

Owls Close Season With Losses To PSC

PORTLAND — The Oregon Tech Owls loaded their baseball gear aboard the bus for the last time in the 1959 season after dropping the last two games of a series with the Portland State Vikings here Saturday afternoon.

The Techmen were edged 2-1 in the afternoon's twin seven inning contests and then were toppled 9-6 in a hectic second game. The two losses, which gave the Owls a 3-win, 9-loss record for the year, came on the heels of 7-4 defeat here Friday, also at the hands of the Vikes.

Another Two Records Fall To KU Frosh

Two more Frosh records fell Friday afternoon on Modoc Field although the Medford freshman track squad dampened Klamath Union's hopes as the young Tornadoes collected eight first place finishes and went on to post a 70-1-3-52-2-3 win over the baby Pelicans thinned squad in a dual track meet run in conjunction with the meet between the two school's varsity squads.

The pair of standards fell to Dana Ash, who raced over the high hurdles in a time of 10.9 seconds and to Ron Simpson, who, although he was edged out by a hair-thin margin for first place, set a new Frosh mark in the 75-yd. dash with a time of eight seconds flat.

The versatile Simpson also scored a duo of first place finishes for the Frosh, grabbing the discus with a toss of 118 feet and the 330-yd. dash with a time 38.4 seconds. Ash also was a double winner for the losers. Aside from his record breaking time in the high hurdles, he also tied for first place in the high with teammate Gary Buchholz at 5 feet, 2 inches.

Little Eric Peterson was the other double winner for the host squad, picking up victories in the 660 and 1320.

When the Notre Dame fencing team last recently to the Air Force Academy, 14-13, it was the first setback for the Irish swordsmen in three years. They had won 25 straight matches.

Despite a four-hit, five strikeout, Hueners, an untimely double, a single, a wild pitch and an error gave the Portlanders the necessary bulge in the first game.

Credited with the win was Viking pitcher Mike Kondos, a right-hander, who scattered two Owl hits over the distance. Kondos walked four and fanned five. Hueners gave up only one free pass.

The Vikings picked up their first marker in the bottom of the second stanza as centerfielder Tom Ferguson singled, stole second followed by Ron Adams who walked. A sacrifice grounder by Don Lowry moved the runners along and Ferguson scored when Hueners blew one past catcher Charlie Wilson.

Portland State added the clincher in the last of the sixth when third baseman Ray Anderson doubled then scored when OTI shortstop Jack Brooks let a grounder scoot between his feet.

The Techmen got their lone tally in the top of the seventh when Virg Winters walked only to be forced at second by Brooks, but the Owls loaded the initial sacks again as second sacker Ron Downie also got a free trip. Brooks came home on a clean single by Wilson.

In the second game the Techmen held the Vikings even, 2-2, for the first three innings until a three-run barrage in the fourth did the damage. The Vikes counted two more in the fifth and the show was nearly over.

The Owls swarmed back in the sixth inning as Virg Winters blasted a two-run double causing the replacement of Vix starter Roy Love, but the rally fell short. The big wood for the Owls was hit by Gary Ehrmantrout who hit 2-5, including a two run double in the second. Winters, 1-4, and Allan Leach who pounded two singles in three trips.

Viking Ray Anderson was the star of the show, however, with a two run triple in the second canto and a two run homer in the fifth. Portlanders Gene Hanson, 3-4, Jerry Klein, 2-3 and Love were the only other players to collect more than one hit.

South Suburban Little League Heads To Form 'Minor' System

"Every youngster that registered will get a chance to play baseball this season," promised Major William Harris, president of the brand new South Suburban Little League, at the closing of the registration and tryouts on Altamont Field Friday afternoon.

"The response by both players and parents is truly gratifying. We realize that we have a lot of work to do in making places for all the boys but it shall be done. It's obvious that when such a large number of kids are trying out for positions that the individual ability of a lot of them didn't get a completely fair test," he added.

"Only a specified number of the boys can be picked to the 'major' league teams but we have plans in the mill for a complete structure of minor or 'farm' teams to take care of the rest. We need about two weeks more to get these plans in operation. Every boy will be notified of the next step to be taken," Harris continued.

South Suburban Little League directors and coaches observed over 300 youngsters in response to the call for players. Tryouts and registrations were spread over a three-day period by age groups.

According to officials the "minor" leagues will be set up, so nearly as practicable, in proportion to the school area and age groupings.

Mel Hollin has been appointed director of the "minor" league system.

Team managers, T. Sgt. D. E. Sutton, O. L. Fowler, Bob Lorei, N. W. Mayfield, W. R. Stokes and A. C. Lingo will meet, along with league officers, for a player auction Monday night in the Kingsley Field fire station, it was reported. Players and parents are requested not to appear at the "auction."

League heads expressed extreme pleasure with the large number of parents who turned out with their youngsters to witness the tryouts.

"In view of the large number of boys who want to play ball and the interest and enthusiasm displayed by their parents we hope to have little trouble finding an additional 10 coaches to help with the minor league teams," noted Harris.

GRANTS PASS — The Klamath Union Pelican baseball team slipped a notch, percentage-wise, in Southern Oregon Conference standings as they bowed 4-1 in the counting half of a twinbill with the Cavemen here Saturday afternoon.

The Whitebirds came back in the second and non-counting five game and chalked up a 2-1 victory.

Despite the fact that the Pelican squad is becoming seemingly adept at the double steal, all three Klamath runs the result of stealing home, the Cavemen, who are crowding Medford for the league lead, bunched six hits effectively to nullify their efforts.

Credited with the win for the Cavemen was Dick Hayes, who like loser Blake Griggs gave up six hits. Hayes fanned nine and walked none while Griggs whiffed four but gave up four free passes.

Hayes' mates were charged with three errors while the Pelicans committed only two.

Griggs, Pel shortstop Bob Yunc and Caveman third sacker John Fox were the big hitters for the first game. Griggs and Fox collected a pair of singles in three trips while Yunc got two for four.

KU collected its lone tally in the top of the first inning of the first game as lead-off man Yunc singled, advanced on a wild pitch, then moved on to third as Rich Depew was out on a fielder's choice. Griggs, the next man up, singled and then was caught in a hot box on the double steal signal allowing Yunc to scamper home.

The Pels threatened again in the sixth as Griggs and leftfielder Don Gresdel each singled with none out. They died on the sacks

however as Hayes fanned the next man, forced a fly from the second and struck out the third to stop the rally.

The Cavemen saw their big chance come in the home half of the third. Hayes singled, and advanced on a fielder's choice and then scored as Griggs overthrew first base.

In the second game rookie Bob Wilkenson allowed only one Grants Pass hit for his victory while loser Bob Cole gave up two.

The Pelican one run margin came in the first stanza as both Yunc and Depew stole home on consecutive squeezes. The Cavemen counted once in the bottom of the inning but the difference lasted the balance of the game.
