

### BSA Camping Schedule Set

Dick Wyatt, Klamath Boy Scout District Executive, and other scouting officials, have arranged a schedule for a series of summer camp weeks to be held for district scouts at Camp Makulla near Crescent Lake starting July 5.

The program will extend through August 15. During that period whole troops will attend camp for a week each. Wyatt says the camp is equipped to handle 10 or 11 scout units per week.

Activities include swimming, boating, canoeing, sailing and general work towards winning merit badges.

In addition 22 instructors will be on hand to supervise rifle, skeet and archery ranges, a conservation program and a scouting skills course.

Cost of the week per boy is \$16. It will be cut to \$15 if units register with Wyatt before July 1. The price covers food, lodging, insurance, cost of instruction—everything except incidentals such as 22 caliber ammunition for use on the gun ranges. The district charges a penny per shot on the range.

### Tariff Protest Receives Backing

TULELAKE—Senators and congressmen from Wisconsin and North Dakota have joined with lawmakers from Oregon, Idaho and California, in protesting expiration of the tariff on Alsike clover.

In a letter to the president, the group stated that in view of the conflicting positions taken by the administration and growers, the matter should be reviewed before the U.S. Tariff Commission and an impartial recommendation formulated by that body.

Cliff Jenkins, manager of the Tulelake Growers Association, said that though the Department of Agriculture's findings, regarding the Alsike clover seed imports, showed marketing conditions and injury to domestic producers questionable, a large percentage of the 1958 crops is still unsold here.

LAKEVIEW — A complete remodeling and modernization of the interior of the Lakeview Branch of First National Bank of Oregon will begin immediately, it was reported by Richard Proebstel, manager of the local bank.

Lakeview Building Materials Company has the contract for the remodeling. Fixtures will be provided and installed by Columbia Cabinet Company, Portland. Total cost of the renovation will be \$25,000. The work is scheduled to be completed on May 20, Proebstel said.

In addition to all new banking fixtures, the job includes new floor covering, modern recessed lighting, glass entrance doors, and complete redecoration of the interior.

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### Observers Differ Sharply On China Interpretation

HONG KONG (AP)—American, British and Chinese observers here agreed today the election of Liu Shao-chi as president of Red China means trouble.

But they split sharply on whether it means trouble for the West or for Communist China.

"Peiping is in trouble," an American diplomat said. "This means they are split wide open."

"We are in trouble," a British expert on China said. "Peiping is going to play tougher than ever now."

"There's going to be trouble," a Chinese observer predicted. "The Chinese people don't like Liu. We have not heard the last of it yet."

Peiping radio kept emphasizing that Mao Tze-tung was still the nation's hero and chief leader. Mao stepped down from the presidency but retained the most powerful job as head of the ruling Communist party. The broadcast was the beginning of the end for Mao.

Chinese Nationalist newspapers on Formosa speculated that the selection of Liu was a last-minute one dictated by Moscow because of the rebellion in Tibet.

The anti-Communist, pro-Nationalist Hong Kong Tiger Standard predicted in an editorial it

beating drums and gongs, dancing and singing, shouting praises to Mao Tze-tung.

Unofficial British opinion tended to agree with this appraisal.

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### Court Told Madness Fake

NEW YORK (UPI)—A 47-year-old man told a Brooklyn court Monday he had successfully faked insanity for 27 years to avoid trial for a 1932 burglary slaying.

For all those years he was a prisoner in the Matteawan State Hospital For The Criminal Insane, preferring its known horrors to the chance of death in the electric chair.

"In my opinion," Kings County Judge Samuel S. Leibowitz told him, "twenty-seven years in Matteawan is worse than a thousand years in Sing Sing."

William F. Dunn was apprehended after a gun battle with police who had surprised him and three accomplices breaking into a pawn shop. Two of the robbers and one policeman were killed. Dunn was wounded. The other man got away.

Dunn said he had fooled the lunacy examiners who had determined he was unable to stand trial because of insanity, and had continued to fool state psychiatrists until last month when they finally declared him sane.

Because witnesses were no longer available, he was permitted to plead guilty to first degree manslaughter, which carries a possible penalty of 20 years in jail.

Judge Leibowitz ordered him remanded to jail while he studies the record. He set no date for sentencing.

### Potato Council Help Sought

TULELAKE — With the potato diversion program scheduled to end on April 30, Basin farmers who are still holding a large amount of last year's crop, are looking to the National Potato Council for help.

Walt Jendrzewski of the Klamath Potato Growers Association is contacting Al Merker, president of the National Potato Council, to determine if any other potato producing areas are seeking an extension on the diversion program.

"If there are other areas, Klamath Basin and Tulelake farmers plan to pool their efforts to request the program be extended," said Cliff Jenkins, president of the Tulelake Growers Association.

### Worker's Car Singed By Fuel

A Klamath Falls carpenter's car was badly singed at 10:15 a.m. Tuesday at its parking spot at 1146 Pine Street.

Burning kerosene from a burst fuel line on a tank carrying roofing tar sprayed the car, owned by Edwin E. Brooks of 705 Wocus Street, and set it aflame.

Brooks is helping to remodel Melba's Beauty Salon, where the fire occurred. The tar had just been towed in by the All Type Roofing Company of Klamath Falls to use atop the beauty shop.

Klamath Falls firemen who put out the fire before the car was destroyed said workmen were igniting kerosene to heat up the tar so that it could be pumped to the roof and spread easily.

Paint on the station wagon's front was peeled away. The engine was scorched and upholstery was destroyed.
