

Spahn Defeats Giants, 4-2; Chicago White Sox Lead AL

First place is a kiss of death in the National League, except for the Milwaukee Braves—the only club that hasn't found the lead a ticket to fourth place.

In the first week of play, San Francisco broke on top—then lost five of eight and skidded to fourth. Milwaukee was on top for the next two weeks, gave way momentarily as Los Angeles moved in, then returned while the Dodgers dropped four of five and slipped to fourth.

The Giants made a repeat trip to the top on May 2—then dipped to fourth again, losing three of four while the Braves returned to first.

Cincinnati was next—but lost four straight and fell to fourth. Then the Dodgers were back. They won four in a row and had a half-game edge on Milwaukee a week ago. But they haven't won since while the Braves have set up shop once again, winning eight of nine.

Milwaukee made it five straight—longest winning string of the season in the NL—with a 4-2 victory at San Francisco Monday for a 3½-game edge, also largest of the year, over the second place Giants. The Dodgers plunged to their fifth consecutive defeat, 9-7, to Cincinnati Monday night. That left them in a fourth place tie with the Chicago Cubs.

No other games were scheduled in the NL.

The hot-handed Chicago White Sox finally lead the American League, but it took one whole of a parlay to get 'em there. All they needed was a 10-for-11 streak, plus the winning pitch in the majors, plus the first shutout of the season by Baltimore's staff.

It all happened last night. The White Sox collected a 9-2 victory at Washington, behind the five-hit pitching of Early Wynn, while Baltimore beat Cleveland 3-0 and skidded the Indians to second place on the combined six-hit work of Skinny Brown and Billy Loes.

The White Sox, who began their run for the top after slumping to fourth, 4½ games behind Cleveland 10 days ago, now have a half-game edge over the Indians, who have only a 4½ record for the same span.

Last place Detroit wallowed Boston 14-2 as right-hander Jim Bunning drove in five runs toward his fourth straight victory. Kansas City and New York were idle.

The Sox counted three in the first inning against Chuck Stobbs (1-4), scoring on Jim Landis' sacrifice fly, a double by Del Ennis and the first of two RBI singles by Torgeson. Lollar, who homered and doubled, drove in two runs.

Cordial Joins OTI Coaches

Rex Hunsaker, athletic director at Oregon Tech, announced late Monday morning the appointment of Jim Cordial to the Mile High coaching staff. Cordial, present head football coach at St. Helens High School, will fill the vacancy left by Ralph Carr, whose resignation as head baseball mentor and line coach on the football team at Ore Tech will take effect at the close of the present term.

Cordial will be an instructor in the allied arts and sciences course aside from coaching the Owl baseball team and acting as assistant to Hunsaker in coaching the football team.

Hunsaker reported that Cordial's appointment will go before the state Board of Education for approval later this week.

Cordial was selected to both the football and basketball all-state squads in his senior year while attending high school at Anaconda, Montana. He was chosen to the football all-star list as a halfback and to the basketball roster as a guard.

Upon his graduation from high school in 1946, he spent two years in the paratroops and a single year at Hartnell Junior College in California before transferring to Oregon State College where he played varsity football for three years and was elected captain in his senior year. Cordial is scheduled to receive his Masters Degree from OSC this summer.

Before taking over the head grid coaching job at St. Helens in 1957, he coached two years at Miles City High School in Miles City, Montana.

Hunsaker, upon making the announcement, said that he was "very happy" to have Cordial join the Ore Tech coaching staff and that he was "sure that he will do a real fine job."

"Jim has tremendous recommendations from Kip Taylor and Pete Elliot and it seems only proper and fitting that he should get Ralph's (Carr) job since they were one-time teammates in college," continued Hunsaker.

Hunsaker concluded the report by stating, "Of course we are sorry to see Ralph leave as he has done a real fine job for us."

Ford Frick, Trautman Talk

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP)—Organized baseball takes another crack at solving its radio-television problems today.

Commissioner Ford Frick and minor league chief George M. Trautman meet with an eight-man committee in two-day sessions which Trautman says "could be the most important meeting ever held on this matter."

Trautman, who says some fans have not been enlightened as to why some telecasts are not available to them, asked the "legion of baseball fans everywhere to consider why it is necessary for some restrictions to be imposed on major league television in certain areas."

He explained: "Television games are blacked out only when the minor league team is playing at home at a time the televised game is in progress, and even then the telecast may run up to 30 minutes before the minor league game starts. This is a simple economic fact...that must be recognized if we are to survive."

Phils Release Pitcher Hearn

CHICAGO (UPI)—Jim Hearn, a key pitcher in the New York Giants' "miracle pennant victory" in 1951, has been given his unconditional release by the Philadelphia Phillies.

Obtained from the St. Louis Cardinals via the \$10,000 waiver route in mid-season of 1950, Hearn finished the campaign with an 11-4 record and a National League leading 2.49 earned run average.

He had a 17-9 mark for the miracle Giants the next season and won the first game of their historic playoff with the Dodgers.

Hearn remained with the Giants until Oct. 11, 1956 when he was sold to the Phillies. He had a 5-1 record in 1957 and 5-3 in 1958. He had no record this season.

A 36-year-old native of Atlanta, Ga., Hearn has a 12-year major league record of 109 wins and 87 losses for a .556 percentage.

Parsons Quits '500' Grind

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. (UPI)—Race driver Johnnie Parsons discovered during 500-mile speedway qualifications he is too old and too slow at the age of 40 to compete with the younger generation.

He said he is quitting the big-car grind for that reason.

When he was flagged by his own crew, it was the hand-writing on the wall for the handsome Californian who won the Memorial Day classic nine years ago.

Since then, he has lost the heart to duel with younger men on the championship circuit, including the speedway race.

"This has gotten to be too fast for me," he said as he announced his retirement from big-time competition. "Oh, I think I could get out there and force in four quick laps—but believe me, it would be forcing. And that's not the way to drive a race car."

Parsons pushed his No. 45 roadsters to the starting apron during last Saturday's time trials. When he was too slow, his crew gave him the yellow flag, the signal to get off the course.

That was the tip-off for Parsons. He talked it over with his crew and some close friends, then announced he would restrict his future racing to the midjets, stock and sprint cars.
