

Letter Asks Police Chief To Resign

DORRIS—An anonymous letter, signed by "Hardworkers and Tax-paying Citizens of Dorris," was read by the city clerk to members of the Dorris city council on Monday night.

The letter requested the dismissal of Dorris police chief, Byard Kelly, and complained that Kelly does not do his duties, and has become a "luxury" that we can no longer afford.

It listed many complaints against Kelly. Mayor Robert Edgar said he thought Kelly was doing a "reasonably" fair job and said it was impossible "for a man to work 27 hours a day without rest."

After the meeting Richard Fenwick, who had come to the defense of Kelly, and Police Commissioner Cal Gray inspected the jail and more washrooms and found them dirty as charged in the letter.

The council also voted to write a strong letter of protest to legislators of any public utilities tax shift to public property taxpayers.

Virginia Hamilton, city clerk, told the council that \$1,744 is available for street construction. This is a holdover from fiscal year 1958-59. She also said that \$1,800 for 1959-60 can be budgeted for additional construction.

The council denied a request from the Cascade Wonderland Association asking the city for \$100 for promotional activities.

Ray McIntyre, a trustee of the Joint Union High School board, attended the meeting to get clarification of the recent raise in water rates to the high school. He agreed with the council that it is a just raise. McIntyre also assured the council that the city would receive a deed to a 16 foot right-of-way adjacent to the high school in return for city closing of portions of streets at the school.

Not present for the evening's ceremonies was the new secretary, Ronald Harrison.

'Get Dog Licenses Now,' County Poundmaster Urges

There still are more than a few unlicensed dogs in Klamath County, and it behooves their owners to obtain licenses now.

So reports Bill Schlegel, county poundmaster, who says owners of unlicensed dogs face a possible fine of \$10 in addition to license fees and penalties.

So far, Schlegel said, he has issued warnings to a good many dog owners and all but two ob-

tained licenses before having to go to court. But two Chiloquin owners appeared in Wood River District Court and each paid a \$5 fine in addition to penalty and license fees, he said.

The city of Klamath Falls has made four arrests for violation of dog ordinances, in which case owners have paid \$5 fines. Meanwhile, the office of County Clerk Charley DeLap reports 4,922 dog licenses sold this year. That figure compares with 5,252 licenses sold in 1958, "so many dogs still are without licenses."

The fees are \$2 for males or spayed females and \$3 for female. The deadline, however, was March 1, so owners now must pay a penalty of \$2 per license, and of course face a possible fine.

Licenses are required for all dog owners before March 1 and for any dog in the possession of his present owner for 30 days.

So far this year, from January 1 to May 1, the county clerk's office sold \$10,502 worth of dog licenses—\$7,311 for dogs in the county and \$3,191 for dogs in the city. The total compares with \$11,620 worth of licenses sold in 1958.

County Notes Family Hike

Klamath County gained 77 new families last month, the chamber of commerce reported in the May issue of Klamath Keynotes issued today.

The families, including 252 persons, largely came from neighboring states. The chamber said 30 families came from California, 25 from Washington and six from other Oregon communities.

Four families moved here from Texas, two each from England and Tennessee, and one each from Alabama, Arizona, Germany, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, Oklahoma and Spain.

The chamber also noted an increase in bank debits in the county for April. During the month, the chamber said, bank debits amounted to \$31,569,513, compared with \$28,896,400 in March and \$24,009,121 in April a year ago.

Parking meter receipts rose from \$5,415 in March to \$5,593 in April, and water use permits rose from 8,931 in March to 8,996 in April.

Postal receipts were down, from \$33,638 in March to \$31,812 in April, but still were well above receipts in April a year ago, \$23,819.

Values of building permits dropped sharply, from \$696,565 in March to \$168,010 in April. Permits in April last year amounted to \$353,750.
