x-Gridded jets 90 Days

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP) — The resident of the Spokane School board pleaded guilty Thursday to picking up a 16-year-old girl and was sentenced to 90 days in jail or vagrancy.

Edward S. Justice, 46, a businessman and former halfback for the Washington Redskins pro football team, began his jail sentence immediately.

Justice, married and the father of two boys, admitted he picked up the girl and took her for a ride in his car Easter Sunday evening. He denied any "lewd or dissolute" conduct.

The girl, who is married but separated from her husband, did not file a complaint against Justice. Neither did she appear in court.

Justice was arrested after police received telephone calls from several persons who saw Justice and the girl together.

Justice's attorney, Harold Gleeson, said he will resign as school board president. He said his family "is sticking by him."

Baby Sitter, 68, Saves Children

LONG BEACH, Calif. (AP) — A 68-year-old baby sitter suffering from a heart ailment braved flames to rescue three children from their burning bedroom Thursday.

"I prayed to God, please, no heart attack, please let me save these children," said Florence Paradis, a grandmother.

She groped through smoke and flames to rescue Timmy Braswell, 7, his sister, Marsha Anne, 15 and a brother, Johnny, 10.

Firemen said the fire probably was caused by a defective cord on an electric clock. Damage was estimated at \$2,000.

Virginia Solons Commends Dulles

RICHMOND, Va. (AP) — The Virginia General Assembly commended former Secretary of State John Foster Dulles Thursday "for his conscientious devotion to the interests of the country."

A joint resolution of the House and Senate praised Dulles for his efforts to protect freedom and expressed the hope his successors may "be endowed with the dignity, fortitude and steadfastness of him whose every act defined the patriot and the statesman."

TREMOR HITS VIRGINIA

Sweeping Changes Set In KU Math Department

Parents of eighth graders and freshmen in city schools are receiving notification of sweeping changes contemplated for the mathematics department of Klamath Union High School this week.

They are asked to confer with their youngsters and to choose mathematics courses they want them to take next fall.

Members of the department have devised a way to allow students a wider latitude of choice, to give slow learners a good math grounding and to give bright students higher math training never before given in KUHS.

Howard Bailey, KUHS math instructor, who got the ball rolling on the proposed program, said the freshman year will be a decisive one for math students.

They will be tested while they are still in the eighth grade and judged from math grades for the year. Then they will be advised, but not forced, into one of three freshman math classes.

Good students may go straight into basic algebra. Or, if they choose, they can take the program's keystone class, a bright-eyed, up general mathematics course. Poor math students will be required to take, either in their freshman or sophomore year, a basic arithmetic course.

Bailey said he and Instructor Don Ross will write a general math course this summer. A big

portion of it will be devoted to teaching why figures don't lie, as well as the simple fact that they don't.

During its four semesters, the course will also acquaint students with algebra, geometry, simple trigonometry, logarithms, simple logic and use of slide rule.

It will be designed to increase the student's interest in mathematics. Bailey says he believes many apt pupils become bored with basic math as it is and at times is just a "rehash" of what they have learned before, and consequently, many of them drop math as soon as possible.

Students, under the new system, can swing from lower to higher math with ease. Good students could finish high school with advanced math, advanced algebra and some trigonometry behind them.

The proposed system is based on studies made by the Oregon Department of Education that Bailey picked up last summer while attending Oregon State College on a National Science Foundation scholarship, and on many other studies made recently throughout the nation.

Another feature of the new design is that sections for slow and fast learners in like courses will be eliminated. Thus, grading will be toughened up a little for advanced math students, and grading can be based strictly on achievement.

Under the section system, a student who did good work in a slow section of geometry, for instance, might get the same grade and the same credit as a student in the fast section, although he learned considerably less.
