The Klamath Union baseball team gets its big chance to put some real distance between themselves and the bottom rung of the Southern Oregon Conference ladder when it tangles with the Craterians in a twin bill beginning at 1:30 in Gem Stadium Friday afternoon.

Both ends of the two-header are league "counters," a measure being taken to make up for the "rainouts" and "flu-outs" experienced by the two clubs in earlier tries.

The Whitebirds and the Comets enter the series hooked into a tie for third place on the ladder, with identical 1-win, 3-loss records for the SOC season to date.

Although a pair of wins Friday could give coach Dean White a clear cut hold on third place, the powerful league leaders, unbeaten Medford and once-beaten Grants Pass who mix in Medford Friday, are too far out in front to succumb to any Pelican threat.

A thought expressed by Pel boss White, "That three week layoff from competition didn't do us any good," seems to fairly well describe the squad from Central Point, although the KU nine got a couple of games under its belt last weekend while the Comets returned to work just yesterday.

The Oregon Tech Owl baseball squad checked in its gear Monday after the close of the 1959 baseball season which ended with three defeats in Portland last weekend at the hands of the Portland State Vikings.

The three game series rang down the curtain on a season during which the Owls, coached by Ralph Carr, collected three wins against nine losses in Oregon Collegiate Conference action and an overall season record of six wins against 14 losses.

Henley Wins 12-4 Contest Over Tule

Henley's Gary Bebbler turned in a 14 - strike out performance against Tulelake Wednesday afternoon at Henley to lead the Hornets to a 12-4 win in a non-county baseball game on the county scene. The Hornets broke open the contest in the fifth inning when they chased across eight runs with the help of five Tulelake walks off three different Hornet hurlers. Another three tallies in the sixth iced the game for Henley.

Bebbler, yielding only four safeties, gave up three bases on balls in addition to his sparkling strike out stint during the six innings he worked on the mound. Sophomore Larry Lugo came on in the seventh to wrap up the sixth Henley victory of the season against two losses.

Tom McBride's two-run double to left field, and consecutive singles by Dick Reiling and John Crumrine which chased across three more tallies were the big blows in the eight-run uprising staged by the home team in the fifth inning. Going into the bottom of the fateful fifth, the Tulelake squad held a commanding 4-1 lead.

The visitors opened the scoring in the second stanza on a walk and two wild pitches, added a pair in the third on a fielder's choice and two throwing errors on the part of Hornets' Joe DeGrande and Bebbler and another lone tally in the fifth on a third Henley miscue and singles by John Davidson and Jim Long.

Warren Spahn Hurls 250th Win; White Sox Crowding Clevelanders

Warren Spahn, his 250th victory in the record book, may be the top-winning left-hander in National League history by the end of the season.

Spahn became the 25th pitcher ever to reach the 250-mark when he hurled the Milwaukee Braves to a 3-2 victory over the St. Louis Cardinals Wednesday night. Carl Hubbell with 253 wins and Eppa Rixey with 266 are the only National League lefties ahead of him and above them are only American Leaguers Lefty Grove with 300 and Eddie Plank with 324.

At 38, Spahn has had a bit of trouble getting started this year but he picked on one of his favorite "cousins" Wednesday night. Spahn has scored two of his 1959 wins over the Cardinals and has a 53-29 lifetime edge over them.

The victory lifted the Braves back into first place when the Pittsburgh Pirates downed the Los Angeles Dodgers, 6-4, in a

two-run eighth-inning homer by Dick Stuart. The San Francisco Giants beat the Philadelphia Phillies, 6-0, and the Chicago Cubs whipped the Cincinnati Reds, 10-0, in the other National League games. The Chicago White Sox downed the Boston Red Sox, 4-0, in the only American League activity.

Braves 3, Cards 2
Spahn got the run he needed to beat Larry Jackson when Bill Bruton homered with two out in the eighth inning. Alex Grammas had nicked Spahn for a two-run double in the second inning but the Braves tied the score in the fourth on a walk, singles by Eddie Mathews and Wes Covington, an infield out and Del Crandall's sacrifice fly.

Giants 6, Phils 0
Sam Jones struck out an N.L. season high of 12 batters with a brilliant two-hitter for the Giants who clinched matters early by scoring five runs in the first inning. Willie Mays' three-run homer was the big blow of that frame and Leon Wagner homered in the third. Jones had a no-hitter until Willie Jones beat out a bleeder in the seventh. Gene Freese singled cleanly for the other Philadelphia hit in the eighth. The victory moved the Giants into third place.

Pirates 6, Bums 4
Stuart's winning homer for Pittsburgh overcame a 4-3 Dodger lead which resulted from Don Demeter's eighth homer of the season. Elroy Face, the Pirates' brilliant, 155-pound reliever, took over in the seventh inning and gained

credit for his fifth straight victory. The loser was Don Drysdale who yielded eight hits in seven innings. Smoky Burgess had three hits and started the game-winning rally with a single.

Cubs 10, Redlegs 0
Ernie Banks hit a grand slam homer to cap a seven-run third-inning rally during which the Cubs routed Bob Purkey and the Chicago shortstop drove in a fifth run before the rout was over. Glen Hobbie fired a three-hitter and struck out six in achieving his third complete game and fourth win. It was the first time Cincinnati was shut out this year.

Chicago 4, Boston 0
The White Sox moved to within one game of the A.L. leading Cleveland Indians on the strength of Bob Shaw's five-hit pitching. Jim Landis, Sherman Lollar, Del Emis and Earl Torgeson had two hits each for the White Sox who won their winning streak to five games.

KU Frosh Prepared For Test

Coach Gene Strehlow and his Klamath Union freshman track team are finishing up final practice sessions today prior to entering the frosh district track meet at Medford Friday. Schools competing include Hedrick and McLoughlin from Medford, both North and South from Grants Pass, Ashland and Crater, in addition to the baby Pels.

This year's powerful frosh crew has proved its power in the five new track and field records which have been set since the first of the season. Ron Simpson owns two of the new marks, the 75-yard dash and the 100-yard dash.

Little Eric Peterson broke the record in the 660-yard dash with a time of 1:34.4 erasing the old mark of 1:36.2 set by Larry Jones in 1956. Dana Ash clipped .1 of a second off the record in the 70-yard high hurdles last weekend when he raced over the high sticks in 10.9 seconds and Bob Dearing set a new standard in the pole vault with a leap of 10 feet even, canceling the old record of 9-8 set by Jerry Hamilton in 1954.

Other entrants for the frosh in the district meet on Friday will be Earl Brinson in the 75, 150 and broad jump, Simpson in the 330, Bob McKinnin in the 1320, Dearing in the 660, Dave Burnett in the hurdle events, Peterson in the low hurdles, Gary Buchholz in the high jump and Gary Patzke in the shot put.

OUT OF DOORS with Field & Stream

They may be a pain in the neck to service station operators and the bane of the traveling salesman's existence but the bugs that have clobbered your windshield in the last couple of days bode good news for the fishermen. Or so claim the fishing experts around town.

So, if the weather stays warm, as the bugs indicate it might, and the fish hear about it, some pretty fair catches should be registered before another weekend is done.

According to all reports, up until Tuesday, the past week hadn't shown anything spectacular although Gerber Dam has been producing a lot of crappie. Lost River has been fair for bass and Seven Mile has offered up some fair catches to bait fishermen.

Klamath River has been fair to good but the lakes are as yet below par.

Jenny Creek, if you don't mind an occasional snake or two, should be about ready for some good fishing as should Dairy Creek, Merrill Creek, Cottonwood, the Sycan and both north and south branches of the Sprague.

Fishing is good at Wickiup Reservoir on trout, spinner and worms and spinner with gold or green flatfish. The Deschutes River above Bend is also good for trolling and bank fishing. A few large brown trout have been taken at Suttle Lake and limit catches of rainbow or flatfish are also reported. Angling at Pelton Reservoir is very good on practically any lure. Average size range is 9-15 inches but several large fish have been taken. Although fishing has been slow at Crescent Lake, anglers are starting to pick up a few kokanee. Odell Lake has been good for kokanee from 13-17 inches, lake trout from 8-11 pounds and rainbow from 10-12 inches.

The first of two completely refrigerated tank units that hold water at constant cold temperatures joined the fleet of game commission liberation trucks last week in stocking fish into Oregon's lakes and streams.

This latest innovation in fish transportation is the brain child of the game commission's engineering and fishery staff in an attempt to find more efficient means of giving trout, salmon, and steelhead a "real cool" ride from hatchery to release point in order to increase hauling capacity and reduce hauling losses and transportation costs.

The refrigerated tanker is now undergoing test runs in various areas of the state. Reino Koski, chief of liberations for the game commission, said that loads of fish have been hauled for periods of seven hours at water temperatures of 41 degrees with no fish loss and without the necessity of ice.

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
