

Challenger's Right, Odds Do Not Agree

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Does Britain's Brian London have any kind of a chance to take away Floyd Patterson's heavyweight title Friday night?

The odds makers (10 to 1) say no. The experts from Britain and the United States say no. But London's right hand booms out a yes.

We had our first look at the six-foot, 205-pound British husky in action Tuesday. We were surprised by his style and the speed of his punching, especially with right uppercuts and straight rights.

The former British champion is supposed to be a brawling, American-type battler with little finesse. That's not what we saw, although you can't go by a two-round boxing workout.

London fights mostly from a stand-up, flat-footed stance. He does very little crouching. He doesn't bore in but he moves in

County Schools Set Meet

In the Klamath Falls invitation, al meet last Saturday, which was what could be called a "warm-up" for the county meet, several squad members from each of the schools turned in fine performances against Klamath Union, also entered in the invitation.

Merrill's John Haskins and Bill Beasley sparked for the Huskies in the sprints while Charles Rolter gave KU's Bob Drace a workout in the hurdle events. Sophomore Bruce Brickner will enter the high jump for the Merrill crew while Bud Maupin will go in the broad jump. Huskies David Andrieu and Marvin Barnes will enter the shot put and 880 respectively.

Malin will have Abe Kirkpatrick entered in the broad jump and the 100 yard dash. Kirkpatrick won the broad jump last Saturday while placing fifth in the 100. Other Mustangs entering will be Rick Illian, who placed second in the javelin, Ron Mullanix in both the shot put and discus and little Don Micka in the half mile.

Dave Ragland of Henley will compete in both the 100 and 220 while mates Phil Swisher who copped last week's discus event, Burrell Guber, Bob Chapman and Cliff Long will also be entered in the meet. Guber will take part in the hurdles along with Chapman while Long will enter both the 440 and 880.

Chiloquin will have Don Say in the sprints, Ron Hoggarth in both the hurdles and shot put, Paul Harris and Mike Ochoa in the javelin and Lyle Hall in the discus. Harris also will compete in the 880. Heading the list from Bonanza will be Chester Schooler in the discus and broad jump and Jim O'Connor in the mile and pole vault.

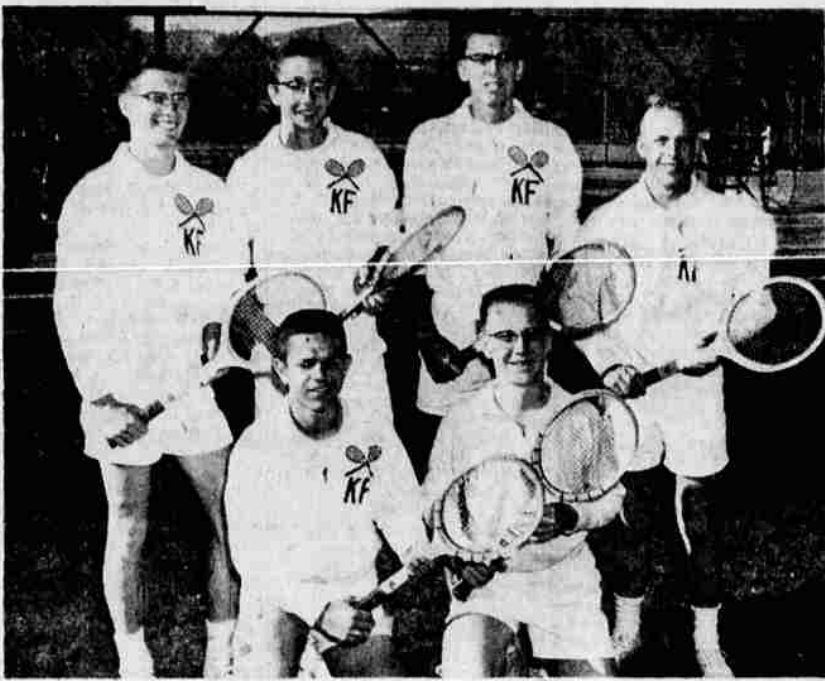

Denny Peterson, the Oregon sophomore, and Ernie Wheeler, Washington's excellent relief man, top the league in victories with a pair each and there are four others with 1-0 records.

Most of the team experienced trouble collecting base hits again last week as the pitchers tossed three shutouts and gave up only one run in two other games. Oregon's hurlers have been the toughest, allowing their opposition only 10 runs in four games and a .183 batting average.

Peterson tops the pitchers in strikeouts with 14 allowing 2.00 earned runs per game. Three of the all-winning pitchers, Wheeler, Clayton Smith of the Beavers and Earle Irvine of the Huskies, have not allowed an earned run yet. Snyder and Grinn Mason of the Beavers top the league in runs batted in with seven each and Mason also leads in home runs with a pair.

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Owls Drop Rubber Game To SOC Red Raiders, 9-2

ASHLAND—Revenge was sweet for the Red Raiders as they bounced the Ore Tech Owls 9-2 in an Oregon Collegiate Conference baseball game played on the Ashlanders' home ground Tuesday afternoon.

Raider pitcher, Dave D'Olivo, who was charged with a defeat in a relief role the last time the SOC nine met the Techmen in Klamath Falls got even in uncertain terms as he held the Owls to but three hits, all singles and walked only two, allowing just two OTI runs despite four errors committed behind him.

Owl Leroy Rauch, who gained the victory over D'Olivo the last time out, was reached for 10 hits, including a home run by Ashland's Phil Sward, a triple by D'Olivo and a double by Raider first-sacker Larry Maurer. Rauch walked six Raiders and fanned two

and wasn't a bit aided by six Owl miscues in the field.

The Techmen were led at the plate by Allan Leach, first base, Richardson, centerfielder, and Jack Brooks, relief second baseman who each contributed a single. Sward, SOC rightfielder, Maurer and Gordie Carrigan each batted out a pair of hits.

The Raiders broke the ice in the first stanza as leadoff man Jim Dietz, second base, got aboard off the first Owl error and then scored on Maurer's sacrifice.

In the third another SOC run scored off the combination of a walk and a pair of consecutive base knocks. Again in the fifth they tallied two off a pair of OTI errors and a single.

The Raiders fell on the Owls in the seventh after they had scored a pair of runs off a Raider miscue coupled with Richardson's double and a towering fly to center field by Brooks.

In the bottom of the fateful stanza the Raiders enjoyed five free passes, one Owl error and a home run by Phil Sward. The SOC nine batted around once and started over before the storm finally subsided with a high fly to left-fielder Stan Glass for the third out.

In the top of the eighth D'Olivo walked the first two men to face him but stopped any threat of an Owl uprising as he picked Glass off second base for the first out then struck out Gary Ehrmantrout and Leach in order.

The top of the ninth proved fruitless for the Techmen as the bottom of the Owl roster went out in order.

The victory put the Raiders out of reach on the top of the OCC league ladder. The Owls face their next action Saturday, May 2, in Gem Stadium when they host the
