**NEW YORK (UPI)**—Architect Edward D. Stone said Tuesday construction will begin late this summer on a \$1,100,000, 10-story art museum in mid-Manhattan. The museum, expected to be opened by October, 1960, was commissioned by millionaire Huntington Hartford and has been tentatively named "The Gallery of Modern Art."

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### Land Plans Target Set

**LAKEVIEW** — Rangers of the Fremont National Forest are completing multiple-use plans of lands in their administrative units, according to Clayton Weaver, supervisor.

The target date for completing the plans has been advanced to June 30 to permit full use in the Recreation Resource review that takes place in the 1959 field season. The object of the forest service in developing these use plans is to give the public the greatest benefits that can be developed by fully coordinated planning with built-in protection for the basic resources of soil and water.

Weaver said that, through the application of these plans, dominant uses for the land will be determined much as a farm plan is developed and used. Subject to limitations of soil retention, water demands and temporary uses, a system of long range integrated use will be accelerated. The plans will provide a measure of continuity as rangers come and go. The objectives will remain in force and effect, with each ranger contributing toward the final accomplishment of full well-planned land use.

### Districts Defy Board Edict

**PORTLAND (AP)**—A mandate from the state Sanitary Authority to three sanitary districts to agree by Friday or lose earmarked federal funds will not be met, two of the districts reported Wednesday.

West Slope and Broadmoor districts said they cannot agree with Tri-County (Portland area) Sanitary Authority. This means they forfeit a \$438,192 federal aid grant for a proposed Fanno Creek treatment plant and interceptor lines to join West Slope and Broadmoor.

A spokesman said legal details remain to be ironed out, but an agreement is expected when that is done. He said in the meantime, it was believed wiser to forgo the allocation and apply again at a later date.
