Malin Pupil Wins Award

Nancy A. Kolkow, 18, Malin, has been awarded a scholarship to attend the American National Red Cross Aquatic School at Miramonte, California, announced Mrs. May Myers, water safety chairman of the local Red Cross chapter. Cost of the room, board, tuition, books, and supplies needed for the 10-day course from June 14 to June 24 are included in the scholarship and will be paid by the local Red Cross from funds contributed to the Annual United-Fund-Red Cross Campaign. Successful completion of the instruction qualifies the candidate to conduct swimming classes and award Red Cross certificates.

Miss Kolkow was selected by the local chapter to receive the scholarship because of her outstanding volunteer service during the past years as a lifeguard and water safety aide at the Malin pool, plus the need of the rural area for qualified personnel to continue the program of swimming instruction to children of Malin, Merrill and Tulelake.

Other local recipients of scholarships from the Red Cross chapter during recent years include Ella Redkey, Ruth Tribe, Sharon Torwater, John Tribe of Klamath Falls and Arlie Mae Johnson of Malin. Outstanding swimming teachers, coaches, and the best qualified swimmers of the Pacific area are on the Red Cross national staff which will conduct the aquatic school.

Miss Kolkow is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Francis Kolkow of Malin, both of whom have been active in the Red Cross swimming program at the Malin pool since its inception.

Klansman Pleads Guilty

LUMBERTON, N.C. (AP)—James Garland Martin, 37, a Ku Klux Klansman, pleaded guilty in Superior Court Monday to a charge of inciting to riot. The charge stemmed from a Klan rally in January 1958, that was broken up by angry Lumbee Indians.

Martin, a Reidsville tobacco worker, was given an 18-month suspended sentence, placed on probation for five years and fined \$250. He was given a 6 to 12-month sentence when he was convicted in March 1958, but he appealed and was granted a new trial.

James (Catfish) Cole, former grand wizard of the KKK, was convicted of the same charge and is serving an 18 to 24-month prison term. His appeal for a new trial was turned down.

Turncoats Ask Back Pay

MONTEREY, Calif. (UPI)—Turncoats of the Korean War filed claims Monday seeking back pay from the U.S. Government for the time they spent in Communist China.

The former U.S. soldiers are Otto G. Bell, Olympia, Washington; William A. Cowart, of Georgia, and Lewis W. Briggs, of Texas.

They were captured during 1950-51 in Korea and were not discharged by the U.S. Army until 1954. The three men believe they were entitled to pay until the time of their discharges.

Although the three GIs went over to the Communists when they had a chance to come home after the war, they contend that it never has been established that the Army can deprive a soldier of his pay for misconduct.

The government contends that the three men violated their contract of enlistment.

The men were represented by attorneys Monday at a hearing before U.S. Commissioner Murray Bernhardt of the U.S. Court of Claims. None of the three was present.

Bernhardt indicated it probably would be several months before there was further action in the cases.
