Garden Club Makes Offer To Robinson

NEW YORK (UPI)—The Madison Square Garden Boxing Club disclosed today it has offered Sugar Ray Robinson a \$500,000 minimum guarantee plus certain percentages, to defend his middleweight crown against Carmen Basilio in September at Los Angeles.

Explaining the guarantee—second largest to a fighter in ring history—General Manager Harry Markson said, "We are hopeful that Robinson will accept the match. If he does, we believe we can come to terms with Basilio."

Only the \$25,000 guaranteed Gene Tunney by promoter Tex Rickard for his defense against Tom Heene in 1928 topped the half-million that the Garden Club quietly offered Sugar Ray last week.

Markson stressed that, in addition to the guarantee, Sugar Ray also would be given 50 per cent of the net gate over \$400,000 and 50 per cent of the theater-TV net over \$400,000. Thus, Robinson's total purse might be greater, even than the \$750,000 guarantee Robinson had been asking, Markson said.

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Braves Regain Command: Tigers On Prowl

Milwaukee's two-edged sword—a pitching staff of quality and quantity—has pushed the Braves into first place once more in their revolving-door battle with the San Francisco Giants for the National League lead.

Carl Willey, one of the Braves' big five with Warren Spahn, Lew Burdette, Bob Rush and Joey Jay, was locked in a 2-2 tie after eight innings of Duelling Tuesday night with Don Drysdale of Los Angeles.

Then Manager Fred Haney went to the bullpen and pulled out Don McMahon and Rush, who gave up just one hit between them in eight innings until Henry Aaron doubled home the winning run for a 3-2, 16-inning decision over the Dodgers.

San Francisco was dealt a 5-2 defeat at Cincinnati by Don Newcombe, whose first victory slipped the Giants into a second place snarl with the Reds and Dodgers. All three are a half-game behind Milwaukee.

Chicago's Cubs reclaimed fifth, beating Pittsburgh 6-3. Philadelphia beat the Pirates for sixth, just 2 1/2 games shy of first, with a five-run ninth inning that beat St. Louis 8-7.

The Dodgers were shut out over the last 11 innings at Milwaukee. McMahon didn't allow a hit or a walk while striking out five in his five frames. Rush, gaining his first decision, gave up but one hit, didn't walk a man and struck out four in his three innings.
