Congress To Be Informed Of Nuclear Test Dangers

WASHINGTON (AP)—Scientists tell Congress today what the radioactive fallout results might be if the nuclear powers resume largescale tests. The Senate-Radiation subcommittee has heard this week a wide variety of testimony on the effects of fallout from atomic tests conducted so far. The hearings end today. An Atomic Energy Commission scientist testified Thursday it was "prudent to assume" cancer deaths of children would increase proportionately as fallout increases. Dr. Jack Schubert, chemist at the Arizona National Laboratory, said his studies of children's cancer had convinced him the maximum permissible level fixed for fallout radiation should be lowered considerably. He urged that the level for strontium 90—the most dreaded substance produced in nuclear blasts—be cut in half. The levels are set by the International Commission on Radiological Protection and the U.S. National Committee on Radiation Protection. Dr. Gioacchino Falla, veteran Columbia University physicist who long has been associated with both organizations, testified that the maximum levels had been lowered several times since they first were set in 1934. But Dr. James F. Crow, University of Wisconsin geneticist, said he believed the levels should be reduced still further to the

level of background radiation already in the air. He said an advisory committee on which he is serving shortly will recommend such a course to the national committee. This would mean about a 50 per cent reduction below present levels, Dr. Crow told a reporter.

FACES PILOT SHORTAGE

LONDON (UPI)—Britain is setting up a "University of the Air" to combat a threatened shortage of airline pilots. John Hay, joint parliamentary secretary to the Transport Ministry, told the House of Commons Wednesday. He said that unless special steps are taken soon there will be a shortage of young pilots after 1961.
