In conjunction with the varsity tangle the KUHS frosh squad will hook into a three-way fray with North and South Grants Pass junior highs.

"This will be our toughest chore," warned Pel headman, Jim Inglesby, who returned to the practice field Wednesday after a brief encounter with the "bug." "We are going to take some sure firsts—but the Cavemen, because of their depth, could double our score handsily. It's almost a sure thing that some new marks will be set," he added.

Among the Pelican speedsters from whom big things are expected before the season is over is sprinter Don Story and hurdler Bob Drace. Both speedsters have turned in fine performances during practices this week. Story accomplished the 100-yard dash in the 10 flat area while Drace came with .1 of a second of the school low hurdle mark.

"Some real stiff competition could see both these boys come up with real races," noted Inglesby.

A cloud on the Pelican hopes for a good showing in both the mile and the half has been cast by the fact that 880-man Don Isensee is still suffering with an extremely painful case of "shin splints" while Ken Coffman, the top miler, is out of school now. Originally it had been planned by Inglesby and his assistant, Jack Peterson, that Coffman might fill in for Isensee in the half.

Johnny Logan and Wes Covington were the men Haney wanted to sit down.

Logan and Covington showed their "appreciation" by belting two-run homers Wednesday night in a 9-3 victory over the Cardinals that moved the Braves back atop the National League after a three-day lapse.

Haney announced he was going to bench both players when the Braves came back home from a losing road trip Sunday night. When two games were rained out this week, however, he changed his mind and let them stay in the line-up.

Phils 5, Dodgers 4

The Phillies came up with two runs in the ninth to beat Dodger southpaw Johnny Podres. Pinch-hitter Dave Philley's bloop single

with two out in the ninth drove in Bob Bowman with the winning run.

The victory moved Milwaukee into first place by percentage points over the Dodgers, who were beaten by the Phillies, 5-4. The Pirates nipped the Giants, 3-2, and the Reds crushed the Cubs, 18-8.

In the American League, the Yankees opened their Western invasion with a 5-2 victory over the White Sox; the Tigers ended a six-game losing streak with a 7-1 win over the Orioles in a game called at the end of five innings because of rain, and the Athletics outlasted the Senators, 7-6. The Boston-Cleveland night game was postponed because of rain.

Braves 9, Cards 3

For good measure, Hank Aaron contributed his fifth home run of the season along with three singles that boosted his league-leading average to .526, and Bill Bruton also homered. Backed by a 15-hit attack, Lew Burdette

brezzed to his fourth straight victory although he was clipped for 11 hits, including homers by Gino Cimoli and Bill White.

Bucs 3, Giants 2

Bill Mazeroski's home run capped a three-run rally in the seventh inning that gave the Pirates their victory over the Giants.

Reds 18, Cubs 8

The Reds shelled six Cub pitchers for 18 hits, including home runs by Frank Robinson, Gus Bell and Roy McMillan. Cincinnati turned the game into a rout with an eight-run rally in the second inning, during which 13 batters went to the plate.

Yanks 5, ChiSox 2

Three Yankee home runs proved the undoing of the flustered White Sox. Mickey Mantle got the Yanks off winging with a two-run homer in the first inning, Hank Bauer homered in the fifth, and Bill Skowron connected in the seventh.

Tigers 7, Orioles 1

Rookie Larry Osborne and Frank Lary steered the Tigers to their rain-abbreviated triumph over the Orioles, who suffered their first loss in five games. Osborne cracked out three hits in as many times up, including a two-run homer, while Lary gained his first win even though he gave

up seven hits in the five innings.

Athletics 7, Solons 6

The Senators ran afoul of too much Hector Lopez in their loss to the Athletics. After Washington tied the score at 6-6 with a three-run rally in the top of the ninth, Lopez drove in his fourth run of the game with a single that scored Bill Tuttle and proved the clincher.
