

Buhl Shuts Out Los Angeles; Ennis' Single Beats Yankees

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The Milwaukee Braves supported Bob Buhl's superb four-hit pitching with an explosion of three homers in the third inning and blanked Los Angeles 6-0 Saturday night before a whopping crowd of 59,389.

Hank Aaron slammed one of the third inning homers, extending his hitting streak to 20 games, and added another homer in the ninth. He now has 10 for the season.

The loss dropped Los Angeles into third place, three percentage points back of San Francisco. Milwaukee leads both the Giants and Dodgers by 2½ games.

Huskies Run Second; Roller Double Champ

SPRINGFIELD, Ore. (AP)—Merrill's Charles Roller, whizzed to first place finishes in both the low and high hurdles to lead the Huskies to a second place finish in the Oregon Class B prep track championships here Saturday.

Merrill, with 41 points, closed on the heels of St. Mary's of Medford, which collected 54½ points primarily on a cluster of seconds and thirds to nab the 1959 Oregon prep title.

Jacksonville was third with 40 points.

Carl Michael got one first-place finish for St. Mary's with a winning toss of 144 feet, 11½ inches in the discus.

His teammate, Dick Evans, won the mile in 4:42.4.

The top individual performance of the meet, however, was turned in by Meyle Branson of Jacksonville.

Branson won the 100-yard dash in :19.6, topped the 220-yard dash field in :23.4 and then ended with a winning leap of 21 feet, 2½ inches in the broad jump.

For the first time in the history of the meet, no records were broken Saturday. The track was slow—due mainly to heavy rains much of the week.

The defending champion, Enterprise, did not compete in the meet. The Eastern Oregon school has moved up into A-2 ranks.

Royal Orbit Cops Big Race

BALTIMORE (AP)—Royal Orbit zoomed from outer space around the middle of the track on the final turn in the \$190,300 Preakness Stakes Saturday and drew away to a four-length victory over Sword Dancer.

First Landing, the surprise slight favorite ridden by Eddie Arcaro, wound up ninth in the 83rd running of the classic.

It was the second major triumph in a row for horses raced in the golden state of California in the Kentucky Derby-Preakness-Belmont triple crown.

Tommy Lee, from the Pacific slopes, snatched the roses by a nose over Sword Dancer in the Kentucky Derby two weeks ago, but elected to skip Maryland's famous three-year-old contest.

Royal Orbit got into heaps of trouble when he made his late move in the derby behind tiring horses, and wound up fourth in a field of 17.

But Willie Harnatz, riding in a Preakness for the first time, gave a Pimlico crowd of 31,506 plenty to cheer about as the well-liked Sword Dancer was just another runner-up in the field of 11 starters.

The Claiborne Farm's Dunce, a disappointing seventh in the derby, came in third three lengths behind Sword Dancer and 2½ lengths ahead of L. G. Robinson's Marauder, the early pace setter.

Royal Orbit is owned by Helina Braunstein, a chic former New York actress and TV performer who lives in Beverly Hills, Calif. Her husband, Jacques Braunstein, died a few months ago.

She thinks Royal Orbit is the greatest race horse in the world, and was here to accept the record winner's check of \$136,200. The largest net jackpot for a previous Preakness winner was the \$98,005 hauled down by Calumet Farm's Faultless in 1947.

Royal Orbit, third choice in the mutuels, returned \$15.20, \$5.80 and \$4.20 for \$2.

Oregon Tech Bows To Vikings In Conference Title Defense

PORTLAND (AP)—Distance runner Len Lukens won two events in pacing Portland State to an easy victory in the Oregon Collegiate Conference track championships here Saturday.

Portland State, in all, won eight events and racked up 101½ points. That was the conference's all time high, and easily topped the former team record of 79½ set by Eastern Oregon six years ago.

Oregon Tech took second place, but was far out of the running with 56½. Southern Oregon followed with 45, EOC 21 and Oregon College of Education 10.

Coach George Miller's Ore Tech squad was paced by a pair of versatile thinclads, newcomer Al Morris and veteran Dick Hocevar. Morris won the high jump with a leap of 6 feet, 3 inches, ran second in the low hurdles, took second in the broad jump, fourth in the 100-yard dash and ran on the mile relay team which took third place.

Hocevar, in his third year for the Owls, swept through both the high and low hurdle events and tied for second place in the 220. Morris, compiling 16½ points to Hocevar's 15½ total points, was awarded the most valuable player trophy for the annual meet. Hocevar was the 1958 winner of the award.

Other Owls who turned in fine performances in the eyes of coach Miller, were Norm Sawyer, who broke the school record in the 330 with a time of 2:01 although placing second to PSC's Lance Newman, and distance man Roger Moreland, who placed third in the two-mile event after battling the flu all last week.

Lukens set records in both events as he won the mile and two mile. His mile time of 4:30.3 eclipsed the old mark of 4:34.1 set by EOC's Nick Eddy in 1956.

And in the two mile, Lukens got a time of 9:53.2 — breaking his own record of 10:16.0.

Four other marks also fell—two Portland State athletes. Lance Newman ran the 880 in :1:59.1 and Gene Hedrick whizzed around the 440-yard course in :51.3.

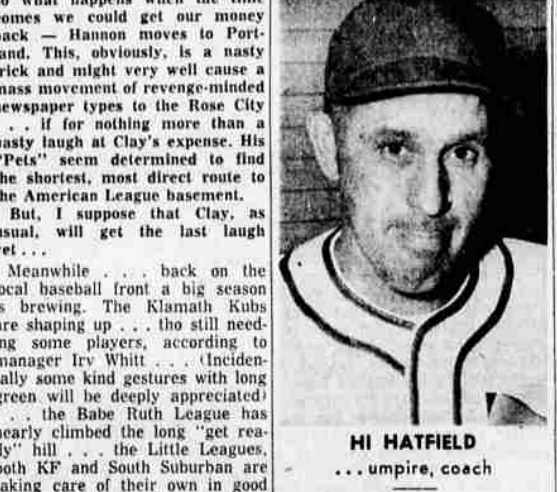

Thomson Sets 1 Lap Record In Brickyard

INDIANAPOLIS (AP)—Johnny Thomson, a tough little Scotsman from Boyertown, Pa., drove a radically different race car in an Indianapolis Motor Speedway one-lap record Saturday and earned the pole position for the 3rd 500-mile auto race May 30.

A crowd estimated at 90,000 saw Thomson, veteran of six 500s and 21 years of top level auto racing, push the record to 146,552 miles an hour. The old one-lap mark for the 49-year-old track was 146,508 set last year by Ed Elisian of Oakland, Calif.

Thomson's average for the 10-mile trial, 145,908, was a shade under the 145,974 record set last year by Dick Rathmann of San Gabriel, Calif., who did 144,248 in Saturday's trials.

The bright pink Thomson racer, built by Lujie Lesovsky of Inglewood, Calif., has the engine installed on its side with the drive shaft running down the right side of the
