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Bowler Honored

DETROIT (AP)—Bowler Marion Ladewig received a big tribute from her home state of Michigan today. 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Newcomer Killed On Bricks

INDIANAPOLIS (AP)—The 50th death in 50 years was charged today against treacherous turns and hard concrete walls of the Indianapolis Motor Speedway in the most disastrous practice period since 1937.

Rookie Bob Cortner, 32, of Redlands, Calif., died Tuesday night of severe head injuries, the second victim this year of preliminaries to the 500-mile race May 30.

Jerry Unser, Lakewood, Calif., was fatally injured in another practice run May 2.

It is the first year two persons have been killed at the track since Manuel Ayulo died in practice and Bill Vukovich in the race, four years ago.

Cortner, a 10-year veteran of midwest car racing, but new to the big cars, had completed his speedway driver's test only Monday. After passing the final 130-mile-hour phase, he was permitted to drive as fast as he liked.

He wheeled his new Cornis Special into the northeast turn a little too high and was caught by a cross wind. The car spun into the infield and whipped back across the track to crunch against the retaining wall almost head on.

Cortner's face was smashed against the steering wheel and he lost a large quantity of blood from internal injuries. Other drivers and mechanics were waiting to donate blood when he died.

The Sacramento Solons padded their Pacific Coast League lead by a half game Tuesday night, defeating the Phoenix Giants 9-7 in 10 innings while second-place San Diego's game with Salt Lake City was rained out.

In other league action, the Seattle Rainiers beat the Portland Beavers 3-2 and the Spokane Indians drubbed the Vancouver Mounties 6-3.

Money Problems Deter Entrants

PORTLAND (AP)—Two Oregon teams—Portland University and Linfield College—were listed Tuesday as probable entries in the District 8 National Collegiate Athletic Assn. baseball playoffs.

But neither of the two teams is expected to enter the playoffs to be held either at Palo Alto or Berkeley, California, May 29-30.

Linfield, Northwest Conference champions, definitely would not enter because of financial reasons and a conflict with final examinations, said Paul Durham, director of athletics at the school.

Al Negretti, Portland U. athletic director, said the Pilots probably would not be able to make the trip because of the expense involved.

Teams entered in the California tourney will contest for the right to meet the Pacific Coast Conference Northern Division champion for a spot in the NCAA championships at Omaha, Neb.

Seven home runs were batted out in the Sacramento-Phoenix game, with Nippy Jones of the Solons getting a pair for the winners.

The other round-trippers came off the bats of Mike Krsnich and Clay Dalrymple of Sacramento and Phoenix's Benny Valenzuela, Willie McCovey, Bob Speake and Owen Friend.

Jay Hook, a young right-hander, bested George Brunet in the Seattle-Portland tussle. Hook gave up four hits, fanned six and walked two. Brunet issued eight hits, struck out the same number of batters and walked only one.

The Rainiers won it in the last of the ninth on a single, an error and Jake Jenkins' sharp single to right field.

The Indians solved Vancouver pitching for 15 hits while the Mounties got to winner Chuck Churn for eight, including Ron Hansen's two-run homer in the seventh which accounted for all of the Vancouver scoring.

Steve Bilko, Spokane's belting first baseman, whacked out four singles in five trips to the plate to lead the hitters. Tony Roig got three hits in five trips for Spokane, all singles.

The Mounties announced the outright sale of righthander Char-

lie Beamon to Amarillo of the Texas League. Beamon had won only one game in five decisions for Vancouver this season.
