DUNSMUIR—Siskiyou County residents will have a chance to see a solar battery, tiny transistors and have direct long distance phone dialing explained to them by visiting the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company trailer during its visit to this area, Floyd Dill, local P.T.&T. manager, announced.

Exhibits and displays of a scientific nature in the field of communication will be explained in a 20 to 30 minute lecture to trailer visitors. The trailer will be at the Montague school on May 4, at the Mount Shasta Elementary School on May 5, at Grenada on May 6 and at Hornbrook on May 7. Tours for school children will be specially arranged, Dill said, but the public is welcome also.

Appearance of the trailer has been slated in communities where the telephone offices are small and without complex equipment, Dill said. Advances in communication are explained from time to time via "open houses" at the larger exchanges.

PT&T Tells Cable Work

DUNSMUIR—Relocation of three and one-half miles of local exchange cable is underway south of Dunsmuir by the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company, Floyd Dill, manager of the Dunsmuir and Yreka phone company offices, has announced. This relocation, made necessary by the construction of the Highway 99 freeway, primarily effects the telephone circuits between Dunsmuir and Castella. It will be completed in June and will require about 1400 man hours of work, Dill said, costing the phone company about \$15,000. A second and more complex relocation job is expected to get underway next week. This is the moving of 2,000 feet of A and B toll cables and the coaxial cable, all providing interstate phone service and television sound communication. This is estimated as a \$13,000 project and will require 2900 man hours of work, Dill said. The complexity of the second project is the tapping and splicing of the multiple circuits of the interstate service without interrupting its continuity. Bill Lancaster is foreman of both jobs. Rights of way for the project were purchased this winter, Dill said, Cable laying in the Sacramento job is a tricky undertaking, he concluded, because of the narrowness of the canyon and a terrain that varies from solid rock to extremely unstable clay.

District Hikes Chief's Salary

DORRIS—The salary of Jere E. Hurley, superintendent of the Siskiyou Union High School District, has been raised from \$15,000 to \$18,000 a year by the board of trustees and Hurley agreed to stay on for another year but declined to accept a three-year contract. He said he is thinking of practicing law. His son, Jere Jr., opened a law office in Yreka in March. The elder Hurley has a doctor of philosophy degree in Jurisprudence. The trustees also raised teachers' salaries \$100. In addition, each teacher who remains will advance a \$200 step. Principals' salaries were raised \$600 in addition to the annual step. Principals' salaries in the district's seven schools now range from \$7,400 at Fort Jones to a high of \$10,300 at McCloud. Charles R. Green, McCloud principal, has the longest tenure in the district. There are four or five generations of boll weevils during a season.

Wagon Train Raided Again

ROSSVILLE, Kan. (AP)—There hasn't been much boredom for the "Oregon or Bust" wagon train thus far in its journey across Kansas. Originally the schedule called for one mock Indian raid in Nebraska but already the caravan has had at least three. The most authentic—with genuine Pottawatomie Indians—came Friday. Eleven braves, wearing war paint and brandishing weapons, charged the seven wagons at Silver Lake. School children, dismissed for the occasion, cheered the reenactment of a scene that might have occurred 100 years ago on the old Oregon Trail. The wagons are following the trail's route as part of Oregon's centennial celebration. The train will rest over Sunday after a short seven-mile haul to St. Mary's. The Robert Burns monument at Barre, Vt., is conceded to be one of the finest pieces of granite sculpture in the world.
