THE BUREAU OF PRISONS, federal agency which has had control over 44 buildings under fence at Newell, part of the old U.S. Army headquarters at the Jap Camp, is stripping the buildings of all furnishings including mess equipment and beds. Some equipment has been left in buildings since camp closed and the army pulled out in 1946.
