

Phil Moyer, Bahama Face TV Cameras

PORTLAND (AP)—Once-beaten Phil Moyer seeks to vault into the center of the middleweight title chase through his scheduled 10-round bout with Yama Bahama here Wednesday night.

Moyer, 21, older brother of sixth-ranked welterweight Denny Moyer, said yesterday, "After a TV fight, you're more or less known. A lot of offers start coming in."

The fight will be televised nationally at 6 p.m. (PST) and will be seen, too, on local TV screens. Promoter Tommy Moyer said that despite this, he expects some 3,000 fans to be on hand in the 3,500-seat Portland Armory to watch his nephew and Bahama, a tough trial horse veteran of several TV fights.

Both are expected to weigh in at about 150 pounds.

It was in a TV fight that brother Denny gained top 10 ranking by taking a close decision from Gaspar Ortega.

Phil's only loss has been to Peter Mueller of Germany. He has been held to one draw, by veteran Luther Rawlings. His other 14 fights have resulted in victories.

Bahama was established as a favorite here. But Moyer was quietly confident.

"I've been training a bit more than a month for this fight," he said. "I've been wanting it for a long time. I think I can beat him."

Bahama, 26, from Bimini in the British West Indies, has a big edge in experience. In 63 fights he has 53 victories, 2 draws and 8 defeats.

Bahama worked out Tuesday while Moyer rested at home.

KU Jayvees Top Trojans

The Klamath Union Jayvee baseball squad picked up its 11th victory of the season against a single defeat Tuesday afternoon by dropping the Sacred Heart Trojans, 7-5, in a seven inning contest on Modoc Field, behind the combined hurling efforts on the part of sophomore John Webb and junior Paul Bishop.

Webb worked the first four innings and Bishop tossed the final three, each struck out eight Trojan batters while yielding a total of five hits between themselves.

Jackson picked up a pair of the Trojans' base hits in three official trips, one on a long double into the canal. Third baseman George Hurley also had a duo of hits for SHA, both singles.

Bob Lapsley and Ken Womer each had a pair of hits for the winners. Lapsley garnering two singles while Womer had a double to his credit. Webb got the longest hit of the afternoon when he poled a triple to left field in the fifth inning.

Weather, Senators Get Nods In Majors

If today's pennant race standings aren't enough to convince you that this is most unusual year in the American League, take a stab at naming the three pitchers in the league who have won as many as three games so far.

The AL has more aces than a pinocchio deck—Billy Pierce, Dick Donovan, Herb Score, Cal McLish, Boon Turley, Whitey Ford, Frank Lary, Jim Bunning and Jack Harshman, to name a few.

But the three who have won three are Washington's Pete Ramos and Russ Kemmerer and Kansas City's Bob Grim. Each is 3-1.

Ramos had a 14-18 record last season for the last place Senators. Kemmerer was 6-15. Grim had a 7-7 record split between the New York Yankees and seventh place A's.

Kemmerer, who at 25 became a full-time starting pitcher for the first time last season, put away his third in a row Tuesday night at Kansas City, beating the A's 8-3 with an eight-hitter while the Senators skipped past Boston and New York into fifth place.

It was the only game played in the majors. Rain and cold idled New York at Chicago, Boston at Cleveland and Baltimore at Detroit in the American and Chicago at Milwaukee, San Francisco at Philadelphia and St. Louis at Cincinnati in the National. Los Angeles and Pittsburgh weren't scheduled.

Kemmerer, a 200-pound, 6-3 right-hander, continued to get the support he missed last year from his mates, who collected 14 hits.

Senators 8, KC 3

The Senators, now a half-game behind the fourth place A's, gave him a quick push to his second complete game performance, scoring three runs in the first. The first four men hit safely against Ray Herbert (1-1), with Roy Sievers singling home one run and Jim Lemon's double counting two.

They added three more in the sixth, two on Ron Samford's first major league homery and chased Herbert. It was also only the fifth extra base hit in the majors for shortstop Samford, who had been at bat 115 times over four seasons.

Kemmerer, who doubled in Washington's last two runs in the eighth, didn't walk a man and struck out three.

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Sacramento Whacks Portland Bevos, 9-5

The Sacramento Solons, swinging happily from atop the Pacific Coast baseball league, hammered out 14 hits Tuesday night to defeat Portland 9-5 and stay a full game in front of the PCL pack.

Spokane moved into a third-place tie with Salt Lake City by beating the Bees 13-5. San Diego used extra-base blows to remain within a game of the leaders, whipping Seattle 4-1. Vancouver rattled 13 hits off four Phoenix pitchers for a 16-6 victory.

Noel Mickelson posted his second win in three starts for the Solons, but it took Terry Fox's relief in the eighth to protect the victory. George Freese, who had hit a home run earlier, rapped into a double play to end the Beaver rally.

Jack Littrell also got a solo homer for Portland and Bob Perry got one for Sacramento.

Opening home runs by Charles Williams and Norm Sherry shocked Salt Lake and Spokane followed up with a 14-hit attack. Maury Wills, Tony Roig and Steve Bilko all went 3 for 5. The Bees crammed four of their runs into the fifth, with Sam Miley's double the only extra-base blow in the series.

Bud Podbielan allowed only six hits to the Rainiers as he registered his second win and kept his earned run average down to .64. The Padres pushed across three runs in the fourth as Podbielan beat out an infield hit, Rod Graeber doubled, Steve Jankowski walked and Mitch June tripled.

Ted Tappe registered Seattle's only run with his fourth homer of the season in the first.

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
