Teen-aged Annie Oakley Pops Up In New Mexico

ROY, N.M. (AP)—Beverly Mackey is about as frilly and fancy a teenager as can be imagined.

So when she recently bagged the third largest Barbary sheep in a special hunt in northwestern New Mexico, it came as somewhat of a shock to the males who normally dominate the field. At the same time, she hung up a record of being the youngest hunter—man or girl—ever to shoot one of the tricky animals in this country.

Everyone else was surprised—except the people who know Beverly.

Beverly Mackey is a demure 15-year-old student at Roy High School. She's had more than her share of honors. She's the 1958-1959 Future Farmers of America sweetheart. She goes steady with a guard on the high school basketball team. She was this year elected most beautiful girl in the sophomore class. She is now—and always has been—a straight A student.

And she packs a mean rifle.

She's been hunting since the age of 9. That year she went with her father strictly as an observer. The next year she went out with her 30-30 Winchester but got so excited she couldn't shoot.

At the age of 12, she bagged her first deer—a nine-point buck weighing 155 pounds.

Last year, Beverly entered the annual Harding County Lions Club turkey shoot. She hit the bullseye every time. For the rest of the day, the other women declined to compete against her and she went against the men—winning four out of five times.

Starting the Barbary sheep hunt season this year, she went alone the first day and saw nothing. The next day, accompanied by Curtis Mackey, her father, and Alfonso Luzan, she bagged her record maker at 350 yards from a kneeling position, in the roughest possible country. And with only one shot.

Next year, just to make things interesting, she plans to hunt with bow and arrow.

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
