Mystery of the Elusive Vagrant

DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT John A. Meister
of Lorain, O., stared silently at the
body of Mrs. Mary Wallace on the bed-
room floor. Then he strode into the
living room. The disorder of the two
rooms showed that the attractive young
mother had put up a terrific struggle
before she was beaten and strangled.
Meister turned to the oldest boy, who
was trying manfully to control his tears.
He said his mother hadn't gone to work
that day because of a severe cold. Her
body had been found by the four chil-
dren after school.

A broken clock, which had stopped at
9, fixed the time of the crime; the killer
apparently had entered the house
shortly after the children left for school.
Contents of drawers scattered about the
floors suggested robbery.

The boy explained that his father
was in an institution, that his mother
had worked hard to keep the family
intact. She never had more than a few
dollars and he was sure she wouldn't
resist a robbery attempt.

Among the scattered papers were
several pictures. The boy identified the
photograph of a tall, smiling man as
that of Frank Naiberg, to whom Mrs.

Wallace had rented a room. But Nai-
berg had moved to Detroit.

Investigation revealed that at least
five men had been interested in Mrs.
Wallace, but she declined their ro-
mantic overtures. Four of the men
were found to be innocent.

The fifth man was Naiberg, the most
ardent of all. Mrs. Wallace had finally
asked him to move.

Investigation in Lorain turned up
two witnesses who had seen a tall man
on the Wallace block that day; one
recalled that he had stopped at the
victim's home. Then a third witness
was found; he had seen Frank Naiberg
in Lorain that morning.

Sure that he was on the right trail,
Meister learned that Naiberg was an
itinerant truck driver who worked in
many areas. Acquaintances said he
hitchhiked or rode freight trains be-
tween various cities.

Meister checked with railroads and
truck drivers, and inquired at truck-
stop restaurants. Naiberg was traced
to the Indiana state line, where the
trail abruptly vanished.

One thing puzzled Meister: Naiberg
knew that Mrs. Wallace had no money;

why had he gone through the drawers?
What was he looking for?

He searched the house again and
found the answer—a stack of letters
addressed to Naiberg. They were from
acquaintances in a dozen towns in the
East and Middlewest. Apparently Nai-
berg knew he'd had some mail, and
after the murder tried to find it so
police wouldn't know his whereabouts.

"He'll stay away from those places,"
Meister predicted. He enlisted the help
of the FBI, and "wanted" notices were
sent throughout the nation, describing
Naiberg as six feet two, weight 270,
very powerfully built.

Though the hunt was intensive
and Naiberg's description was posted
throughout the country, the fugitive
seemed to have vanished. Seven years
elapsed before he was finally trapped
by police in Los Angeles.

He was driving a truck and had to
make a delivery to a defense plant. A
routine check was made of his finger-
prints and he was quickly identified.

Naiberg confessed he had been ex-
tremely jealous of Mrs. Wallace, though
she spurned his advances. When she
resisted him, he strangled her.

Following the murder, Naiberg said
he had kept constantly on the move,
working only enough to get food. He
slept in vacant buildings until Winter;
then, to keep from freezing, he would
register at a police station as a vagrant
and spend the night in jail.

He even took a job for a few days in
a state penitentiary!

In all these places, "wanted" notices
for him were posted, but nobody ap-
parently recognized him.

Naiberg was convicted of murder on
June 2, 1945, and sentenced to death in
the electric chair.

By that time, Meister had become
chief of detectives. He had never given
up on the case and often wondered why
Naiberg had eluded capture. But when
he finally saw Naiberg, he realized that
the police description had been at least
partly responsible.

Naiberg had been helped by a strange
phenomenon. Though he was 42 years
old at the time, he began growing again.
His height shot up three inches and he
put on 30 pounds. He fooled all the
authorities because they had been in-
structed to look for a powerful man, six
feet two—not a giant, six feet five!
