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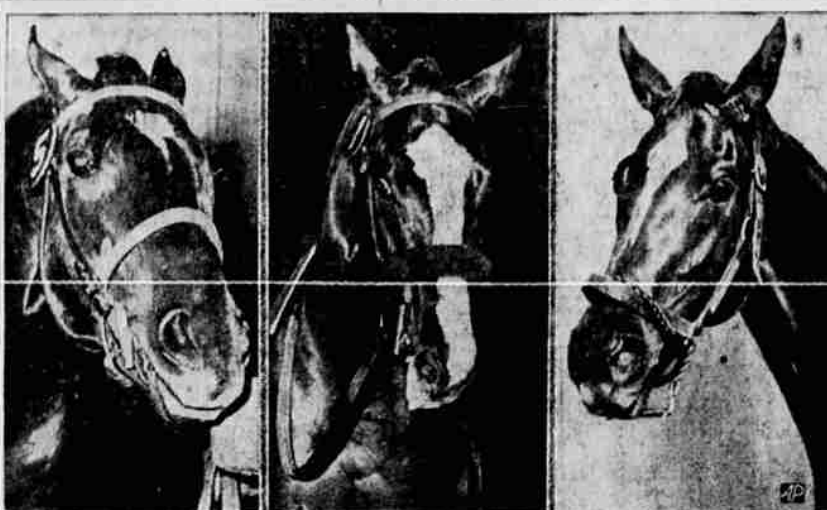
K Club Sets Annual Meet

Evenly Matched Derby Field Promises One Of Fastest Races

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP)—An evenly matched field of 18, packed with horses who take off like a missile, gives promise that Saturday's Kentucky Derby will be one of the swiftest in recent years.

Whirlaway's 2:01 2/5 record clocking of 1941 doesn't appear in danger. But there is so much early speed in the race that the time for the 1 1/4-mile trip around Churchill Downs may be the fastest since Swaps stopped the clock at 2:01 4/5 four years ago.

Fair skies are expected to greet the Derby Day crowd, annually estimated at 100,000.

Some say this is the most ordinary field of 3-year-olds since Count Turf triumphed in 1951. In winter and early spring stakes the leading candidates beat each other with almost monotonous regularity.

Hardly without exception, favorites for the 85th running of America's most colorful turf event are horses that prefer to run in front or stay close to the pace.

Take C. T. Chenery's First Landing, the 3-1 favorite off a return to the form that won him the 2-year-old title in 1958 and the presence of five-time winner Eddie Arcaro in the saddle.

First Landing lost the Wood Memorial by three-quarters of a length. But he was either in front or at the leader's throat in a 46 1/5 half, a 1:11 six furlongs and a 1:36 mile.

Fred Turner Jr.'s Tomy Lee, second choice at 4-1, set a Keeneland standard of 1:21 3/5 for 7 furlongs in a front running race. Brookneade Stable's Sword Dancer ripped off 7 furlongs in 1:22 1/5 here a week ago while setting the

pace. He's the third choice at 5-1. James Norris' Easy Spur, Florida Derby winner; C. V. Whitney's Silver Spoon, the filly who won the Santa Anita Derby, and Neil S. McCarthy's Finnegan, victorious in the California derby all have early speed along with such others as Mrs. Jacques Braunstein's Royal Orbit and Calumet Farm's On-and-On.

Five of the last seven derby winners raced on top or near the pace all the way. If all 18 are in the starting gate at 4:30 p.m. (EST), the winner will receive a net of \$120,900. The race also may be seen on television and heard on radio from 4:15 to 4:45 p.m. EST (CBS).

Baseball action on the home front Saturday finds the Oregon Tech Owls stepping out of conference action for a twinnbill with Lassen Junior College nine beginning at 10 a.m. in Gem Stadium.

The Owls, 3-4 in league action following their loss to the Southern Oregon Red Raiders in Ashland last Tuesday, collected a pair of wins from Lassen earlier this year at Lassen.

Tech coach Ralph Carr plans to start Gary Huener in the first game Saturday, a nine inning fray, with left-hander Allan Leach taking over in the second game which is scheduled for seven innings.

The Techmen will close out the 1959 Oregon Collegiate Conference season with a three-headed series with the Portland State Vikings in Portland next Friday and Saturday.

Stated starting roles for the Lassen challenge are Charlie Wilson behind the plate, Huener and Leach alternating on first when not pitching. Jack Brooks on second (Ron Downie is still sidelined with an ankle sprain). Gary Ehrmantrout at shortstop, Jim Cox on third base while the outfield will be handled by Stan Glass, in left, Earl Kessler in center and Virg Winters in right. Swanning by for relief work on the mound is Leroy Rauch.

Carr gave his players the afternoon off Thursday with the intent of resuming practice on Friday afternoon depending on the availability of a field and the weather.

FORT WORTH, Tex. (AP)—Lionel Hebert, who never has won expense money playing in the Colonial National Invitation Tournament before, was in line for a big slice of cash today as he led the field into the second round.

The chunky member of golf's brother act—Lionel and Jay Hebert—shot a 3-under-par 67 Thursday to take the No. 1 spot. He can already see more than the \$150 he bagged here last year—his sole winnings in the Colonial tournament.

Just a stroke back was Ted Kroll of Sarasota, Fla., the man who in 1956 won more money than anybody ever has in golf, \$72,835.

Hebert, who plays out of Lafayette, La., would have broken the record for the 7,021-yard Colonial Country Club course of 65 had he been able to get his putts to drop.

Tied for third place at 69 were Mike Souchak, Grossinger, N.Y.; Jack Burke, Klamath Falls, N.Y.; Bill Johnston, Provo, Utah; and Ben Hogan, Fort Worth, the man who has four times won this tournament.

Six bettered par while four—Gardner Dickinson, Panama City Beach, Fla.; Tommy Jacobs, Whittier, Calif.; Jim Ferrie, Winston-Salem, N.C.; and Dow Finsterwald of Tiqueta, Fla.—equaled par 70.
