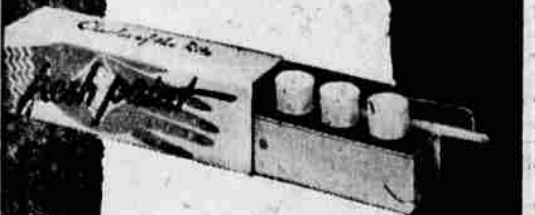

Mrs. Gubser, who is assistant superintendent of the Oregon State Department of Education, in charge of special services, is an outstanding speaker and an authority on many phases of education.

In her stimulating talk, Mrs. Gubser explained the many qualities that must be present in the gifted child, and most often recognition of such qualities requires special testing facilities. Although there are only a few hundred

such youngsters in the whole state, they do not seem to come from any one particular type of family background. While the education of the academically gifted child is still in the experimental stages, the three methods used are enrichment of the regular curriculum, accelerating the learning schedule or setting up the special class. Moderation and judgment must be used in planning a program for such children, and above all, the rights of the children must be given first consideration.

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
