

ND Irish Slated For TV

SOUTH BEND, Ind. (UPI) — Notre Dame University announced today it will televise on a delayed basis all of its 1959 football games over a national network.

The Rev. Theodore M. Hesburgh, president of Notre Dame, said the 10 games will be televised over a minimum of 115 stations from coast to coast. The telecasts will originate from WNDU-TV, university-owned station.

Transmission and network facilities will be provided by Sports Network, Inc., of New York. Because of the rules of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) governing telecasts of college football games, the Notre Dame games will be video-taped for delayed broadcasts.

Richard Bailey, president of Sports Network, Inc., said that while no definite times for the telecasts have been determined, most of them probably will be carried an hour before the telecasts of the Sunday games of the professional National Football League.

Sale and distribution of these telecasts has been assigned to United Press International. The package will be produced by Newsplex, Inc., of New York, with Harry Wismer, one of the nation's leading sportscasters, handling the play-by-play. Edward (Moose) Krause, director of athletics at Notre Dame, will supply the color background.

Mims Thomason, first vice president and general business manager of United Press International, hailed the television arrangement as one that "will enable fans to see more college football games this season than any year since the NCAA began restricting the live telecasts of college football in 1951."

"Now the fans each week will be able to see Notre Dame against one of the top teams in the country," he added, pointing out that the 1959 Irish schedule includes these opponents:

Sept. 26, North Carolina (home); Oct. 3, Purdue, at Lafayette, Ind.; 17, Michigan State, at Berkeley, Calif.; 24, Northwestern (home); 31, Navy (home); Nov. 7, Georgia Tech (home); 14, Pitt at Pittsburgh; 21, Iowa, at Iowa City; 28, Southern California (home).

Beer Garden Fans Suffer If Not Alert

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Time was when a Washington baseball fan could sit in comparative security in Griffith Stadium's left field bleacher, beer garden to watch a game.

This year, he has to maintain a constant vigil lest a baseball propelled by one of his home team heroes comes plopping into his suds.

It all boils down to the surprising fact the Senators are leading the American League in home run output, and the beer garden is their favorite target.

As of 35 games through Monday, the Senators had whacked 45 home runs—20 of them in their own park which has no Chinese taint to it.

Bellwether of the Washington bombardment, of course, is young Harmon Killebrew who is leading the league with 14 homers this year. In his eye-popping performance, Killebrew has on five occasions smashed two home runs in a single game. His last two-homer performance was Sunday against the Chicago White Sox when he had a touch of flu.

Worth noting in the Senator slugging performance is the fact that Roy Sievers, who was home run king with 42 two years ago and hit 39 last season, has been sidelined much of this year and has chipped in with only two this far.

Jim Lemon has belted nine, rookie Bob Allison eight, Reno Bertola six, Ron Sainford two, and Ken Aspinwall one.

The blows have been paying off. Homers have figured in 15 of the 17 victories the club has won. Attendance is starting to surpass that of recent years. The Senators ticketed for eighth place in pre-season predictions, are in fourth place.

Their best home run record was last season when they clocked 121. They're well over a third of the way to surpass that after 33 games this year, and the beer drinkers are restless these nights.

For instance, when Killebrew hit his second homer on Sunday, some of the fans in the beer garden area kicked loose the boards barricading them from left field. In a spirit of togetherness they held the fence up until the end of the game, then let it collapse on the field.

Boxing Picture Still Hazy

NEW YORK (AP)—This is all very complicated. You see, Sugar Ray Robinson still is world middleweight champion in New York state. But he wants to fight Carmen Basilio in Pennsylvania. That is National Boxing Association territory where Robinson no longer is champ.

In order to discover if Robinson has complied with a court order to "enter into terms of agreement to defend against Basilio," the New York State Athletic Commission is conducting a hearing. After the hearing it will decide whether Robinson still is champ.

Robinson claims he signed May 12 (three days before the court and commission deadline) to fight Basilio in Philadelphia, Sept. 21. Everybody admits Basilio has not signed. Now, who gets called? Basilio.

The hearing opened Monday with Sugar Ray watching moodily behind dark glasses. He was 38 minutes late but he showed up.

Marvin Machat, Robinson's attorney, paraded various witnesses before the commission. Al Lein, a member of the Pennsylvania Athletic Commission, said he had approved the one-sided contract for the Philadelphia fight.

Harold Salkind, Philadelphia commissioner of registration, said he had been "helping a friend (promoter Sam Rose) who is in the hospital." He said he had tried to reach Basilio and his managers for several days and finally on Friday told Johnny Dejohn, a co-manager, that Rose was ready to post \$200,000 good faith money.

A crisp \$225,000 certified check was produced by Irving Kahn, president of a closed circuit television company (TelePromTear). He said this was a minimum guarantee for Basilio. Kahn expects to beam the fight into theaters when it finally is set. Naturally, Robinson will get a bigger guarantee that may run as high as \$700,000.

Basilio has a prepared statement that was distributed to the commission by his lawyer, State Senator Lawrence Rulison of Syracuse, N.Y. After looking at the statement, the commission decided to agree to Machat's request and call Basilio and Dejohn to appear Wednesday.

The statement was not made public. However, it was believed that Basilio outlined his long struggle for a rematch and said he was willing to box Gene Fullmer for the title if Robinson is stripped of his crown.

WINS ATHLETIC AWARD

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. (UPI) — Track star Dave Scurlock has been named winner of the University of North Carolina's highest athletic award—the Joseph E. Patterson Medal. 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Drace, Santo Only KU Pelicans To Enter State Track Meet

Klamath Union High School will be represented by only two squad members—Bob Drace and Bill Santo—in the upcoming state track meet scheduled for both Friday and Saturday on the Oregon State College oval. Drace will be entered in both the high and low hurdle events plus the high jump while Santo will join Drace in the high hurdle event.

Drace, a senior, and Santo, a junior, qualified for the state meet

with their performances in last weekend's District meet at Grant Pass in which Drace scored first place victories in all three events that he entered, the high and low hurdles and the high jump while Santo pulled a mild surprise when he raced home in second place behind Drace in the high.

Out of seven meets this year, Drace has been beaten only twice, the first time in KU's opening meet with Springfield when the Millers' Tom Brown edged out the "towering" towhead in the 120-yard low and the second time in the Klamath Falls Invitational when Santo turned the trick in the 12-yard high.

Both of the school hurdle records belong to Drace as of this year. He snapped the old record of 20.2 seconds in the low hurdles set by Scott Hancock in 1935 by racing over the 180-yard course in 20 seconds flat and erased the former high hurdle mark of 15.2 set by Bob McCabe in 1947 with a sparkling time of 15 seconds flat.

To top these performances off, the rangy blond also has a high jumped an even six feet, two inches under the school record, to sport an unbeaten record in that event this spring. Drace, however, has been tied once for top honors, that one time by George Koch of

Jefford when the pair deadlocked 1-3-4.

Santo, beginning to live up to coach Jim Hughes' expectations, has been turning in sparkling performances for both the varsity and junior varsity squads this year. He ran in both hurdle events, and the 100 and 220-yard dashes and tossed the shot put for the Pelicans to round out a very productive year for the well-built junior.

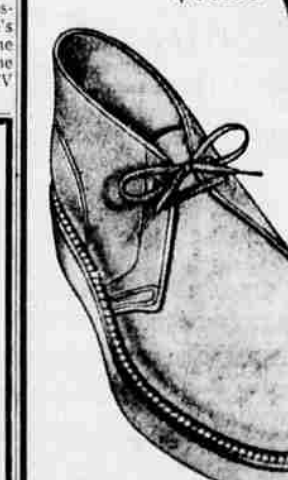

Slumping LA Sends Podres Against Reds

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — The slumping Los Angeles Dodgers tonight send their leading pitcher, Johnny Podres, to the hill against Cincinnati in the hope he can snap a five-game losing streak.

"When you're in a slump, everything goes wrong," manager Walt Alston glumly commented after the Dodgers dropped a 9-7 game to the Reds Monday night.

Podres, 42, will be opposed by Willard Schmidt, 1-0. Podres had a 3-3 record against Cincinnati last season and Alston was hopeful he could end the losing streak for the Dodgers.

The script was a little different Monday night, but the results was the same as in four previous games. In the earlier losses, homers were the big blow. There were three round trippers Monday night, but a double by the young outfielder Vada Pinson was the blow that put the Reds ahead.

The loss was a bitter one for the Dodgers who blew a five run lead posted in the first two innings. Three of the runs were unearned, however, coming after first baseman Frank Robinson dropped a routine putout ball with two away.

The Dodgers presented Cincinnati with two runs on an error by shortstop Bob Lillis with the bases loaded in the third.

Trailing 3-2, the Reds did call on homers to draw even. Johnny Temple hit a leadoff homer in the fifth and Gus Bell followed with a man on base to tie it up.

But the decisive blow was Pinson's double with two men aboard in the eighth. And the rookie scored on Robinson's single for all the margin the Reds needed.

Golf Sentimentalists Agog Over 'Sammy'

NEW YORK (UPI) — Golf's sentimentalists are agog today over Sam Snead's latest tournament triumph, nurturing once again the hope that the Slammer at long last can win the elusive U. S. Open championship.

Sam proved that, at 47, he still is one of the fairway greats by taking the Sam Snead Festival at White Sulphur Springs with a 21-under-par total. Featured by an 11-under-par 39, it was an amazing performance.

To understand Slammer's Sam, but this is not the U. S. Open. The only title he has never won, you have to probe the inner workings of an athlete's mind. It is like Ted Williams, the ramrod of the Boston Red Sox, trying to overcome the jinx which Yankee Stadium always seems to pose for his hitting exploits.

TIGHTEN UP
"In other ball parks, Williams is relaxed and you could jerk the bat out of his hands with a quick pull," Casey Stengel once observed. "But when he's at bat in the stadium he grips the bat so hard that you think he's gonna make sawdust out of the handle."

That's Snead, a picture of relaxed grace and power everywhere—except when he steps up to the tee in the Open.

This was Sam's 101st tournament triumph in a quarter century of big time competition. During that time he has won them all—except the U. S. Open. Four times he has been a disappointed second, once losing in a playoff. Another time he blew it on the final hole with a horrendous eight.

Small wonder he makes leather pulp out of the grips of his clubs when he goes forth in the Open.

There is another factor which escapes the casual glance in this smashing victory he posted at White Sulphur Springs. This is that Sam has been striding those familiar fairways since he was a barefooted youngster plus the fact that this isn't exactly the toughest golf course in the world. A good one, yes, but not a stretch-out torture rack such as they make annually of the Open course.

THE PAST RETURNS
Yet, as hot as the Slammer undoubtedly is right now, the worst days are those separating him from tee time in the Open. These are the days—and nights—when he plays every hole of every disastrous Open he has competed in during the past.

There is still another factor in the case of Slammer's Sam. Almost annually he comes up with some ache or pain, illness or injury as the field gathers for the big one. They are, most times, psychosomatic. Sam, a psychiatrist once observed, is unconsciously preparing his newest alibi. If he could go out and play the Open like any other tournament—like the Sam Snead Festival, for instance—he still could win it going away.

But he doesn't, and this latest victory drives home the point all over again.
