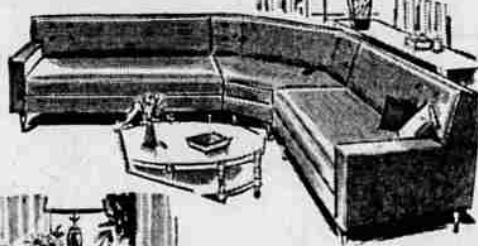
A capacity crowd attended the variety show which was composed of 24 acts including piano solos, guitar players, skits, singers, dancers and comedians.
