

Milwaukee Maintains Merest Margin; Chicago Wins 11 Inning Duel With Yanks

'Wonder' Garner 249th Win

Warren (The Wonder) Spahn did it again.

Already well established as one of baseball's all-time great left-handed pitchers, he added his 249th victory and 45th shutout Thursday night, getting all the help he needed from Hank Aaron's home run for a 1-0 victory over St. Louis.

The victory retained Milwaukee's slim (.045) percentage point lead over Los Angeles in the National League race.

The Dodgers, with Old Guard Duke Snider's two-run, inside-the-park homer capping a four-run seventh inning, won 6-4 at Philadelphia. San Francisco, rained out at Pittsburgh, regained third place as the Chicago Cubs' Bob Anderson and Bill Henry quieted Cincinnati's bats for a 3-2 victory over Ernie Bank's 10th-inning homer.

Spahn, second in victories only to the White Sox's Early Wynn (251) among active pitchers, and topped by none now in business in shutouts, gained a 3-2 record and his second whitewash of the season with a six-hitter. He didn't walk a man and struck out four. Alex Kellner (1-1) lost it.

Cal Anglers Start Season On Saturday

SACRAMENTO (UPI) — California's 1959 general fishing season opens in the state's lakes and streams Saturday.

Prospects appeared bright. A spokesman for the Fish and Game Commission estimated one million or more fishermen will be out Saturday to try their luck.

The department warned about fire hazards resulting from the warm spring.

Actually Saturday's opener won't be for the entire state. The commission has set May 16 for the start of trout fishing for the Plumas, Sierra, Nevada, Placer, Yuba, El Dorado, Alpine, part of Butte counties and the North Fork of the Feather River. Most of Del Norte and Humboldt counties open May 30 along with parts of Trinity, Mendocino, Lake and Glenn counties open May 30 along with parts of Trinity, Mendocino, Lake and Glenn counties that are drained by the Mad and Eel rivers.

The southern part of the state—in a line below the northern part of Santa Barbara, Ventura, Los Angeles, and San Bernardino counties—is open the year around.

The trout limit has been changed by action of the commission downwards to 10 generally from 15. However, the commission exempted from the lesser limit Siskiyou, Trinity, Shasta, Tehama, Lassen, Modoc, Plumas, Sierra, Butte and Nevada counties.

Pierce Outlasts NY Aces

It's been a long, frustrating fight, but maybe things finally are beginning to break Billy Pierce's way in his running battle with the New York Yankees.

The Chicago White Sox's stubby southpaw has the upper hand on all but two of the other seven American League clubs. One is Detroit, the club he broke in with back in 1948. He's 16-17 against the Tigers. The other is New York (20-30).

He's been faring a bit better against the champs of late, however, winning four of his last five decisions against them. And he made it two in a row the hard way Thursday night, dueling through 11 innings — outpitching both Whitey Ford and Ryne Duren — for a 4-3 victory that left the Sox all alone in second place, a game shy of idle Cleveland.

The defeat, hammered home by Al Smith's two-out, bases-loaded single, plunged the Yankees below .500 once again and put them sixth. Washington slipped ahead to fifth with a 9-1 triumph at Detroit. Kansas City tied Baltimore for third by beating the Orioles 4-3 on Harry Simpson's ninth-inning home run.

Hornets Earn 4-2 Victory Over JV's

Coach Ken Weber's Henley Hornets picked up their third victory of the season against a single defeat Thursday afternoon on Wright Field as they upset the once-beaten Klamath Union Jayvee nine, 4-2, behind the two-hit pitching of Gary Beber.

Beber, who walked seven and struck out the same number, yielded a lone single to Ken Womer in the second inning and another to Estlin Kiger in the final inning. The latter's hit highlighted a last-second rally by the Jayvees which was cut short by a clutch throw to third base from center-fielder Leroy Bryant, catching little Gary Head who had overrun the base.

Coach Andy Knudsen's Jayvee squad picked up single runs in the first and fifth innings while the visitors chased a pair of tallies across in the opening stanza and then added single counters in the third and seventh.

Pat Carney, who went the entire distance for the Jayvees, striking out five and walking three, ran into trouble in the opening inning as he gave up Dick Reiling, Ray Jackson and Doug Kammerer, coupled with an error and two wild pitches.

The Jayvees scored their lone tally in the first with the benefit of a base hit as did the Hornets in the third.

The only other Klamath run in the fifth was scored without a base hit, too. A pair of walks, a sacrifice and a wide pitch got the run across for the Jayvees.

Kammerer drove across the final run of the afternoon in the seventh, scoring Tom McBride from third base.

Floyd Patterson Prohibitive 10-1 Favorite Over Britisher

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. (AP)—Floyd Patterson risks his world heavyweight championship and a half-million-dollar June purse tonight in a 15-round title fight against belittled Brian London of England.

This regally garbed "tuneup" session could turn into a monumental disaster for the 24-year-old American if the burly Briton should get lucky and knock out or outpoint the ring-busy defender.

NBC will broadcast and telecast the fight nationally at 10 p.m. EDT.

Patterson, making his fourth title defense, is a prohibitive 10-1 choice to win.

Fight Facts

UNIVAC Picks First Landing

NEW YORK (AP)—UNIVAC, the electronic brain, picks First Landing to win the Kentucky Derby Saturday.

Its choice, announced by the World-Telegram & Sun in a copy-righted story, agrees with that of most of the human experts.

UNIVAC predicted Tony Lee would finish second and Royal Orbit third. The experts also have selected Tony Lee for second place but figure Sword Dancer to finish third.

Not content with predicting the first three finishers, UNIVAC went through the entire entry list and forecast that the other horses would finish in this order: Silver Spoon, Easy Spur, Sword Dancer, Troilus, Atoll, Finnegan, On-and-On, Our Dad, Open View, Duncie, Festival King, John Bruce, Rico Tesio, Die Hard and The Chosen One.

It reached its conclusions on the basis of hundreds of fragments of information such as track variants, past performances, weights and speed ratings.

But the Remington-Rand technicians who run the machine conceded that it has no crystal ball as to what track conditions may be or how the horses may feel when the race starts.
