Baptists Set Special Meets

The First Baptist Church, participating in the national Baptist Jubilee Advance, is conducting special meetings at the church, 414 North Eighth Street, each day at 7:30 p.m. May 1-May 10. Rev. Lewis Steed, secretary of Evangelism of the Baptist General Convention of Oregon-Washington, will be speaker for the meetings.

The five major Baptist groups of the nation are cooperating in a program of evangelism and church extension that will culminate in a Jubilee Celebration in Atlantic City in 1964. This will observe the rapid development among Baptists in North America during the past 150 years.

Southern Baptists have adopted a goal for starting 20,000 new churches and preaching places, reports thus far for 1959 in the Oregon-Washington territory show that Southern Baptists have started one new church or mission for each week toward a goal of 60 for the calendar year.

Recent evangelistic efforts in the Northwest have added 1,000 new members to the 183 churches and missions already constituted.

Rev. Steed, a native of Texas, served as pastor for a number of years in northwest Louisiana, and six years, during World War II, as an Army chaplain. Since 1953, his work has been as mission superintendent and evangelist of the Oregon-Washington Convention of Baptists.
