose arm had been badly mangled. The arm without the grafts would have been amputated.

Vocation Course Elimination Set

SALEM (AP)—The Senate gave unanimous approval Thursday to a bill transferring Oregon Technical Institute to the State Board of Higher Education, and making it exclusively a technical school. The transfer would be made July 1, 1960. The institute now is operated by the State Board of Education.

The bill, which goes to the House, would eliminate purely vocational courses from the school.

It also provides that if the city of Klamath Falls or any other donor donates a new site within the city, then a new school could be built on that site.

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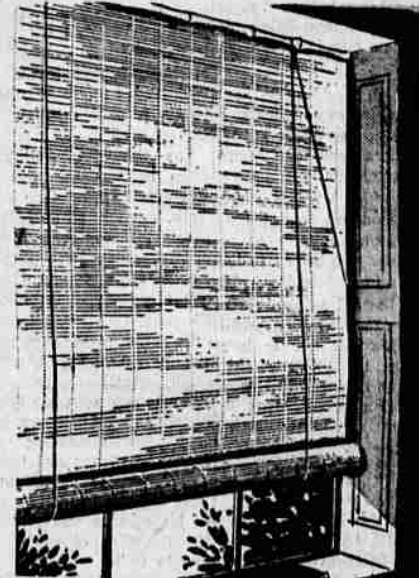
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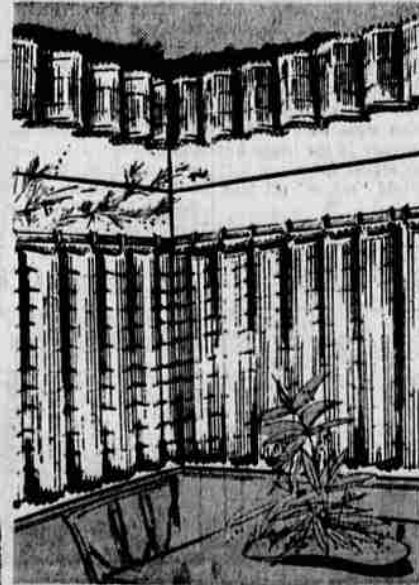


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
