The Many Roles of Charles Coburn

WHENEVER CHARLES COBURN is scheduled for a movie, the boys in the wardrobe department get busy. In more than a half-century of acting, Coburn has not only seen a lot of film history but he's played a lot of history on film, invariably in costume.

His roles almost span the age of man. He's played Hippocrates, father of medicine; a medieval author, Chaucer, in "The

Canterbury Pilgrims"; an English king, Henry VIII, in "Master of the Revels"; and at least two colonial figures, Peter Stuyvesant in "Knickerbocker Holiday" and General Burgoyne in "The Devil's Disciple."

In his latest film, "John Paul Jones," Coburn enters the Revolutionary War period to portray Benjamin Franklin—a man almost as versatile as Coburn.

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
