

Mile-High Track Team In Portland To Defend Conference Championship

Coach George Miller and his entire Oregon Tech track squad left this morning at 6 o'clock for Portland where the Owls entered the annual Oregon Collegiate Conference track meet which was scheduled to get under way this afternoon and conclude late Saturday afternoon.

The Ore Tech hopes for a second straight championship received a shot in the arm this past week with the announcement of the eligibility of Al Morris, a transfer who will be eligible for the conference meet. The versatile Morris has turned in outstanding performances in the broad and high jumps, plus turning in a 10.2 100-yard dash.

With the addition of Morris, the Owl thinned squad's chances are greatly improved for at least a second place finish in the meet.

"There is a definite chance—not a good one—but a chance that we can take the meet," remarked Miller prior to leaving for Portland this morning. "It all depends upon how the Portland State kids do to determine how we will come out."

finished the Owl mentor, cus title, Oregon College of Education. Dick Hovevar is one of five Oregons who will be in the mile and two-mile against PSC's Lukens while Charles Hucks will join with Hovevar in the hurdles.

In the weights Frank Wilson and Paul Layher will enter the shot put while Dale Perkins and Al Everson will take care of the discus event.

Ardel Hamilton will be entered in the high jump, William Hanson in the pole vault, Hamilton and Everson in the broad jump and Howard Jackson in the javelin.

The mile relay team of OIT will be composed of definite starters Sawyer, Barrington and Mike Russell while the fourth member will be chosen just prior to the event, which is the final one of the Saturday afternoon finals.

Another newcomer to the squad who reported at the first of the week and will make the trip with the Owls is Charlie Wilson, older brother of Leon, who has been out for the Owl baseball squad this spring.



UO Webfeet Rated Best For ND Meet

EUGENE, Ore. (AP)—Oregon rates as the favorite to capture the Northern Division Pacific Coast Conference track crown here Saturday in a meet that will feature tough competition for champions from last year seeking to win again.

Oregon miler Jim Grelle, seeking a third straight victory, faces stiff competition from Jack Larson of Washington, George Larson of Oregon and John Simpson of Oregon State.

Spike Arlt of Washington State presents the strongest challenge to Oregon decathlete ace Dave Edstrom, who won the high hurdles last year.

But Arlt will find it difficult to retain the low hurdles crown a second year. The chief challenger is Steve Anderson of Oregon.

Terry Toback of Washington—like Grelle—seeks a third straight title, but in the 440. In an earlier meet he was shaded by Oregon's Otis Davis, who is foregoing a chance to repeat in the 220.

Roscoe Cook of Oregon and Don Maw of Washington State will vie for the 100 and 220 yard dashes as favorites.

The broad jump duel between Darrell Horn of OSC and Steve Anderson of Oregon easily could be a disappointment. The two, who deadlocked at 25 feet and a quarter-inch last week, are going to have a much shorter runway, which could cut down the distance.

Cliff LaBounty, Washington's defending pole vaulter, will be up against Oregon's Jack Burg, who won in 1957.

In the javelin Dick Rubens of WSC is favored, in the discus Don Anaker of Washington and in the shotput WSC's Steve Frye.

Nation's Top Stars Clash In Coliseum

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—A tasty track menu is on tap tonight with the nation's outstanding stars on hand for an all-out record onslaught in the 19th annual Coliseum Relays.

The entry list is headed by Olympic champs Bobby Morrow, Glenn Davis and Parry O'Brien. The floor of the giant Coliseum was made over Thursday night and early today from a baseball diamond to a track arena. Ground crews moved in to manicure the turf track and runways immediately after the Los Angeles Dodgers-Pittsburgh Pirates night game.

An all-star show includes a half dozen relays and competition in almost all of the regulation individual track and field events with the exception of the javelin, the 220 and the 220 low hurdles. The meet gets under way, with the field events, at 7 p.m. p.m.

At least six world records are endangered.

—Morrow and San Jose State's Ray Norton resume their personal duel in the 100-yard dash with hopes of bettering the accepted 9.3 second mark.

—Charlie Dumas will take a crack at Yuriy Stepanov's 7 foot 11 1/2 inch high jump mark. Dumas showed Olympic year form in clearing 7 feet easily at Fresno.

—Hulking Dallas Long, the 250-pound, 18-year-old USC freshman, will again batter at O'Brien's official shot put mark of 63 feet, 2 inches.

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Groups Freedom Yen Used To Stir Up Trouble

Editor's Note:—One of the weapons the Soviet Union is employing to maintain ferment in the Middle East is the desire of the Kurd tribes for independence. AP Foreign News Analyst William L. Ryan, making another tour of the perennially troubled area, reports from the Iran-Iraq border on strong anti-Communist feelings among some of the Kurds.

PASVEH, Iran (AP)—Thousands of Kurd tribesmen have fled across the rugged northwest Iranian frontier from Iraq rather than submit to domination by a pro-Communist chieftain.

There was sharp fighting in the frontier area as recently as four days ago, when about 5,000 Kurds crossed into Iran. Others of the tribe have fled into Turkey.

This information comes from Amir Aly Ashehara, the head khan (landlord) of a huge area occupied by Kurds of the Mamash tribe. He owns this village and about 150 other Kurdish villages in the southwestern part of Iran's Azerbaijan Province, only a few miles from the Iraqi border.

The Kurds, under a leader identified as Sheikh Raschid, left 13 Barzani tribesmen dead after a fight with them and Iraqi gendarmes. The khan said Raschid lost two dead and had two wounded.

The Barzanis are followers of Mullah Mustafa Barzani, who spent a dozen years in exile in the Soviet Union after an abortive attempt to establish a satellite Kurdistan in Iran, Iraq and Turkey.

Babe Ruthers Slate Huge Auction Sale

Neighbors and families of Babe Ruth League ball players may expect visits momentarily from the youngsters who are endeavoring to raise funds to help with the coming fall season by holding a special merchandise auction sale at the Town and Country Shopping Center, Saturday, May 23.

The players, under the supervision of their players, coaches and league officials will canvass their immediate neighborhoods between now and the auction date soliciting discarded, salable items that may be donated to the sale.

Klamath Falls people are urged to check garages, attics and storerooms for articles that may be no longer useful in their own households but could possibly have a value to auction attendees.

The sale will be conducted by auctioneer Bert Smith who will donate his services, as well as a number of local citizens who have volunteered trucks and equipment to be used in the collecting and handling of donated merchandise.

Merchandise will be collected and stored in Gem Stadium until the morning of Saturday, May 23, when it will be moved to the rear of the parking apron (model plane area) at the shopping center.

The stadium will be open Saturday, May 16, from noon until 5 p.m. and daily during the ensuing week from 5 p.m. until 7 p.m., for receiving the collected articles.

Persons who wish to donate articles to the sale but are not called upon by the Babe Ruthers may deliver to the stadium or call TU 2-3863 for pickup service, according to auction chairman Jim Floyd.

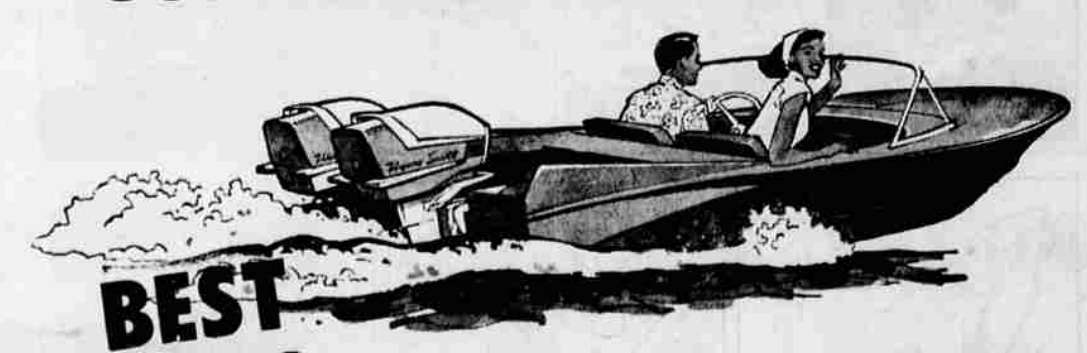
Two of the other three escapees are at large. The third also gave himself up.
