Wheat Men Okay Budget

WALLA WALLA (AP)—The board of directors of the Western Wheat Associates, U. S. A., Inc., has approved a \$109,740 budget for the group's operation during the next 14 months.

The action was taken at a meeting of the Tri-State organization here Saturday at which the directors selected Portland as the site of the association's headquarters. The organization was formed at Pendleton, Ore., April 3 for the purpose of promoting wheat crops raised in Oregon, Washington and Idaho.

Dwelle Jones of Walla Walla was officially made a member of the board at the session here. He replaced Don Schmick of Colfax, elected at the Pendleton meeting but unable to serve. Jones will represent the Washington Assn. of Wheat Growers.

Soup Contest Results Told; Recipe Winner Is Listed

PALM SPRINGS, Calif. (AP)—If you'd care to know what kind of onion soup Zsa Zsa's mama, mama's count and I prefer, stick around for a few paragraphs.

This is a report on an onion soup contest, and you'll get the winning recipe to boot.

But the story cannot be told without mentioning Mama Gabor's poodle, her \$8.95 hat and what mama has to say about her favorite daughter's latest romance.

Mama, who likes to be called Jolie, her husband, Count Edmond Szigetti, and your reporter were judges for George Ringwald's contest. George writes a column for the Riverside Press and Enterprise and made so bold as to extol an onion soup as the best ever. Readers challenged him.

The way to settle the argument was to cook the seven outstanding recipes and have them tasted. Only Jolie would think of bringing a French poodle to a French

onion soup tasting. The other diners were aghast, as dogs are not allowed in California restaurants, but Jolie silenced would-be hecklers with the magnetic Gabor smile.

Someone asked Jolie: is Zsa Zsa going to marry Hal Hayes. Jolie answered: "Why should she marry Hal Hayes—she makes more money than he does."

Then Jolie adjusted her hat again—and again insisted it cost a mere \$6.95. It was made of coarse white straw, with a high crown and a bright red satin bow. It looked to me like an upside down coffee pot, but the ladies said it was fetching.

Now if you want to make this prize-winning soup, which got a unanimous verdict Sunday night, cut up two large white onions

very fine. Saute them in butter, adding a pinch of salt and a pinch of powdered sugar.

Let the onions get golden brown and then add a tablespoon of flour, stirring it slowly. After two minutes add a quart and a half of boiling water and stir until the mixture boils.

Take off the fire and add half

a bay leaf. Beat two egg yolks with a half pint of cream and add to the onions. Heat, and serve with thin slices of toasted, buttered french bread doused with grated parmesan cheese.

Mrs. J. H. Carley of Banning, Calif., who turned in the recipe, says it came straight from France.

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
