**South Leader Raps Dillon**

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Russell B. Long (D-La.) raised a roadblock today to speedy Senate approval of C. Douglas Dillon's promotion to the No. 2 spot in the State Department.

When Dillon's nomination reaches the Senate floor, Long said, "I may speak for a day, or even two days, to illustrate why we have spent so many billions in other countries and in some instances gotten nothing but hatred in return, under the type of leadership represented by Mr. Dillon."

Long is the only announced opponent of the nomination, which was received with enthusiasm Tuesday by most of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

Dillon faced more fire from another source today. He was called before a closed session of the committee for further questioning about putting secret labels on country-by-country breakdowns of foreign military aid.

Sen. Frank Church (D-Idaho) protested secret classification of military programs in Latin America.

The opposition of Long and Church delayed a committee vote on Dillon's nomination as first under secretary of state. This is the spot Christian A. Herter vacated when he was named secretary to succeed the ailing John Foster Dulles.

The dispute over Dillon temporarily overshadowed consideration of the nomination of Ogden R. Reid, 33, former president of the New York Herald Tribune, as ambassador to Israel.

Reid, on the stand only briefly, was asked to return Tuesday for questioning on his qualifications.

**Group Vetoes Award Return**

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Fred Astaire, whose 1958 TV spectacular danced off with nine Emmys, wants to return his "best actor" award.

But a spokesman for the Academy of Television Arts and Sciences says the award was won fairly by Astaire—and it is his.

Astaire said through a spokesman he wanted to return the award because of confusion over the "best actor" category. Some critics, including Ed Sullivan, contend the Emmy should have gone for a dramatic instead of a dancing performance.

"I don't think anyone will disagree that Mr. Astaire is an actor and that he gave a great performance," replied Thomas Freeman-Smith, Academy executive secretary. He indicated the matter was closed.

**Unions Mount Big Drive To Kill Senate Measure**

WASHINGTON (AP)—Labor unions, through breakfasts for congressmen and other forms of lobbying, are mounting a growing drive to revamp sharply or kill the Senate-passed labor regulation bill.

John L. Lewis, the veteran United Mine Workers Union president, was to register his opposition today before a House Labor subcommittee.

The 77-year-old Lewis repeatedly was counseled against any new labor anti-corruption legislation. He says the problem is an internal one for unions to solve and, anyway, there are plenty of laws against embezzlement to curb union frauds if the laws are enforced.

Meanwhile the AFL-CIO, which supported the original Senate bill before amendments were added in the Senate, indicated a switch in sentiment. The AFL-CIO Executive Council is to meet here next week to go over the Senate version section by section.

**Photog Belted; Unionist Fined**

HONOLULU (AP)—Carpenters Union leader Jack C. Reynolds was fined \$25 for attacking photographer Warren Hottel of the Honolulu Star Bulletin.

Judge Harry Steiner imposed the fine Tuesday and commented, "Some people take offense to having their pictures taken, but this is no reason for laying a hand on a photographer."

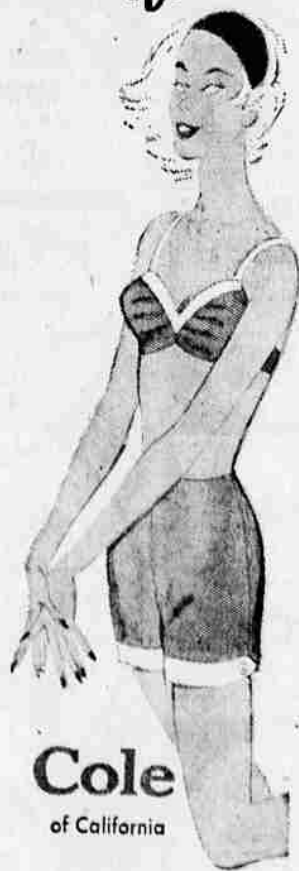

James R. Hoffa's Teamsters Union came out with a broadside against the Senate bill while union members were quietly breakfasting groups of congressmen have been contacted by our representatives. It's just normal lobbying procedure.

Hoffa was quoted in a new issue of the Teamsters' magazine as saying "we favor constructive legislation. We are opposed to corruption. But the bills currently passed or proposed are not constructive."

Hoffa urged Teamsters local unions to deluge House members with telegrams to revise Senate bill curbs on boycotts and picketing, powers given the secretary of labor over unions, and bans against criminals holding union office.

Teamsters locals were urged to

impress on their congressmen the importance of voting against the Kennedy bill if it contains any one "of those or a dozen other provisions Hoffa found objectionable."
