

Fans Get Treatment, LA Back To Normal

Memo to baseball fans in Los Angeles: Your Dodgers are now back to normal — coming from behind, booting the other club ahead, then scrambling from behind again only to lose the lead before winning an 11-10 ball game on a squeeze bunt in the ninth.

That's exactly the way they beat Philadelphia in Los Angeles Monday night, staying within a half-game of Milwaukee's National League leading Braves with that 11-10 decision. It wasn't neat, but it was the Dodgers' third straight win by one run.

Norm Larker laid the hunt that brought in the winner for the Dodgers. Don Demeter opened the ninth with a double against losing reliever Jim Hearn (0-1). A couple of walks, sandwiching a sacrifice, loaded the bases. Larker then bunted perfectly on the first pitch by Ray Sempach, the Phils' fifth pitcher.

The Phils had run up a 3-0 lead in three innings against Dodger starter Stan Williams, but Los Angeles tied it in the fourth on an RBI single by Duke Snider, the first hit off Jim Owens, and a two-run single by John Roseboro. Then the Phils scored six in the fifth — two on Ed Bouchee's two-out homer and the rest unearned on errors by Charlie Neal, who had handled 182 chances perfectly since last Sept. 10, and Dug Zimnier.

OSC Wrestler Now Eligible

PORTLAND (AP) — Oregon State College wrestler Fritz Fithian became an American citizen Monday and now is eligible to travel to Europe this summer with an American wrestling team.

The goodwill tour is being sponsored by the U.S. State Department.

Fithian applied for citizenship under the law which grants it to any alien who has had three years of active military service with the United States.

The Immigration and Naturalization Service recommended denial of Fithian's application on the ground that his service was several months short of the required three years.

But Fithian pointed out that he had entered the reserve, U.S. Dist. Judge William G. East ruled that his reserve membership was active service and decided in favor of the 29-year-old Swiss.

Youngsters Eye Coffee 'Break'

Oregon Cindermen May Stage Runaway

EUGENE (AP) — The University of Oregon threatens to run off with the Pacific Coast Conference Northern Division track title in a meet here Saturday.

Oregon has depth and its men have had the best performances of the season in six of the 15 events. In three other events, Oregon men are tied for the top mark.

There are two Oregon men who are given a chance of winning two events, Roscoe Cook in the 100 and 220 and Jim Grelle in the mile and half-mile. Another possible double winner is a Washington State man, Spike Arlt.

Terry Tobacco of Washington had his best time of the year this past week, doing the 440 in 48.2 seconds. This equaled the best previous time this season, by Otis Davis of Oregon.

Don Maw of Washington State equaled Cook's best time in the 220-yard dash last weekend, 21.2 seconds.

A. Bathgate Selected MVP

MONTREAL (AP) — The most valuable player in the National Hockey League during the past season was a man whose team didn't even make the postseason playoffs.

He was Andy Bathgate of the New York Rangers, who scored 40 goals for his team although he skated with two damaged knees. He received the Hart Trophy, symbol of the honor, and \$1,000 in cash.

Bathgate was the one-sided choice of the sports writers and broadcasters in the league who vote on the award. He drew 133 points. Gordie Howe of Detroit was second with 60.

Bathgate played with a silver plate in his left knee and a steel brace on his right. Nevertheless, he scored 40 goals and had 48 assists for 88 points. He was third in the individual scoring race.

BALTIMORE (AP) — The early odds-makers figure trainer Reggie Cornell has already made good on his 1958 vow to come back to the Preakness "some day with a better horse."

Cornell, who made the promise after his much publicized Silky Sullivan ran a ludicrous eighth in last year's big Pimlico race, is back for Saturday's edition with Royal Orbit.

Off his come-from-behind victory in the Preakness Prep Monday, following up his fast-finishing fourth in the Kentucky Derby, Royal Orbit was tabbed the probable third choice at 4-1 in the first line released by the track for the \$150,000-added Preakness.

As expected, Brookmeade's Sword Dancer, second by a nose to now-absent Tomy Lee in the derby, was figured as the likely 2-1 choice, with Christopher T. Cheney's First Landing, the third derby finisher, next at 3-1.

Red China Move Makes Avery Smile

NEW YORK (AP) — Avery Brundage, president of the International Olympic Committee, smiled today and recalled Communist China's promise of a year ago.

"Red China resigned from the Olympic movement," said the Chicago hotel owner, "and said that she would stay out so long as Avery Brundage, 'that agent of the imperialistic State Department,' headed it."

Now Red China wants back in. Brundage leaves Wednesday for the executive session of the IOC meeting starting May 23 in Munich and there is a request by Russia to place the admission of Red China on the agenda.

"We try to keep out of politics," he sighed. "We don't recognize governments. We recognize only national Olympic committees, federations and sportsmen."

"Red China is going to demand at our meeting that it be in control of all Chinese athletes all over the world."

The reason Red China gave for resigning from the Olympic movement was that it objected to Nationalist China competing for Formosa.

Brundage wouldn't say what chance Red China has of being readmitted but did point out that there was nothing to prevent the country from getting back in the fold so long as it followed the Olympic rule of calling for no distinction between race, religion or political beliefs.
