YREKA—Plans for the forthcoming point of discussion at the meeting of the Siskiyou Artists Association on Sunday afternoon, May 3, at the Yreka Inn, with the president, Mrs. Calla Lukes of Fort Jones conducting the session.

The artist's association, who established the annual event for the first time last year, have set up the dates of June 12, 13 and 14 for this year's event. This will be staged in the Melody Room of the Yreka Inn.

Mrs. Lucile Townley, vice president of the association and acting chairman, outlined some of the plans that have been completed and listed the names of chairmen, sub-chairmen and committee members.

Mrs. Townley stated committees will be at the Yreka Inn on Saturday and Sunday, June 6 and 7, to receive all phases of art work to be shown. Those named as the receiving committee included herself, as well as Mrs. Barbara Thompson, Mrs. Elsie Nelson, Mrs. Olga Owsley, Mrs. Margaret Dunham, Mrs. June Brite and Mrs. Betty Haig. Arranging and hanging of work will be directed by Keith Vidler.

The hospitality committee is headed by Mrs. Stella Fisher and Mrs. Ruby Churchill, who will be in charge of arranging for hostesses to serve tea, coffee and cookies for the three days. Mrs. Mae Stevens was named to be in charge of the guest book.

Mrs. Haig announced that she had received word from Hal Bishop of Medford that he would be happy to act as judge for the event. Bishop is a member and past president of the Southern Oregon Society of Artists. He is a graduate of the Otis Art Institute of Los Angeles, and was a teacher of art, for about eight years in Los Angeles city schools. He has been in business in Medford for several years and is doing considerable painting of murals throughout the state of Oregon.

Other chairmen and committee members include Ken Truelove, painting of posters; Mrs. Olga Owsley is in charge of preparing the program brochure; Mrs. Betty Dow, publicity director, with Mrs. Barbara Thompson to handle the radio and television publicity; Jerry Jenkins, past president of the organization, will make presentation of the various awards, which includes two top cash awards, contributed by the Yreka branches of the Bank of America and the Crocker-Anglo Bank; merchandise orders from Janson's Stationery and ribbons.

All mediums of art will be shown, including oils, watercolors, caseins, pastels, charcoal, pen and ink, pencil, sculpture and crafts. One of the major rules is that entries will be restricted to original works done within the past five years, and not previously shown at the last annual exhibit of the association. Interested artists in Siskiyou County are invited to participate, and it is recommended that they watch for further details at a future date.

A committee meeting will be held at the home of Mrs. Lucile Townley on Tuesday afternoon, June 2, at 1 p.m., when final preparations will be made.

Other business taken up at the May 3 meeting was the arrangement for a field trip. An invitation from Mrs. Artie Dudley and Mrs. Avis Smith of Scott Valley was accepted by association members, to hold the first field trip at Callahan on Sunday, May 17. The group will meet at 10 a.m. at Callahan, and spend the first portion of the day sketching and after lunch, painting. They are to bring sack lunches.

The meeting was closed with a social hour. Members viewed and criticized or commended the 28 pictures brought to the meeting for discussion.
