

Hal Wood's Weekend Short Shots

PALM SPRINGS, Calif. (UPI)—In March of 1956, John Landy was well on his way to a new world record in the mile run in the Australian Track and Field Championships at Melbourne.

A rival, Ron Clarke, stumbled and fell in front of Landy. The lanky champion, instead of gunning past, stopped to help the fallen foe, thus losing a chance for his world mark.

But with the act, Landy made the Sportsman Hall of Fame, a body organized in 1943 and just coming to the attention of the public in recent years.

The Sportsman Hall of Fame was organized by E. P. Coleman, onetime very successful Texas and Arizona high school coach but now in business for himself as manager of the swank Firecliff Lodge in Palm Desert, Calif.

LOVE OF GAME
"We organized this hall of fame because we believed there was too much emphasis on winning in the sports pages of the nation," says Coleman. "For the outstanding act of sportsmanship each year, a panel of 50 sports writers around the country gives a plaque."

The sportsman hall of fame is growing, but not by leaps and bounds. It has sponsors, but not enough. It would like a building in which to place plaques and other items involved in a great act of sportsmanship.

Here are some of the great acts of sportsmanship that have been honored by this hall of fame:

In the 1925 national open golf championship, Bobby Jones stopped play during the final round and asked that he be penalized a stroke. He had moved his ball slightly in addressing it. Nobody saw the ball move except Jones. Willy McFarlane beat Jones by a single stroke for the championship.

PERRY MOSS
Perry Moss, onetime University of Illinois quarterback, interrupted a football game with Iowa, at risk of a penalty to his own club, to direct attention of officials to the grogginess of a rival Iowa lineman. If the play had gone on, the Iowa might have seriously been hurt.

Baron Pierre de Courbet, founder of the "modern" Olympic games. A man who believed if the youth of the world could be brought together in sports there would be no better way to promote mutual respect and understanding.

The late coach Tad Jones of Yale warned his players that Charlie Buell of Harvard, was playing with an injury. "The first player who roughs Buell will come out of the game and off the field," Jones told his players. Buell played the entire game and Yale lost.

Of such deeds is sportsmanhood built, and commemorated in the Sportsman Hall of Fame.

Senators Fall To Tri-City; Share Lead

The Eugene Emeralds won over the Bears on the strength of home runs by Joe Sparks, Chuck Hiller and Jerry Robinson. Sparks' blast was a two-run affair in the first frame. The other two were solo homers.

Yakima got into the power act too, with Herm Lewis clouting solo homers in the second and fifth innings.

Lewiston's Thornton Kipper twirled a neat six-hitter to lead the Braves past Wenatchee. Kipper gave up the Chiefs' lone run in the first inning.

Ron Wilkins' two-run double in the sixth frame broke a 1-1 tie and put Lewiston in the lead to stay.
