



HURTLERS TO RECORD — Big Bob Drace churns up the cinders in the last five yards of the 120-yard high hurdle event in which the tall KU senior set a new school record of 15 seconds flat in a dual meet with the Medford thincled crew on Modoc Field Friday afternoon. Drace's superb effort broke the old standard of 15.2 set by Bob McCabe in 1947. Drace Snaps Hurdle Record; Medford Whips KU Trackmen

Klamath Union's Bob Drace's three first place finishes were the only thing that prevented the Medford track team from making a complete sweep of the Pelicans in a dual meet held Friday afternoon on Modoc Field. The rangy blond KU senior was one-tenth of a second off the school record in winning the low hurdles, tied with Medford's George Koch for first in the high jump and set a new school standard in the high hurdles by running the 120-yard distance in 15 seconds flat, snapping the old mark of 15.2 set by Bob McCabe in 1947.

Alex Olmedo Survives Test

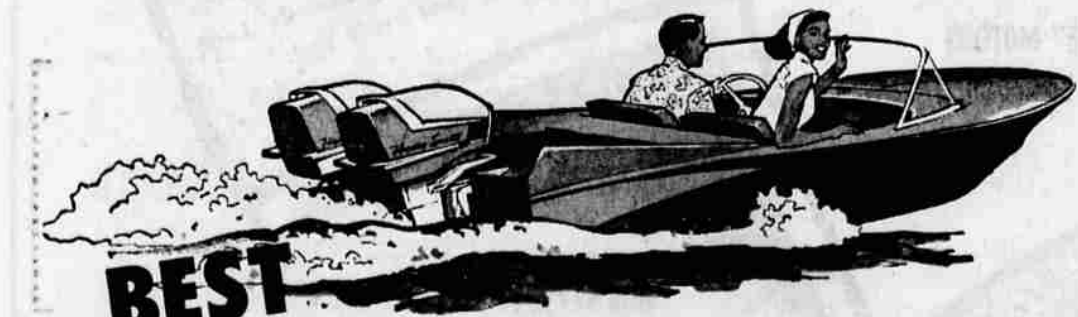
LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Top-seeded Alex Olmedo survived a surprise test Friday to score a comeback victory over Larry Nagler, 19, North Hollywood, Cal., in the quarter-finals of the Southern California Regional Tennis Tournament.

Olmedo, Davis Cup star, dropped the first set, 3-6, to the former third ranking junior player in the nation, then captured the 2-hour, 20-minute match by taking the next two sets, 6-4, 10-8.

Former Stanford quarterback Jack Douglas, also reached the semifinals and a place opposite Olmedo by downing Dennis Ralston, Bakersfield, 6-1, 6-6. Other quarter-final winners were Mike Franks, Los Angeles, over UCLA's Allan Fox, 6-3, 9-7, and Mike Green, Los Angeles and Miami Beach, Fla., over Noel Brown, Los Angeles, 6-3, 3-6, 7-5, in a mild upset.

With the exception of Beverly Fleitz, Belmont Shores, who played Thursday, all the semi-finalists among the women are teen-agers. Fifteen year old Cathy Chabot, San Diego, downed Barbara Brownrigg, Burbank, 6-1, 6-4; Karen Hantze, La Jolla, just turned 16, stopped Diane Wootton, Los Angeles, 6-3, 6-1, and Sally Moore, 19 year old Bakersfield performer, stopped Joan Johnson, Los Angeles, 6-2, 9-7.

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Popular Decision For Rudy

SYRACUSE, N.Y. (AP)—Rudy Stutch, a hero, said today he would fight "anybody that's ranked" after chopping out an impressive decision over Gaspar (Indian) Ortega.

Stutch, 26-year-old church elder from Louisville, Ky., had the wiry Ortega bloody and reeling after a fast 10 rounds in their welter-weight scrap Friday night.

His victory came only hours after Stutch was awarded the Carnegie Hero Fund Commission's bronze medal for dragging a man from the swift Ohio River in September, 1958.

A national radio and television audience saw Stutch almost finish Ortega in the third and eighth rounds, staggering the Indian from Mexican, Mexico, with crisp lefts and rights.

The decision was unanimous, although Judge Howard McGrath gave Stutch only five rounds to four for Ortega and one even.

Judge Dick Albino saw it 6-3-1 and referee Joe Palmer 6-2-2. The AP card had Stutch ahead, 7-1-2.

Ortega, a 27-year-old Sapoteo Indian, had taken a one-point decision from Stutch in their first meeting in New York's Madison Square Garden last Feb. 6.

However, Ortega suffered an eye cut in that fight that led to Friday night's defeat.

Stutch opened the cut early in the opening round and it was bleeding badly when the swift Negro staggered Ortega with a straight right to the jaw in the third.

Ted Williams Gives Advice

BOSTON (AP) — Ted Williams, baseball's keenest student of such matters, has some advice for pitchers—Beware the inside toss.

"Pitchers should watch games closely on television," the 40-year-old Boston star said today after a Fenway Park workout. "They'd soon learn the inside pitches are the ones that hurt them."

Sideline since late March due to a neck and shoulder ailment, the defending American League batting champion is going through a conditioning program expected to return him to action Tuesday.

"The pitch from the middle of the plate in to the batter is the one that kills them nine out of 10 times," Ted said.

"I've been saying it all alone but invariably the pitchers have an argument against it. Now I know I'm right. Nine out of 10 times the batter creams the inside pitch."

Williams explained that while he was recuperating he watched baseball closely on TV.

"The pitch away from the batter proves the safest in the book," he said.

"Sure the real good hitter can protect against the outside pitch. But I say let the good batter protect it. That's the pitch he'll hit for only a single. At most he might get a double on it."

"But there is no home run on the outside pitch."

"Say, what am I giving out this information for? I'm a hitter. Those pitchers should find out things for themselves."

Ore - Tech Nine Drops Opener With Portland State Vikings

PORTLAND (Special)—A three-run outburst in the ninth inning by Oregon Tech fell short of the mark here Friday and Portland State posted a 7-4 Oregon Collegiate Conference baseball victory in the opening game of a three-game series.

PSC starter and winner Roy Love had scattered six OTI hits and had allowed but one unearned run until the ninth inning when the Owls of coach Ralph Carr exploded for three runs. Virgil Winters opened the inning with a single and moved to second when Love hit second baseman Ron Downie. Charlie Wilson, peppery catcher, followed with a triple to right for two runs and scored himself when Ray Anderson committed a throwing error on pitcher Leroy Rauch's grounder.

Love then settled down and retired the side to preserve his fourth league win against two defeats. The PSC right-hander struck out one batter and didn't issue a walk as he went the distance. Rauch was the loser for the Owls, walking six and whiffing one.

Winters, with 2-4, paced Oregon Tech at the plate along with Wilson with that two-run ninth-inning triple.

For coach Mike Tichy's Vikings, third baseman Ray Anderson

and right fielder Gary Bishop all had two hits each. Bishop's triple was the only extra-base hit among the Viks' 11 safeties.

OTI's first run in the third inning came when third baseman Jim Cox singled home Wilson, who was on base via a throwing error by shortstop Dennis Heath.

Portland State's winning runs in the seventh frame came after two were out and were not earned. With two down, Ron Adams went all the way to third when first baseman Allen Leach let Rauch's throw slip past him after the OTI pitcher had fielded a routine grounder. Bishop singled Adams.
