NEW YORK (AP)—Five of the six nonprofit hospitals struck by nonprofessional workers have temporarily postponed plans to seek court injunctions against the strike. Mayor Robert F. Wagner announced today.

The sixth hospital, which had obtained an injunction, is not expected to immediately press a contempt action against the striking workers, according to the mayor.

Workers involved in the strike by Local 1199 of the Retail Drug Employees Union also include nurses aides, kitchen help, elevator operators and orderlies.

The union called the strike in its demand for recognition as bargaining agent.

Atom Airships Seen By 1963

WASHINGTON (AP)—A huge atomic-powered airship three times as big as the blimps now in use could be put into operation by 1963, the Navy has been informed.

Goodyear Tire & Rubber Co. and Goodyear Aircraft Corp. said the 4 1/2-million-cubic-foot nonrigid airship could be launched before a nuclear-powered airplane is flown, thus becoming America's first aircraft to harness the energy of the atom.

Goodyear officials said the ship could operate at speeds of 80 to 92 miles an hour and with virtually unlimited range.

Negro Weapons Plan Offered

NEW YORK (AP)—A suspended official of the National Assn. for the Advancement of Colored People told reporters Monday that Southern Negroes should carry arms.

Robert E. Williams, 44, Negro and former combat Marine, was suspended by NAACP Executive Secretary Roy Wilkins last Wednesday for urging Southern Negroes to "fight violence with violence." Williams had been president of the Union County, N.C., branch of the NAACP. The NAACP's board of directors, with 18 of its 43 members present voted support of Wilkins, maintaining the association has always opposed violence. Williams stuck to his stand.
