Bob Duden Wins Oregon Tourney

PORTLAND (AP)—Bob Duden, an Oswego, Ore., professional, won his third Oregon Open Golf tournament Thursday with a blazing seven-under-par 65 in an 18-hole playoff.

Duden's round of 33-32-65 completely outdistanced the 39-34-72 round of runnerup Joe Greer of Yakima on the par 72 Columbia-Edgewater course.

Both Duden and Greer fired 283's to deadlock on the first 72 holes of the scheduled three-day tourney.

But Duden's final 19 holes garnered for him the top prize of \$500. Greer drew \$300 as runner-up.

Duden's 65 also tied the Columbia-Edgewater course record.

Northwest League baseball fans in Wenatchee went to see a parade Thursday night—a parade of pitchers. Eight of them alternated between the showers and the mound as Yakima defeated Wenatchee 16-13.

And looking at the Salem Senators one begins to think that the pre-season injection of greenbacks into the broke club is all that was needed. The Senators boosted their hold on the league's top spot by defeating the Lewiston Bromes 7-6.

In the other Thursday game, Eugene shutout Tri-City 4-0.

It wasn't an easy victory for the Bears, who got off to a five-run lead in the first inning of a game that lasted 3 1/2 hours and saw the two clubs giving up 17 hits apiece. Yakima won the tilt when Pete Gonzaga clouted a three-run homer in the 10th but until then it was touch and go.

The Chiefs rallied in the seventh and tied it but the Bears regained the lead in the next inning only for Wenatchee to come back in their half of the eighth frame and advance 12-11.

Yakima got two more tallies in the ninth but the never-give-up Chiefs tied it again in the bottom of the ninth. Three Wenatchee players, Jerry Cooper, Al Owen and Lewis Bouillon, came through with four hits each.

Wenatchee Manager Dick Wilson entered a protest in the ninth inning when umpire Russ Fischer awarded Wilmer Moton first base because he was hit by a pitch. Wilson questioned the umpires interpretation of the rules because the pitch had hit the ground before striking Moton.

Record Tumbles On 'Night'

LOS ANGELES (AP)—"Campy's Night" was a tremendous record breaking event.

A turnaway crowd of 93,103—paid—packed Memorial Coliseum to benefit Roy Campanella, the Los Angeles Dodgers' paralytic-stricken star, and to watch the Dodgers play the New York Yankees Thursday night.

It was just an exhibition, won by the world champions 6-2.

But the roaring crowd surpassed baseball's previous all-time attendance high. That was the 86,288 who saw the fifth game of the 1958 World Series in Cleveland between the Indians and the old Boston Braves.

It was a night of emotion, of sentiment, good action for an exhibition.

Thirty-seven-year-old Campy drew a thunderous, standing ovation when he was wheeled by the Dodgers' ex-captain, Pee Wee Reese, onto the floodlit green diamond.

Neatly dressed in a brown business suit, his head topped with a blue Dodger cap, Campy said, via a loudspeaker to the hushed crowd:

"Thank you, ladies and gentlemen. I want to thank each and every one from the bottom of my heart."

"This is something I'll never forget."

"I thank God that I am here living to see it. Thanks a million."

Once again the stadium rocked with applause as Pee Wee wheeled Roy back to his place behind a screen near the Dodger dugout.

Unofficially, it was the consensus that Campanella, besieged with medical bills since his auto smashup 18 months ago, would get around \$60,000.
