

Brush Backs, Dusters Spice Hot National League Hassle

Brush back pitches and dusters now are spicing the hot National League pennant scramble that has seen the lead change hands three times in three days.

San Francisco and Cincinnati grappled in one of the double-bladed duels Monday night as the Giants put across four ninth-inning runs, then strolled off a rally by the Reds for a 6-5 victory. That hoisted the Giants back into the lead, by a mere .009 percentage points over Los Angeles.

Los Angeles closed in by dropping Milwaukee from first to third with a 5-3 victory over the Braves and southpaw Warren Spahn, the ace the Dodgers always trump.

Pittsburgh reached .500 for the first time and took fifth place from Chicago by beating the Cubs 2-1 in the only other NL game scheduled.

Boston defeated Kansas City 8-4 in the lone game scheduled in the American League.

Giants 6, Reds 5

The dusting started early in Cincinnati. The Giants' Willie Mays hit the dirt getting away from Bob Purkey's low, inside pitch in the first inning. Then Purkey was plunked on the leg in the eighth inning by winning reliever Gordon Jones. Manager Bill Rigney of the Giants was banished for arguing the call that waved Purkey to first.

Just Sunday, St. Louis and Pittsburgh jawed at each other over pitching tactics. Earlier, the Red's Frank Robinson found Pittsburgh's Bob Friend and George Wright unusually wild.

Purkey, the right-hander who ran up a 6-0 string against the Giants from 1955 to last August, had a 3-2 lead going into the ninth. Then a three-run double by Jim Davenport and Willie Kirkland's RBI single made it 6-3. Red Worthington, replacing Jones, gave up two runs in the Red ninth, one on Frank Robinson's homer, before Jack Sanford hurried in to get the final out.

The first five runs in the

game came on homers. The Giants counted theirs on solo socks by Felipe Alou and Orlando Cepeda. The Reds scored on a two-run homer by Pete Whisenant and a bases-empty blast by Frank Thomas, both off starter Mike McCormick.

Joe Taylor's smash over the left field fence in the 11th inning gave the Canadians a 1-0 triumph over Salt Lake City in the only game played Monday night.

Rain and wet grounds forced postponement of the other three scheduled games.

The win left the Mounties a few percentage points behind Seattle and Spokane, but all three teams are now six games behind surprising Sacramento.

Taylor's homer broke up a brilliant pitching duel between Vancouver veteran Joe Hatten and Dick Hall, the league's leading pitcher.

Hatten, a 42-year-old lefty, gave up only three hits before he was lifted for a pinchhitter in the 10th. Reliever Dick Luebke gave up a single in the 11th and got credit for his first victory of the season.

Hall had struck out 11 Mounties and given up only three hits before Taylor's game-breaker. He walked five, one intentionally.

Neither team committed an error in the tense contest.

Pelican Lettermen Hear Elroy Hirsch

One of the largest crowds ever to attend the K Club banquet held annually in the honor of the Klamath Union High letter winners was on hand in the KU cafeteria Monday night to be regaled by Elroy (Crazylegs) Hirsch, with tales of his experiences in 21 years of football, high school through pro.

Hirsch, who was the guest of honor and principal speaker at the dinner through the courtesy of the Union Oil Company of California, was presented by master of ceremonies, OTI basketball coach Wally Palmberg.

In addition to Hirsch's talk, outgoing K Club President Gary Krausburg introduced the new officers who will guide the organization through the coming year. Volated the presidency by club members was Larry Bynard, the vice presidency, Estin Kiger while Steve Binney was elected club secretary-treasurer. All three of the new officials are members of the Pelican baseball teams.

Following a presentation of three numbers by a vocal group from the Klamath Union Music Department, termed "The Swing Sixteen Minus Three" by director Steve Stone, Hirsch took the floor to give a highly interesting and humorous account of life as a pro football player.

After his talk was concluded Hirsch opened a question and answer period in which the members of the audience participated. "We wouldn't take the beating we do just for money," was Hirsch's answer to the question "Was the 'old college try' a part of pro football?" "I have seen more tears following a loss in a pro-dressing room and more sincere desire to win exhibited during the games than in any college with which I am familiar. This desire of course is the difference between the good player and the great one," he added.

"In my opinion the point after touchdown in football is unnecessary and should be abolished," he answered the query as to whether pro ball would adopt the two-point run following a TD. "When two teams have scored three touchdowns apiece and one of them has missed a point-after, it certainly doesn't indicate that the one team is better than the other. 'I would like to see them do away with kick after a touchdown entirely, unless of course, we had a 'Lou the Toe' Groza on our team,' he added with a grin.

He went on, "I advocate the sudden death overtime for the ball games and of course, free substitution or platooning."

In answer to the question as to whether the Big Ten had tougher players than the Pacific Coast Conference teams, in regards to Rose Bowl games, Hirsch commented, "No, they are not tougher, but when a Big Ten team comes to the coast they come with their entire conference solidly behind them. And that makes the difference. The Rose Bowl is not just another game to them—as it appears to be to the Pacific Coast representative."

Asked his choice of the best quarterback he had ever seen, he replied, "Bob Waterfield. . . . Waterfield is the best all-around man, every department included. Hirsch, who arrived in Klamath Falls via airplane from Los Angeles at 2:30 p.m., went directly to Modoc Field where he played in an hour and 15-minute football game with members of the Pelican track and baseball team and then adjourned to the tennis courts for a set of tennis with KU's Jim Norland.

"I have seen some fine athletes this afternoon—a lot of speed. I think your coming football season will be a good one."

3 Aces Big Hand In Meet

EUGENE (AP) — Three athletes may win two events each in the annual Pacific Coast Conference Northern Division track meet to be held here in two weeks.

The latest to join the ranks of the double-threat men is Spike Arlt of Washington State. He is fastest in the division in the high hurdles. He ran the highs in 14.3 seconds and the lows in 23.1 seconds last weekend. His time in the lows equalled the best performance of Oregon's Steve Anderson.

The other two athletes leading in two events are from the University of Oregon. Sprinter Roscoe Cook leads in the 100 with 9.5 and the 220 at 21.2. Jim Grell leads in the half mile at 1:51.7 and the mile at 4:07.2.
