India's Prime Minister Invites Reds To Visit Lama

MUSSOORIE, India (AP) — Prime Minister Nehru Saturday invited Chinese Communist representatives and their puppet ruler of Tibet, the Panchen Lama, to visit the Dalai Lama at his refuge here in north India.

Nehru said he hoped the Dalai Lama, Tibet's 23-year-old spiritual and temporal ruler, would return to Lhasa, the Tibetan capital. It was an obvious bid to reconcile the Red Chinese government and the Tibetan god-king, who fled from Communist domination of his homeland.

The Indian Prime Minister made his peace overture in an impromptu news conference two hours before meeting with the Dalai Lama. Nehru arrived from New Delhi earlier today.

"I will welcome the Panchen Lama to come and meet the Dalai Lama and whomsoever he likes," said Nehru.

The Prime Minister said "the door is open" for the Chinese ambassador to India or any high

representative of the Peiping government to see the Tibetan executive, who has set up headquarters in exile in a large mansion in this Himalayan hill station.

Nehru has refused to condemn the Chinese Communists for the repression of the Tibetan rebellion. But he has said India's sympathies are with the Tibetans and that autonomy, or local self-government, is the only ultimate solution for the situation in Tibet.

Nehru also made clear to the newsmen that he hopes the Dalai Lama would say nothing to upset further relations between India and the Red Chinese, already strained by the widespread Indian sympathy for the Tibetan rebels.

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Crater Lake Supervisor Announces New Personnel

CRATER LAKE NATIONAL PARK—Fred J. Novak of Sequoia and Kings Canyon National Parks, California, has been appointed assistant superintendent; George Cooksey of Fort Chaffee, Arkansas, has entered duty in the park as plumber, and Herbert Gerald of Anchorage, Alaska, has been selected as mechanic's helper at Crater Lake National Park, according to announcement today by Park Superintendent Thomas J. Williams.

Novak has a record with the National Park Service which began in Glacier National Park, Montana, as a seasonal telephone-operator-stenographer in 1935. He served two years with the U.S. Army Engineers at Fort Peck, Montana in 1936 and 1937 and then returned to Glacier National Park as warehouseman, Williams said. He advanced to assistant

clerk, and clerk there, and in 1943, transferred to Death Valley National Monument, California as chief clerk. Following two years with the U.S. Navy in 1945-46 he returned to the National Park Service as chief clerk at Bryce and Zion Canyon National Parks, Utah in 1947. In 1952 he transferred to Sequoia-Kings Canyon National Parks where he worked as administrative assistant until his promotion and transfer to Crater Lake. The effectiveness of Novak's work while at Sequoia was recognized and he was awarded superior performance on the job accompanied with a cash award of \$350, in July 1958.

Novak and his wife, Elizabeth, have three children, Fred Jr., 17, Patsy, 16, and Kay Marie, 5. The family will remain in California until the end of the school year when they will join Novak at Crater Lake.

George Cooksey fills the plumber position which has been vacant since July 1958, Williams said. Cooksey, a native of Van Buren, Arkansas, served two years with the U.S. Navy during World War II. Following his discharge he worked for a butane company in Sallisaw, Oklahoma until 1951. He worked as a civilian plumber for the U.S. Army at Fort Chaffee, Arkansas for two years, and from 1953 to 1956 was employed by a construction company in Fresno, California. He returned to Fort Chaffee in 1958 where he remained as plumber until his assignment at Crater Lake.

Cooksey is accompanied by his wife, Emogene, and their three sons, Frank, 9, Billy, 4½, and Tommy, 2½.

Gerald has filled the new mechanic's helper position at the machine shop as a part of the Mission 66 staffing program, designed to increase the national park system's efficiency in its service to the public, Williams said.

Prior to his appointment at Crater Lake, Gerald was foreman at the jet engine shop at Elmendorf Air Force Base, Anchorage, Alaska, where he has worked during the past 13 years. Prior to that he was employed at the Kodiak Naval Air Station two years, Pensacola Air Station two years, and 13 years in automotive repairs in New York, New Jersey and Miami, Williams said.

The Gerald's have a son, Bill, who is employed at KIRO-TV in Seattle.
