

Oregon Tech Track Squad Downs SOC In Dual Contest

Coach George Miller's Oregon Tech track squad, trailing by three points with six events remaining, swept all three places in both the 100-yard hurdles and the two-mile run to pull away to a 74-57 victory in a dual meet with Southern Oregon College on Modoc Field Saturday afternoon.

Rain fell throughout the first 30 minutes of the meet but then quit with the remainder of the events being held under threatening skies.
Coach Miller's prediction this past week that "the meet will be decided from the second and third place winners," proved to be exact. Ore Tech garnered eight first places to SOC's seven while the Owls copped nine seconds and eight thirds to the Red Raiders' five seconds and six thirds.
Dick Hoevar swept through both hurdle events, winning the highs with a time of 15.2 while snaring the lows in 26 seconds flat. The OTT hurdler also came through in the 220-yard dash with a second place and in the 100-yard

dash by grabbing a third. The other double winner for the Owls was Roger Moreland in the mile and two-mile events. Moreland, showing amazing endurance in both events, broke the tape in the mile with a time of 4:58.1 and crossed the finish line in the two-mile in a time of 11:33.5. SOC's Jack Johnson put on a late surge in the mile event but Moreland picked up speed to win by 10 yards. The Ore Tech distance ace finished the two-mile by more than one lap ahead of his nearest foe, however.

Little Leon Wilson snared first in the 100-yard dash, barely nipping SOC's Clarence Baker at the finish in a race which saw all five entrants cross the last stripe within 10 feet of each other.
Another Owl "little man," Norm Sawyer, put on a strong stretch drive to win the 880. Charles Swingle of the Red Raiders was close at Sawyer's heels until the final turn when the latter put on his strong finishing kick.

Other first place winners for the Owls were Frank Wilson in the shot put with a heave of 44 feet, 11 inches and William Hanson in the pole vault with a leap of 10 feet, 6 inches. Owl Paul Layher placed second behind Wilson in the shot while Pedro Colley of Southern Oregon was third. Jack Kopacz and Larry Derry, both of the Red Raiders, trailed Hanson in the pole vault.
Colley, the ex-Klamath Union shot and discus ace, won the discus event over Dale Perkins and Al Everson, both of OTT, with a heave of 126 feet, 5 1/2 inches.
Southern Oregon's Clarence Baker grabbed first in the 220-yard dash with Hoevar second and Leon Wilson of Ore Tech third.
Ex-Medford prep ace Elton Francis tossed the javelin 171 feet to nab top honors in that event.
SOC's Dick Callender swept through the high jump with a leap of 5 feet, 6 inches while Ore Tech's Ardell Hamilton and the visitor's Byron Kile tied for second place.
In the final event of the afternoon, the mile relay, the Raider's Stuart Baker, running the sec-

ond leg for the visitors, picked up enough of a lead over Ore Tech's Brendon Herber that it was enough for the Southern Oregon team to hold until the finish.

At the risk of belaboring a point... It appears that there are some misunderstandings concerning the relationship of the Klamath Falls Little League, Inc., the South Suburban Little League and the Little League Ball Park Benefit, et al.

Perhaps I can clear the air on a point or two... First, the money nestled in the bank under the account name of "Little League Ball Park Benefit" is strictly community property. No, repeat, no organization has any claim on it. The money is to be used solely for the construction of a community Little League Ball Park and so far as I or anyone who may have contributed to the fund is concerned, the word "community" means just that.

Every little league in our area, be he connected with the Klamath Falls Little League, the South Suburban, or any one of the number of additional Little Leagues that will spring up here in the very near future, will get an equal opportunity to use the intended ball park, so far as sensible area, time and scheduling can provide.

Second... Many people may be confused as to why there must be a separate organization started to accommodate new little leaguers. The answer to that is simple... National Little League Association rules insist that there may be only six teams in any one given Little League. Six teams provide room for only 90 boys. We have many times that number of lads who wish to play... and have every right to expect to do so. In order to take care of these youngsters' hopes a new league had to be formed. And believe me, next season there will be more new leaguers.

Third... So far as the news media and those adults who have the welfare of the kids at heart in planning recreation activities are concerned there is but one distinction between the two existing Little League groups... The Klamath Falls Little League is 1 year older than the newcomer... That's all... and this age differential means just one thing, the KF LL is eligible, just this year, to participate in national sanctioned tournaments... The SS LL will gain this status next year.

Fourth... and this refers back to the first point... It requires the signatures of at least two of three prominent Klamath Falls men, Bob Bonney, Freeman (Pat) Murray, and Jack Kemmler on any check written on the "ball park" account... and they can not act except on the order of a seven-man commission controlling this action.

So... Play Ball.
Another \$200 plus got into the bank for the Little League Ball Park account by a rather devious route Saturday afternoon. It's one thing for a group of adults to agree on one particular goal; it's quite another when you can get a team of trophy-hungry burros to agree on the subject. And if you don't believe this, check with George Thomas. Thomas went all out to provide a typical Jacksonville gold rush parade for the Lucky Lanes bowlers who wished to add their voices and money to the Little League project. Things went fine until the donkeys decided they preferred not to travel down Main Street to the bank. Thomas took measures to have the mules picked up and transported to another bank. So... guess what, and the mules decided to move. And if you don't think a pair of burros can kick plans a-gley... just ask Thomas... CINCINNATI (AP)—The Cincinnati Reds overcame two jinxes at once Saturday as they knocked Warren Spahn out of the box and then held on for a 7-6 victory over the Milwaukee Braves. The Braves threatened to pull the game out of the fire in the ninth when Eddie Mathews hit a two-run homer.
They had two more men on base when Del Crandall fled out to end the game.
Going into Saturday's game Spahn had a 51-15 lifetime record against the Reds and had beaten them 6 straight times. As a team, the Braves had won 36 of 43 games from Cincinnati during 1957, 1958 and this year.
Johnny Temple, who rarely hits for distance, had a two-run homer for Cincinnati and Bill Bruton, along with Mathews, had a home run for the Braves. Frank Thomas had four hits for Cincinnati.
The setback was the first of the season for Spahn and the victory went to Tom Aker, second of three Cincinnati pitchers.

Klamath Union Baseball Squad Posts Two Wins Over Ashland

ASHLAND — A pair of tight pitching duels highlighted a doubleheader between the Klamath Union Pelicans and the Ashland Grizzlies here Saturday afternoon. Pel Blake Griggs nudged a one-hit shutout against Ashland in the opener which went eight innings before the visitors could score the only run of the contest. Both squads scored all of their tallies in the fifth and final inning before the Pelicans emerged the victors, 2-1, in the second tilt.

Griggs struck out 10 and walked four in his brilliant hurling stint which followed up his identical one-hit shutout he tossed against Yreka last weekend.
Klamath scored the only run of the game in the top of the eighth on a single by second sacker Steve Binney, a hit batsman and a timely single by sophomore center fielder Rich Dewep.
The only safety for Ashland in the first contest came in the third stanza when Griggs' counterpart,

Allan MacKinnis, rapped a single. Griggs was never in any serious trouble as he retired the last 16 batters in a row.
In the second tilt, the Pelicans scored first in the top half of the fifth after the first two Pelis were retired on Bob Yuncck's single, a stolen base by Yuncck, Rich Dewep's single, three errors on the part of the Grizzlies and another base hit by Griggs.
Ashland almost erupted in the bottom half of the final inning as Mike Brewer walked and pinch-hitter Steve Stewart did likewise to send Pel pitcher Bob Wilkinson to the showers. Another Ashland pinchhitter, Brade Getting, was whiffed by reliever Paul Bishop but Harley Dickerson drove in Brewer with a single.
Bob Johnson was walked intentionally and Grizzly catcher Phil Tucker lofted a fly ball to Griggs in left. Griggs dropped the ball for an error but rifled his throw to third baseman Larry Bunyard, who tagged out Dickerson, who was attempting to advance to third on Griggs' error.
However, Johnson had remained on third despite the Pelican run but started for the dugout, thinking the game had been over as a result of teammate Dickerson being tagged out. Bunyard immediately tagged Johnson out to bring a surprising close to the ball game.
Wilkinson gave up a long single to Tucker in the second inning while walking a total of four and striking out six before being relieved by Bishop in the near-fatal fifth.
