

100,000 Spectators See Tomy Lee Capture Derby

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP)—Tomy Lee, an English colt owned by wealthy Texan Fred Turner Jr., nosed out Sword Dancer after a scorching stretch battle in the Kentucky Derby. Then the huge crowd estimated at some 100,000 had to sweat out a foul claim for 17 minutes before the stewards flashed the red official sign on the infield odds board.

Tomy Lee is only the second foreign-bred horse in history to win the race. It was one of the most dramatic finishes ever seen in America's most glamorous horse race, and the scorching finish matched the weather. The temperature zoomed to 92 degrees, making it the hottest Derby Day since they began keeping such records in 1927.

Seventeen horses started in the \$163,750 race, second richest of all derbies. Christopher T. Chenery's First Landing, the champion 2-year-old of 1958, finished third behind Tomy Lee and the Brookmeade Stable's Sword Dancer.

There were two and one quarter lengths between the second and third horses, while Mrs. Jacques Braunstein's Royal Orbit was fourth, another length away. Jockey Bill Boland, who won the 1950 Derby with Middleground, lodged two foul claims against Tomy Lee.

Boland was riding Sword Dancer.

Tomy Lee's jockey was Willie Shoemaker, who was involved in the most recent Derby rubarb two years ago. In the 1957 Derby Willie misjudged the finish

line aboard British-bred Gallant Man, and stood up momentarily in the saddle. Iron Liege won the race by a nose, and many observers thought the miscue cost another Texas owner the race. Gallant Man was owned by Ralph Lowe, who hails from Midland, which also is Turner's home town.

This time, however, Shoemaker, a 25-year-old national champion rider from El Paso, Tex., was on the winning side. He had won the 1955 Derby when Swaps, a California colt, upset Nashua.

Old timers said this was the longest delay in making the Derby result official, and recalled only one other claim of foul in the race which was held in 1875.

That, oddly enough, was against Omar Khayyam, in 1917. Omar

Ted Kroll Leading Tourney

FORT WORTH, Tex. (AP) — Ted Kroll fought his way into the lead in the \$27,300 Colonial National Invitation Golf Tournament Saturday with a 4-under-par 32 on the final 9, besting Lionel Hebert by 2 strokes.

Kroll from Sarasota, Fla., came home with a 1-over-par 71 as Hebert soared to an 8-over-par 78 under the pressure and terrific wind. Kroll will start the final round Sunday with 210 for 54 holes. Hebert has 212.

It was a day of skyrocketing scores as winds of 28 m.p.h. and gusts up to 40 swept the 7,021-yard Colonial Country Club course. The great Ben Hogan, who was bidding for the championship with 136 for 36 holes, faltered to a 7-over-par 77 and dropped 3 strokes off the pace.

The 38-year-old Kroll made his lead solid over Hebert, from Lafayette, La., with a 25-foot birdie putt on the 18th hole.

The two had come into the 18th with Hebert a stroke behind. Hebert got his par by 2-putting but the fighting Kroll went boldly for the birdie. The ball trickled into the cup and Kroll, who started the third round with 139 for 36 holes, pulled up with a gain of 7 strokes.

Hogan, the Fort Worth great who four times won this tournament, and Tommy Jacobs of Whittier, Calif., tied for third place at 213. Jacobs pulled up with a 73.

In fifth place is Fred Hawkins of El Paso, Tex., with 214 while tied for sixth are Ho Winger of Odessa, Tex., and Don January of Denver, Colo., each with 215.

Only two players were able to shoot under par—Cary Middlecott of Hollywood, Fla., and Arnold Palmer of Ligonier, Pa.

The best round ever shot in the Masters golf tournament was Lloyd Mangrum's first-round 64 in the 1940 event. The 25th annual Masters was held April 2-5 at Augusta, Ga.

Oregon Defeats Cougars

PULLMAN, Wash. (AP) — Oregon ripped Washington State 74-37 in a Northern Division Pacific Coast Conference dual track and field meet Saturday as four meet records and one all-time WSC school record went by the boards.

The Ducks, relying on a deep secondary, won 8 of the 15 meets. Dick Rubens of the Cougars set the new dual meet record with a heave of 227 feet, 10 inches in the javelin. He surpassed the old mark of 221 feet, 5 inches with ease. WSC's Darrell Pearson had owned it since 1956.

The Ducks set marks in the pole vault and discus. Jack Burge vaulted 14 feet, 3 inches to break the record of 14 feet by George Rassmussen, also of Oregon, in 1950.

Gene Estes, Oregon's discus ace, threw 160 feet, 2½ inches to erase the old record of 158 feet, 8 inches set by Steve Frye of WSC last year.

Spike Arlt, WSC's great junior hurdler, also broke two records but they don't go in the books because of a stiff following wind. Arlt won the 120 high jumps in 14.3 seconds to better the existing mark of 14.8 seconds set by Fran Polsoff of WSC in 1948.

Arlt then whipped through the 220 lows in 23.1 seconds, beating Steve Anderson of the Ducks by a scant six inches. The record is 23.2 seconds set by Lee Orr of WSC 19 years ago.

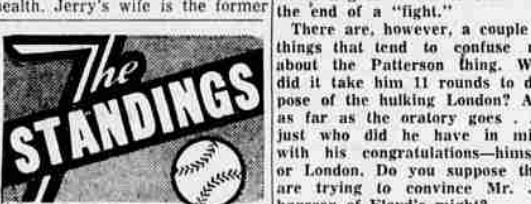
