Henley Wins Third Place At District

ASHLAND — Klamath County's lone A-2 school, Henley, placed four team members in next week's state A-2 track meet by scoring two first places and three seconds in the district meet held here Saturday. The four Hornets placing in next weekend's state meet at Corvallis were first place winners Burrell Gohber and Floyd Kendall and second place finishers Cliff Long and Phil Swisher. Gohber also was awarded a second place ribbon to go with his first.

Henley finished third in the meet with a total of 67 points while Phoenix walked off with top honors by piling up 88 points. Eagle Point finishing second with 79 tallies.

Kendall, a sophomore, broke the school record by sweeping to victory in the mile with a time of 4:52.5. The old record of 4:52.6 was set by Henry Williams in 1952.

The versatile Gohber, in winning the high jump, tied the district mark with a leap of 5 feet, 11 inches. His second place finish was in the high hurdles behind Phoenix's Bill Dillre.

The husky Swisher, failing below his best throw of the year of 133 feet, 10 inches, grabbed second in the discus, being edged out by Myrtle Creek's Doug Klimback who won the event with a toss of 132 feet, 5 inches.

Long, the other Hornet to place in the upcoming state meet, also set a new school record in placing second in the 440-yard dash. Long and Myrtle Creek's Harold Harkema finished in a dead heat in an identical time of 2:05.5 with Harkema being awarded first place by a hair-thin margin. Long's time clipped one-tenth of a second off 2:06.6 set by Fred Beamer in 1942.

Bill Turner and Ted Berryman, both of Eagle Point, set new district records in the meet. Turner winning the 100-yard dash in a time of 10.1 while Berryman swept the 440 in a time of 52.3.

Other first place winners in the meet were Phoenix's Dillre in the low hurdles as well as the highs. EP's Turner in the 220, EP's Larry McClure in the broad jump, Mike Hanby of Illinois Valley in the pole vault, teammate Dan Slanaker in the javelin and EP's Chuck Hoffman in the shot put. Eagle Point also won the relay event.

Chavez Family Plans To Move

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The battling Archegias are making plans to fold their tent and depart Chavez Ravine. This weekend perhaps.

The whole thing depends on getting chicken wire so we can take the chickens with us," said Manuel Archegia, 72.

The move is only a partial victory for the city and the Dodgers. The evicted family agreed to take the ravine only when a city councilman brought assurances—in writing—that leaving would not jeopardize the family's property fight with the city.

This, coupled with urging by a daughter who had left earlier, did the trick.

Two homes owned by the Archegias, condemned originally in 1933, were bulldozed to rubble May 8. The city now wants the property to turn over to the Dodgers as part of the land needed for a baseball stadium and recreation area.

The Archegias want more money than the \$10,500 awarded in the condemnation proceedings.

Pel Trackmen Nab 4th In District Test

GRANTS PASS — Pelican Bob Drace collected first places in each of the high hurdles, the low and the high jump to lead his Klamath Union track teammates to a fourth place in the District 6 A-1 track meet held here Saturday.

Drace, off his performances, guaranteed himself a berth in the state championships slated for Eugene next weekend.

The Pelis, with 50½ points, trailed the winners, Grants Pass, second place Medford and Central Point. The Cavemen amassed 165½ points, Medford 116½ and Central Point hauled down 72.

A six-foot even high jump by Drace coupled with a third win in the low hurdles which he cleared in :20.4, gave the KU team all the first place finishes they were to land.

Big Bob Lewis, another ex-Pel basketball star, added a third place in the high jump behind Drace.

Other Pelicans to count precious points were Gary Hancock who landed a fifth in the discus with a heave of 132 feet even; Bill Sprout who finished sixth in the mile with his best time of the season; and freshman Ron Simpson who romped to a sixth in the 440-yard dash behind junior Jim Parks who collected a fourth.

The Pelican relay squad, consisting of leadoff man Bob Egge, Don Story, Santo and an armchair Drace turned in the fastest time of their careers but had to settle for a third.

Sam Snead Leads His Own Festival

WHITE SULPHUR SPRINGS, W.Va. (AP)—Sam Snead, in the twilight of one of golf's greatest careers, shot his best competitive round and one of the best ever in the United States Saturday — a fantastic 59—in the third round of the Sam Snead Festival.

Snead, who will be 47 on May 27, was 11 strokes under par on the 6,317-yard course where he has been pro for more than a quarter of a century. Only one other competitive 59 for 18 holes has been recorded, by Earl Fry of Alameda in a Northern California tournament on a municipal course.

The Professional Golfers Assn. tournament record low is 63. It has been carded by seven golfers, the most recent being Snead himself in winning the 1957 Dallas Open.

The barrage of 9 birdies and an eagle left Snead with a 54-hole total of 196—14 under par—going into the final round of the \$10,000 affair Sunday.

He has an 8-stroke lead over runner-up Dutch Harrison of St. Louis, who started the day leading Snead by a stroke with a 36-hole of 136. Harrison carded his third straight 68 for a 54-hole total of 204.

Husky Mike Seuchak of Grosinger, N.Y., fired a 66 to move into third place at 205, followed by Ed (Porky) Oliver of Denver at 206. Oliver also had a 66 Saturday.

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Malin Mustangs Win District 5-B Crown

With a curve ball working like the business end of a bullwhip in the hands of an expert Mustang pitcher Randy Miller twirled 14 strikeouts and allowed only two hits as the Malin High School baseball team trounced the Prospect Cougars 4-1 for the District 5-B championship in an intermittent drizzle in Gem Stadium Saturday afternoon.

Miller, who appeared to be hooked in a titanic pitcher's duel with Prospect's Tom Davidson, at least until a big Malin fifth inning, powered a full-count third strike past the last man up as the skies opened up and the rains came for certain.

After hitting the first man to face him, Cougar Bob Kitch, the tall Malin right-hander pulled himself out of a hole by forcing clean-up hitter Floyd Scaiffe to fly to right and then on a relay of throws caught Kitch off third thus stifling a Cougar opening bid.

In the top of the seventh the small but enthusiastic crowd of damp spectators warmed up when, after two were gone, Prospect catcher Cliff Chapman popped a grounder through the legs of the Malin shortstop Jim Owens and landed on first base. Chapman sped for second on the next pitch and Mustang catcher Rick Illian overthrew second in trying to catch him. Chapman made third.

On the next pitch Miller tossed his only wild pitch of the game and the speedy Little Chapman crossed the plate with the Cougar marker. It turned out to be a futile hope for the Prospect gallery as Miller settled down for his 14th strikeout.

Sharing honors with his pitcher

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as the Malin hero, catcher Rick Illian led all the hitters with two singles in three trips and drove in three of the Malin runs, despite the fact that he came up with two Mustang errors.

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In the fateful fifth inning Cougar hurler Davidson, a tall right-handed senior, visibly tiring of the terrific pressure, gave the Mustangs the break they were looking for when, after two were

out, he tossed Jim Owens' easy bunt into the bullpen allowing Owens to make second. Shaken, Davidson walked Don Miska, but not before Owens had stolen third.

With two men on, leadoff man Abe Kirkpatrick, third base, connected for a clean single, scoring Owens. Miller walked, leading the sacks, then Illian stepped into the breach and poled a liner between third and short, scoring two men.

Miller scored and Illian rounded second then landed on third as Cougar leftfielder Ray Scaiffe bobbled the pick up and from here on the Malinites had little trouble.

On the basepaths the Mustangs out-galloped the young Prospect squad, collecting five stolen bases while the Cougars could garner only two.

Miller walked one man while the loser, Davidson, walked three.
