To Medford—Mrs. Alpha Hartzog of New Pine Creek is spending a few days in Medford with her sister, Mrs. Mayme Bryan.

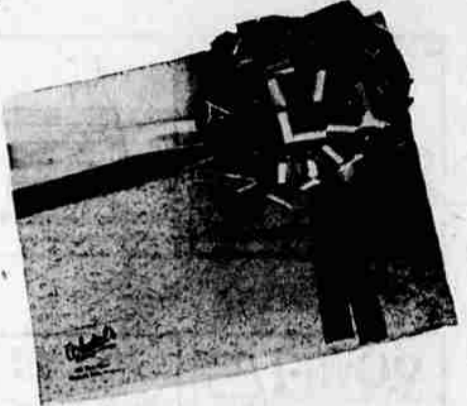
Added—A 40-gallon soda and acid tank, built on a high-wheeled cart, was added to the New Pine Creek Fire Department last week.
