## Malin Couple Receives Letters

MALIN—Mr. and Mrs. Werner Bunge of Malin are receiving interesting letters these days from their daughter, Marjorie Bunge Miller, who is now traveling with her husband, Dr. Harvey A. Miller, to various countries in Europe.

Dr. Miller is doing research on mosses and other herbaria that are considered examples of plant life little affected by the migration and living habits of man. Identification of similar types in widespread areas would aid considerably to the store of information which eventually might produce answers to still unsolved riddles about the earth.

Dr. Miller is one of two botanists who received the 1958 Guggenheim Fellowship Award for research. His personal collection of specimens represents one of the most extensive private collections of Pacific specimens in the world and is largely a result of two years of field study in Hawaii.

A visit to Malin this summer after their return from Europe is planned by Dr. and Mrs. Miller. Their home is in Oxford, Ohio, where he is a botany professor at Miami University.

Their two sons, stricken with granulomatosis, a rare glandular disease, are not expected to live very long doctors have told them. Mr. and Mrs. Bailey E. Payne said doctors say it is incredible that two cases have occurred in one family.

The boys, Bailey Jr., 4, and Christopher, 2 1/2, were stricken about two years ago. The father is a factory worker.

"We know that doctors don't believe these children will live very long," the mother said Friday. "But we believe they will. We are praying that they will somehow recover."
