Los Angeles Leading NL; Orioles Take Two From NY

United Press International — Paul Richards says the sky is the limit for his Baltimore Orioles and who's going to argue with him after a week-end sweep that has the New York Yankees off to their worst start in five years?

Richards had a right to crow a bit Sunday because his Orioles swept a doubleheader from the Yankees, 5-4 and 3-2, and thus dumped the world champions into the second division. With seven losses in 13 games, the Yankees have made their poorest start since 1954 — when they failed to win the American League pennant.

The Orioles themselves are tied with the Chicago White Sox for second place one game behind the Cleveland Indians. The White Sox cooled off the Indians Sunday by beating them, 6-5 and 5-2, as Earl Wynn and Billy Pierce doubled in spades as pitching and hitting heroes.

The Washington Senators edged the Boston Red Sox, 2-1, and the Kansas City Athletics edged the floundering Detroit Tigers, 4-3, in the other American League games. The Los Angeles Dodgers took over first place with a 17-11 win over the St. Louis Cardinals, the Cincinnati Reds out-slugged the Milwaukee Braves, 11-10, the San Francisco Giants beat the Chicago Cubs, 3-2, and the Philadelphia Phillies bounced back from a 9-2 loss to down the Pittsburgh Pirates, 10-5, in National League activity.

Orioles 5-3, NY 4-2 — The Orioles, who won a three-game series at Yankee Stadium for the first time in their history, pushed over two runs in the ninth inning to take the first game and then got a dazzling knuckleball performance from Hoyt Wilhelm in the nightcap. Along the way, Richards also managed to "out-think" Casey Stengel by tossing 20 players into the opener and also bunting on the wet grass after a 16-minute interruption caused by rain.

Jim Finigan tied the opener with a ninth-inning pinch single and Brooks Robinson then singled home the decisive run to beat Whitey Ford in relief. Wilhelm was the whole show in the nightcap, limiting the Yankees to five hits and striking out eight while scoring his second straight win. Wilhelm's knucklers were working so well that Baltimore catcher Gus Triandos tied an American League record by being charged with four passed balls.

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Manager Benching Regulars

MILWAUKEE (AP) — Manager Fred Haney, bristling after his Milwaukee Braves surrendered the National League lead to Los Angeles, benched shortstop Johnny Logan and left fielder Wes Covington for tonight's game against the Chicago Cubs.

Haney also said first baseman Joe Adcock may ride the bench if the Cubs pitch a right-hander. Left-hander Bob Smith was the Chicago probable.

"All I want is for the players to play up to their potential, and some of them haven't," said an angry Haney as the Braves flew back from Cincinnati where they were defeated 11-10 by the Redlegs Sunday.

The loss dropped the Braves into second place, a half game behind the Los Angeles Dodgers. They have a 7-4 record and are 36 percentage points ahead of the third-place San Francisco Giants.

"Among other things," Haney went on, "Covington and Logan aren't hitting as well as we expected. On double plays we are giving them an 'ante-over' deal." He meant there is no zip in the double play effort by the Milwaukee infield.

"We should have won all three games we lost on the road," Haney declared. "We ran the bases like fraidy cats, we couldn't make cinch double plays and singles were played into doubles and triples by the opposition."

Logan said: "I don't know anything about it. I'm going to get some sleep and go out there tomorrow and see what the situation is. He's the manager."

Logan is hitting .171. Covington has a .229 average. Adcock — who shares first base with Frank Torre — has a .286 average.

Haney said veteran Andy Pafko probably would be in left tonight and Joe Morgan or Felix Mantilla would go to short, with rookie Chuck Cottier playing second.

Cincinnati's victory marked the first time since September 1956 that the Reds have beaten Milwaukee twice in as many days.

Two National League records were equaled as 14 pitchers saw action, eight of them Reds.

A major league record was established when Red reliever Wildard Schmidt was hit twice by a pitched ball in the same inning — the third when Cincinnati chased over six runs.

Milwaukee starter Lew Burdette hit him the first time and Bob Rush, Milwaukee's third hurler did it the second.

London, Patterson Go Friday

Call it a "tuneup," "warmup," "slaughter," or what you will, when heavyweight champion Floyd Patterson and Britain's burly Brian London step into the ring at Indianapolis Friday night it will be for the world title.

If the lantern-jawed Briton, a 10-1 underdog, gets lucky and beats Patterson, he will be the new champion. Into the discard will go the million-dollar-plus Patterson-Ingram title scrap set for June 25 at New York's Yankee Stadium.

Major upsets have happened before in heavyweight title fights. Jim Braddock was a lowly regarded 10-1 shot when he outboxed Max Baer for the title 24 years ago, and old Jersey Joe Walcott was held at 6-1 in 1951 when he flattened Ezzard Charles in the seventh round.

London was lucky enough in just getting the pay day. Henry Cooper whipped him in a bloody fight in London last Jan. 12 for the British and British Empire titles and was all set to get the crack at Patterson. Cooper's manager, Jim Wicks, doubled his price from \$70,000 to \$140,000 and Cus D'Amato, Patterson's manager, ruled him out.

So D'Amato hand-picked London who was more than happy to get a purse of \$50,000 plus the shot at the crown. Patterson may grab close to \$200,000.

NBC still will broadcast and telecast (9 p.m., EST) with the Indianapolis area blacked out.

Patterson will be making his fourth defense of the crown he won by stiffening old Archie Moore in the fifth round at Chicago, Nov. 30, 1956. In order his victims, by knockouts, were Hurricane Jackson, 10, July 29, 1957; Pete Rademacher, 6, Aug. 22, 1957; and Roy Harris, 12, Aug. 18, 1958. Rademacher and Harris each floored the champ before being finished off.

So in four title fights, including Moore, Floyd, a 6-foot, 185-pounder has scored four knockouts. He has racked up kayos in 15 of his last 16 fights and has a winning streak of 21. His record is 34-1, including 25 kayos.

London, a 6-foot, 200-pounder, insists he has a good chance to surprise everyone.

"If Rademacher and Harris can knock Patterson down, I can knock him out, says Brian.

A pro four years, the husky Briton has a 22-4 record including 19 kayos.

J. Dennis was the only harness driver to win two straight features at Yonkers Raceway last season. He scored with Model Heir in the Summer Festival trot and with W. D. Direct in the Blue Ribbon Pace.

Sacramento Leads PCL By Full Game

The booming bat of Al Heist hoisted Sacramento into a full game lead in the Pacific Coast standings Sunday as the Solons swept a doubleheader from Spokane, 4-3 and 6-3.

Heist's sharp double drove in the winning run in the 17-inning opener and in the nightcap his first inning single brought in two runs to get the Solons on the scoring track.

Elsewhere around the circuit, Vancouver and San Diego split with the Canadians taking the

opener, 7-0 and dropping the second game, 8-1. A six-run sixth inning gave Phoenix an 8-4 victory over Seattle, while the Portland-Salt Lake City doubleheader was rained out.

Sacramento, hardly given a second glance by the pre-season experts, proved they have the will to win over the long haul. Their 3-1 lead wiped out in the ninth, the Solons hung on for 7 1/2 innings. With two out in the home half of the 17th, Heist's double brought in Mike Kranich with the winning tally.

In the shortened nightcap, the Solons got two runs in the first, a pair in the second and singles in the fourth and fifth, then held a seventh inning Spokane rally to two runs.

At San Diego, the Padres committed four bobbles and Vancouver cashed in on six unearned runs in the first contest. Although Mountie pitcher Bred Besana had trouble with his control, three double plays helped hand the Pads their first shutout of the season.

It was a different story in the nightcap as southpaw Bill Werle held the Mounties to seven hits while his teammates pushed across four runs in the first and four more in the third inning.

The Phoenix Giants, last season's league leaders, found their power in the sixth inning to down the Rainiers.

The uprising climaxed two minor skirmishes. Seattle manager Fred Hutchinson and player-coach Peanut Lowrey were ejected in the fifth for protesting a called third strike on Lowrey. Then Rainier pitcher Max Surkont and Sal Taormina started to mix it up in the sixth when a Surkont pitch hit Taormina.

The Giants loaded the bases then Bill Wilson hit a double. With the bases loaded for a second time, John Orsino whacked out a homer to clinch the win.
