Red Minister Making Play To Germans

GENEVA (AP)—Andrei Gromyko is making a big play to 72 million Germans at the Big Four foreign ministers' conference. His first major gambit—a demand that Communist East Germany join the conference as a full participant—was designed to portray Moscow as the champion of the Germans. Implicit in his proposal was the inclusion also of the West German government as an equal partner. Gromyko probably had little expectation that the U.S., British and French foreign ministers would agree. The Western powers had made plain they would admit the Germans only as observers or advisers. But the anticipated Western reaction, and the agreement finally reached Monday on limited German participation, gives the Soviet propaganda ammunition now to charge that the Western foreign ministers have moved the Germans into a second-class status. On the other hand, Western acceptance of the Germans as full members of the conference would have given Gromyko one of his major objectives: Western recognition of the East German Communist regime. Such Western recognition would go far toward convincing the 17 million restless East Germans they have no hope of liberation from the Communist yoke.

Italian Actress Asked To Court

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (AP)—Italian actress Pier Angeli is under orders to appear May 29 to answer why she shouldn't be cited for contempt of court. Her former husband, singer Vic Damone, sought the contempt citation in court Monday. Miss Angeli flew to Europe April 14 with the couple's 3-year-old son, Perry. A few hours after Damone obtained a court order prohibiting her from taking the child out of the country. She got a divorce last December, charging Damone was insanely jealous.

Hoffa Ousting Seen By Chief

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—Secretary of Labor James P. Mitchell predicts Teamsters Union members themselves ultimately will get rid of Teamsters President James R. Hoffa. "If new laws are passed to force disclosure of union finances," Mitchell told the Dade County American Red Cross chapter Monday night, "the Teamsters themselves with help from the AFL-CIO will succeed in getting rid of Hoffa and his immediate obnoxious associates."

Ships Using New Seaway Meet Finance Trouble

CHICAGO (AP)—Large ocean ships, venturing into the Great Lakes for the first time with opening of the St. Lawrence Seaway, have run into some stormy operating and financial weather. By far the most agonizing thing for shippers has been the traffic jams caused by late lingering ice in the St. Lawrence River. Lost operating days cost money. One line's operations chief was asked to estimate losses represented by the pileup of ships in southwestern Lake Ontario at the Welland Canal. "I've been biting my nails for three weeks," he said. "I'd be tearing my hair if I dared face it."

Vet Scribe Dead At 90

HENDERSONVILLE, N.C. (AP)—Samuel M. Williams, who worked in key positions for William Randolph Hearst and Joseph Pulitzer in his 50 years as a newspaperman, died Monday at 90. He came here when he retired 10 years ago. Williams, a native of Norwalk, Ohio, began his career as a reporter on the old Cleveland Press. Later he became city editor. Subsequently he joined Joseph Pulitzer's old New York World. He took a job as managing editor of the New York Evening Journal when it was founded by Hearst. He was sent to cover the Spanish-American War, but before the war ended, he was sent to London as Hearst's foreign bureau chief. Williams served for a time as editor of Frank A. Munsey's New York News, and then rejoined the World. After that, he spent six months a year traveling with Pulitzer and the rest on political reporting. In 1931, he went to St. Paul, Minn., as editor-in-chief of the Pioneer Press and Evening Dispatch. He later returned to New York as manager of the Daily Newspaper Code Authority.

Singer Cancels Personal Tour

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Actress-singer Doris Day has canceled an East Coast personal appearance tour because of illness, her studio says. A Columbia Pictures spokesman said Miss Day became ill Saturday in Cincinnati, her home town. She is suffering from mononucleosis, a blood condition characterized by a feeling of weakness. Cincinnati was the first stop on a tour to promote her latest movie "It Happened to Jane."

GOP Gains Talking Point As Unemployment Drops

WASHINGTON (AP)—A sharp drop in unemployment gave congressional Republicans a new talking point today in their efforts to scale down Democratic spending proposals aimed at producing more jobs. Sen. Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois, Republican Senate leader, predicted that a 735,000 decline in the number of jobless in April will slow down the opposition party's drive to enact housing, depressed areas and airports legislation. These bills call for much larger outlays than President Eisenhower proposed. Dirksen said the 65 million Americans reported by the Commerce and Labor departments to

Crowd Lauds Judy Garland

NEW YORK (AP)—All Judy Garland could say was, "My goodness gracious sakes alive!" It was her answer to a long ovation Monday night at the Metropolitan Opera House, at the opening of a one-week run with her own show in that hallowed hall of culture. It was the first time that a star from the world of night clubs and Broadway had taken the Met stage for a full program since Sir Harry Lauder did it years ago. The show displayed Judy in golden voice, sleeker, surer and lustier than ever. Miss Garland holds the spotlight in a mélange of nostalgia and virtuosity that has been expertly packaged and lavishly mounted by her producer-husband Sidney Luit. Spelling her in the bill are Alan King, an impetuously aggressive comic, dancer John W. Bubbles and a lively young ensemble of singers and dancers. Judy starts quietly, in proper dowager gown of garnet tulle, gains momentum in her famous black tights—the legs are still elegant—and then winds up in tramp's garb for a rousing medley. Cries for "more" interrupted the show. Her engagement here is a benefit for the Asthma Research Institute.

Negotiations Continuing

NEW YORK (AP)—Contract talks aimed at preventing a nationwide steel strike continue today, with the Steelworkers Union expected to press a demand for a 38-hour week. David J. McDonald, Steelworkers president, has said only that shorter hours, higher wages and contract improvements will be sought. It was understood, however, that the union favors a plan of three five-day weeks followed by a single four-day week—all at eight hours a day—which averages 38 hours a week. Industry spokesmen, representing 12 major steel companies, gave no sign of wavering in their insistence that a one-year freeze on wages and fringe benefits is the best way to check both inflation and unemployment. Contracts covering a half million Steelworkers in plants producing 80 per cent of the nation's steel expire June 30. The present average wage is \$3.03 an hour, and the price of steel is \$150 a ton. The cost of the 38-hour week has been estimated at 15 cents an hour.

Algeria Truce Rumors Spread

PARIS (AP)—Rumors spread through political circles in Paris today that active negotiations are under way for a truce in Algeria. No one in an official position would comment. If the rumors are true, it is probable that the negotiations are being directed personally by President De Gaulle, who said recently "the day is in sight when Algeria will be pacified." He gave no date or details. According to the rumors, any settlement would start off with an admission by France that the Nationalists have not been defeated. This would be a face-saving concession to the rebels.

They were identified as Olaf Evald Bong, Fort Bragg, Calif.; Mrs. Patricia Olson, also of Fort Bragg, and her infant son. On Sunday, rescuers found the remains of William F. Rogers, of Longview, Wash.; Mrs. Ted Nimmo, wife of a Reedspoint police patrolman; and Mrs. Bong. Funeral services will be held here for Mrs. Nimmo Wednesday. The body of the pilot, Rogers, was sent to Longview, Wash. The light plane plunged into the Umpqua River late Saturday after hitting a power line stretched across the river.

Rooney Ex-Wife Given Money

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—A \$300,000 property settlement has paved the way for Mickey Rooney's fourth divorce. The pint-sized actor Monday agreed to pay actress Elaine Mahken \$1,750 a month for 21 months. Minneapolis Officer Slain In Supermarket Gun Battle

MINNEAPOLIS (AP)—A policeman was killed; one of two gunmen critically wounded and a bystander shot in a gunfight during the holdup of a Minneapolis supermarket Monday night. Felled in front of the store was Sgt. William Herkal, 33. He died with three bullet wounds in his chest. Seconds later, Jerry Gowdy, 22, of Greybull, Wyo., identified as one of the bandits, crumpled under the blast of a riot gun fired by Patrolman Jake Lindgren. Taken into custody inside the market was a man identified as John Brewer, also 22 and from Greybull. A silent alarm had summoned police as Gowdy and Brewer demanded that Ralph Scheffler, the store manager, open the safe. Detective Wayne Leonard and Patrolman Durwood Witt were waiting when the pair rushed out of the office, Gowdy's fist crumpled with currency.

Witt subdued Brewer, but Gowdy drew a .38 pistol and fired at Leonard. As the detective returned fire, Gowdy ran for the front door. Gowdy fell wounded but quickly regained his feet. He ran outside to meet and
