Flu Figures Told By Health Board

PORTLAND (AP)—Influenza and related diseases reached epidemic proportions in Oregon last week, the State Board of Health announced Tuesday.

The board said Oregon registered 31,204 to date this year, nearly seven times more than the total at this time last year.

The board said 5,553 cases reported last week was a sharp increase over the 4,363 cases the week before.

This is threatening to surpass Oregon's record of 6,585 cases in a single week, at the height of the 1957 Asian flu epidemic.

Phone Worker Attends Class

R. C. Bissel, switchman for Pacific Telephone, has been attending classes in Portland on the basic fundamentals of direct current, according to Manager T. W. Cole.

The two-week course deals with theoretical and applied principles of electricity. A good foundation in electrical theory as well as practical experience is necessary to meet the FCC's radio operator's license requirements. This special course, given by telephone company instructors, is designed to help employees meet those standards.

Special training equipment has been designed as an instructional aid which will allow the men to "learn by doing." Thus, students are able to put into practice textbook theories dealing with direct current.

Death Slated For Killer

VENTURA, Calif. (UPI)—Luis Moya, 22, Wednesday night became the third person condemned to die in the gas chamber for the "for hire" slaying of attractive Olga Duncan, 36-year-old Canadian born nurse.

A jury of five women and seven men deliberated 5 hours, 15 minutes before returning the death verdict in the 10-day sentencing hearing.

Moya, an ex-convict with a criminal record dating back to his childhood, showed no trace of emotion when the verdict was pronounced. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Luis Moya Sr., San Angelo, Tex., and his sister, Mrs. Eloisa Gonzales, 25, Little Rock, Ark., were in the courtroom but remained stony-faced.

Moya pleaded guilty earlier to joining with Augustine Baldonado, 25, to kill Olga last Nov. 17 for an offer of \$6,000 by the victim's mother-in-law, Mrs. Elizabeth Duncan, 55, of Santa Barbara, Calif.

The two men said they received less than \$350 for slaying the pregnant woman, wife of attorney Frank Duncan. Mrs. Duncan was said to be motivated by a fierce jealousy in having to share her son, Frank, with the younger woman.

Both Baldonado and Mrs. Duncan already have been sentenced to death at sentencing hearings.

Moya will be formerly condemned to death May 7 and his case automatically will go before an appeal tribunal before he will be executed.
