

Mississippi Lynch Probe Rouses Ire

POPLARVILLE, Miss. (AP)—Citizens in this south Mississippi town are showing open irritation today over the FBI's investigation of the Mack Charles Parker lynching.

Reports that the FBI was poised to arrest seven men over the weekend in connection with the lynching failed to materialize.

Tension was heightened Sunday when one man was hospitalized for a cerebral hemorrhage a few hours after FBI agents questioned him.

Another man, J. F. Lee Jr., said agents questioned him and his wife twice and followed him more than a week.

J. P. Walker, a reported candidate for sheriff, said he would not submit to more questioning "unless they issue a warrant for me."

Arthur E. Smith, 32, a stump hauler and tractor driver from nearby McNeill, was hospitalized in an undetermined condition after the cerebral hemorrhage.

A physician said he ordered Smith to the hospital Saturday night and described the attack as "caused by high blood pressure brought on by extreme nervousness and tension."

The FBI declined to comment. Cecil Smith, one of the stricken man's brothers, said FBI agents took Arthur from his home May 10, questioned him in Bogalusa, La., where Parker's body was found in the Pearl River.

For the next five days, Cecil Smith said, agents maintained a continuous watch on his brother from a car parked near his home.

They questioned him again later in the week and again Saturday afternoon. A few hours later Arthur suffered the attack.

The agents' apparently interrogated Arthur Smith about his whereabouts at the time 8 or 10 hooded men dragged Parker from his Poplarville jail cell into a car.

The April 25 mob action came two days before Parker's scheduled trial on charges of raping a pregnant white housewife.

School-A-Day Raid Reported

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Nine boys, four of them brothers, have been accused of vandalizing four schools in five days. They said they took Sunday off "because we don't do anything wrong on Sunday."

The damage was done, at the rate of one school a day, between Thursday, May 7, and last Monday. The havoc at one school was so bad classes were cancelled the following day.

The boys were arrested at their homes Sunday and charged with burglary, larceny and receiving stolen goods. Police said they emptied fire extinguishers, ransacked desks, and stole equipment. They are 10 to 13 years old.

Most of the stolen equipment, police said, was found at their homes.

Wagon Train In North Platte

NORTH PLATTE, Neb. (AP)—The Centennial wagon train pushes on toward Oregon today. And its members are determined to finish the trip.

"I wouldn't any more go back home without finishing this trip than anything," said George McCune of Medford, Ore., as the party rested here Sunday.

"If anything happened to the caravan, I guess I would just keep on going by myself," he said. "There are a lot of others that feel the same way."

Beach Reveals Woman's Body

DEPOE BAY, Ore. (AP)—The body of a woman—the back of the skull caved in—was washed up on a beach here Sunday.

State police said later that it was the body of Margaret Gray, 37, Portland, who vanished after setting out for a stroll on the beach May 9.

Miss Gray presumably was drowned, but an autopsy may be held, state police said.

Two Men Face Dueling Charge
SAN DIEGO, Calif. (UPI)—The first dueling charge in San Diego County this century was on file Saturday against two men who shot it out with small-caliber pistols in this city's downtown district.

Police said Calvin P. Summers, a sailor stationed aboard the USS Prairie, and Jimmy C. Fuller, of National City, Calif., both 23, exchanged six shots Friday before they stopped firing when both were wounded.

The two men began arguing when Summers allegedly called Fuller, a Negro locker club employee, "some bad racial names."

Chief Renews Driver Warning
Acting Klamath Falls police Chief Archie Huff issued some advice for motorists today.

More than 3,000 persons have been injured in Oregon traffic accidents so far this year, Huff said, and the vacation season is just beginning.

He pointed out that a car traveling at 30 miles per hour needs 78 feet of dry pavement for stopping after a danger situation has been spotted. At 60 m.p.h. a car requires 246 feet to stop.

Huff advises motorists to stay a car-length away from the vehicle ahead for every 10 m.p.h. of speed. He also suggested "defensive driving"—looking out for sudden moves by fellow motorists.

Couple Insists Monkey Leave
SANTA CRUZ, Calif. (AP)—Mrs. Kester Krieg, doing her chores Sunday, looked out the window, saw a monkey peering at her. The monkey, dressed in yellow pants, was hanging from the edge of the roof. Mrs. Krieg let out a yelp. Her husband came running and, between them, they caught the monkey and put it in the garage. The monkey, about two feet tall, tame and friendly, carried no identification.

The Krieg's say the owner can claim it any time—and the sooner the better.

Oregon Law Could Bring Free-For-All

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Oregon's new presidential primary law is getting attention from politicians here because it seems to suggest possibilities for free-for-all contests in 1960.

It could put unannounced but potential candidates for the presidency on the spot. Affected could be Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York on the Republican side and Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas and Sen. Stuart Symington of Missouri among the Democrats.

The law contains an old provision allowing candidates to be entered in the Oregon presidential primaries by petition.

A new provision gives the secretary of state "sole discretion" to enter other candidates who are generally advocated or recognized in national news media throughout the United States.

Once the state official has made that determination, a candidate can withdraw only by filing an affidavit "stating without qualification that he is not now and does not intend to become a candidate . . ."

Among possible Democratic candidates, Sens. John F. Kennedy of Massachusetts and Hubert H. Humphrey of Minnesota are expected to be entered in state presidential primaries, Oregon is regarded as a probable setting, along with Wisconsin, for a contest between them.

On the Republican side, Vice President Richard M. Nixon is an expected entrant in the presidential primaries.

There has been no sign, however, that Rockefeller, Johnson, Symington or some of the other potential candidates have any interest in making a showing in these state contests. Yet they have backers within the party organizations and appear to be "recognized in national news media" as candidates.

While the Oregon Legislature's action this year may have broadened the field for the presidential primary in that state, Minnesota and Montana put an end to presidential primaries. Their legislatures repealed their presidential primary laws.

No Long Faces, Ike Tells Cadets

WASHINGTON (AP)—"Make sure your face doesn't grow longer every day," an honorary fellow graduate, President Eisenhower, told the first senior class of the Air Force Academy.

"Go to bed with a smile," he continued, "and you'll find a long, happy fruitful life—fruitful to your country and to humanity."

The President left his admonition with the Air Force cadets during a weekend trip to Colorado.

One purpose of his trip was to visit his ailing mother-in-law, 81-year-old Mrs. John S. Doud, in Denver. The President's wife had been with her mother since the middle of last week.

Eisenhower flew back to Washington Sunday night, after spending exactly 24 hours in Colorado. Mrs. Eisenhower returned with him.

Defense Working On Flying Saucer

WALTHAM, Mass. (AP)—Raytheon says it is working on a flying saucer which would hover in the air unpowered.

Its fuel, Raytheon officials said Sunday night, would come from high frequency radio waves. Beamed at the "sky platform," they would be converted to heat energy for mechanical power.

One of the possible uses of a "sky platform" or flying saucer, Raytheon officials told newsmen, is as a television relay station.
