Refreshments were then served to Lois Rea, Brownie Bramwell, Carol Creswell, Lavonne Kellow,

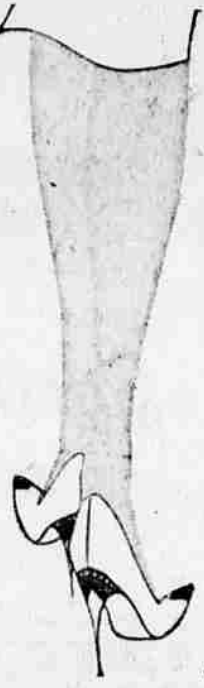
