### Burns Injure Weed Chief

WEED—Roland (Bud) Riley, 47, Weed volunteer fire chief and Weed police commissioner, is reported in satisfactory condition this morning in Mount Shasta Community Hospital where he is undergoing treatment for severe burns.

Harvey E. Gilman Jr., about 35, burned in the same accident, was treated at the hospital and released. Riley was working as electrical foreman at the Weed Long-Bell Division of International Paper Company, assisted by Gilman, attempting to dismantle one of the main switches in the power plant. They were working during the Monday noon plant shutdown.

### Businessmen Plan Program

A program to help small business firms obtain a greater share of sales of government-owned timber and related products by setting aside certain proposed sales exclusively for small business competitive bidding will be inaugurated May 1, John G. Barnett, Portland, branch manager of the Small Business Administration announced today.

The new program is a direct outgrowth of a three-way cooperative agreement between the SBA, the Forest Service of the Department of Agriculture and the Bureau of Land Management of the Department of the Interior.

Barnett said that under this new program the SBA will initiate joint set-asides for purchase of government-owned timber by small business concerns after a review by the agency of the cutting and sales programs of the Forest Service and the Bureau of Land Management. Final sales determinations, however, will rest with the latter two agencies.
